OUTLOOK FOR 2021

BRIGHT FUTURE AHEAD

In a year, in a sport, where wholesale change now seems to happen daily, the Georgia Bulldogs in 2021 hope to remain a constant presence among the contenders for national honors.

Coach Kirby Smart will navigate his sixth season in Athens, which promises to be a memorable campaign. The COVID-19 pandemic has loosened its grip on public life. Full stadiums are expected once again.

Roster turnover across the nation, a smattering just a year ago, reached unprecedented levels in the offseason. Football teams everywhere were giving crash-course indoctrination to transfers from January through the spring months.

At Georgia, the Bulldogs rang in 2021 by beating Cincinnati in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, capping an 8-2 season that had been curtailed, in every way, by the pandemic. Even without transfers taken into account, Georgia welcomed back seven of its top eight receivers, its top seven rushers, and its top two passers and tacklers back for 2021. The addition of key transfers at several positions brings a special urgency to pre-season camp, as well as another level of excitement for the season itself.

“We are really focused on what’s between our ears right now — not what our bench press is or what position we are going to play,” Smart said. “Those things will play out. Our focus has been more about how we get the best out of each person. The objective is to get each and every player better.”

“Every team has its own DNA, right? You’re not going to have the same team as you did the year before. The personalities are different; the makeup of what is between the ears of your players, that dynamic changes. I think defining that every year is really critical. Know who you are, know your strengths and weaknesses, and be intentional about that with your players.”

QUARTERBACKS

The Bulldogs enter the season boasting two quarterbacks with starting experience and a couple

of talented understudies. JT Daniels took the reins of Georgia’s offense for the final four games last season, including the bowl victory. He finished with 1,231 passing yards and 10 touchdowns. In his Georgia debut, the California native and USC transfer set career highs by passing for 401 yards and four scores against Mississippi State. Stetson Bennett started half of the Bulldogs’ contests, passing for 1,179 yards and eight TDs. Carson Beck, an early enrollee from 2020, showed notable progress in his first spring practice and will contend for future playing time. Early enrollee and local hero Brock Vandagriff threw for more than 4,000 yards and 46 touchdowns for Prince Avenue Christian School, which won the 2020 state championship. The Bulldogs also return Jackson Muschamp, Nathan Priestley, and Austin Kirksey this season.

RUNNING BACKS

Georgia is blessed with a stable of backs who combined for more than 1,700 yards and 16 touchdowns a year ago. Team co-captain Zamir White paced the Bulldogs in 2020 with 779 yards and 11 scores as the tailback starter in every contest. James Cook had 303 yards rushing and three scores and was Georgia's fourth-leading receiver with 225 yards and two touchdowns. Kenny McIntosh rushed for 251 yards and a touchdown, Daijun Edwards pitched in 218 yards and a score, and Kendall Milton had 193 yards.

TIGHT ENDS

Georgia remains strong with the return of veterans John FitzPatrick and Darnell Washington. They combined for 12 starts, 17 catches for 261 yards and a touchdown in 2020. FitzPatrick and Washington also ended the 2020 season with career-best days at the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, the former with four catches, the latter three. Early enrollee Brock Bowers impressed in spring practice and should contend for playing time as a freshman. Georgia also welcomes back Ryland Goede, who has been slowed by injuries his first two years in Athens and went through a redshirt campaign last season.

WIDE RECEIVERS

The Bulldogs have both depth and experience at wide receiver. Kearis Jackson led Georgia with 36 catches for 514 yards last season. Jermaine Burton emerged as a weapon in his freshman season, hauling in 27 passes for 404 yards and three scores. Arian Smith showed elite speed in his limited snaps, including a touchdown on his first career catch. Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint and Dominick Blaylock, both proven talents on the collegiate level, have worked their way back from injuries and will contend for playing time. Adonai Mitchell had an impressive spring as a mid-year enrollee, as did fellow freshman Jackson Meeks. Mercer transfer Steven Peterson also

enrolled in January and participated in spring drills.

At this point, two additional members of the receiving corps must be mentioned. George Pickens caught 36 passes and scored six touchdowns as a sophomore last season. However, his knee injury early in spring practice cast uncertainty upon his junior season. No timetable for Pickens' return, if there is one in 2021, has been set. The void created by his absence could be filled by LSU transfer Arik Gilbert, who caught 35 passes as a freshman for the Tigers in 2020. The Marietta native was tabbed as the nation's top prep player as a tight end but will continue his transition to receiver as a collegian.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Even with three starters returning, the Bulldogs still have ongoing competition for several positions. Jamaree Salyer and Warren McClendon were bookends at tackle and Justin Shaffer manned one of the guard slots last season. Warren Ericson gave the Bulldogs key plays at both center and guard, starting twice. Sedrick Van Pran appeared in four games and will contend for time at center. After a taste of game action in 2020, Broderick Jones, Owen Condon, Clay Webb, and Tate Ratledge will look to take the next step. Highly regarded early enrollee Amarius Mims used spring practice to make a positive impression on Georgia's coaches. The Bulldogs also return valuable depth in Chad Lindberg, Austin Blaske, Cameron Kinnie, Devin Willock and Micah Morris.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

The Bulldogs are as deep and experienced as perhaps they have ever been along the defensive line. Ten-game starter Devonte Wyatt led all interior linemen with 25 tackles, including two for loss, last season and will return for a sixth year of eligibility. Jordan Davis notched 16 tackles in seven games and freed teammates by taking on multiple blockers. He highlighted his junior season by blocking a Cincinnati field goal in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. As a freshman, Jalen Carter emerged with 14 tackles

in 2020, three for loss, and even caught a touchdown pass on offense. Like Davis, he also added a blocked placement kick (PAT vs. South Carolina) to his resume. Travon Walker had 13 stops and a caused fumble in 2020, followed by Zion Logue with eight tackles, Julian Rochester (who is returning for a sixth year) with six, Nazir Stackhouse and Warren Brinson with three each, and Tramel Walthour, Tymon Mitchell, and Bill Norton with one apiece. The Bulldogs also had contributions last spring from a trio of mid-year enrollees: Marlin Dean, Tyrion Ingram-Dawkins, and Jonathan Jefferson.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

Pressure on quarterbacks will come off the edge from a veteran and emerging group of outside linebackers. Nolan Smith had 22 tackles, including 2.5 sacks, and 20 pressures last season. Adam Anderson pitched in 6.5 sacks among his 14 tackles and he added 24 pressures, two caused fumbles, and a fumble recovery. The Bulldogs also return Robert Beal Jr. and MJ Sherman. Chaz Chambliss, Smael Mondon, and Xavian Sorey all enrolled in January and made positive impressions in spring drills.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Nakobe Dean, the Bulldogs' top returning tackler with 71 stops, underwent off-season shoulder surgery but is expected to assume a leadership role in his third year. Quay Walker contributed 43 tackles last year, while Georgia got 15 from Channing Tindall. The Bulldogs also return Rian Davis and Trezmen Marshall, and they are welcoming transfer John Staton IV, who had more than 100 tackles as an All-Southern Conference player last year for Samford.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

First-year coach Jahmile Addae faces a tall task in coaching an area hit hard by attrition. Lewis Cine started all 10 games last year and ranked second among all Bulldogs with 52 tackles.

Christopher Smith emerged as a late-season starter and racked up 26 tackles. Veteran Latavious Brini enjoyed his two best collegiate games at the end of last season. Kelee Ringo, highly regarded as a prospect a year ago, is coming off an injury and a redshirt season. Additional candidates include Ameer Speed, William Poole, Jalen Kimber and early enrollees Javon Bullard, David Daniel, and Nyland Green.

Despite the loss of four key players with starting experience, Georgia appears to have compensated ably through the transfer portal. Tykee Smith earned All-America and All-Big 12 honors last season, playing for Addae at West Virginia. His 61 tackles ranked fourth among Mountaineer defenders and he led the team with two interceptions, returning one for a TD. Derion Kendrick was an All-ACC first-team cornerback last season at Clemson after earning second-team honors in 2019. He was a receiver and kick returner as a freshman for the Tigers in 2018.

SPECIALISTS

The 2020 rotation returns intact with pre-season All-America punter Jake Camarda, kicker Jack Podlesny, and snappers Payne Walker and William Mote. Camarda — 2020 SEC Special Teams Player of the Year — averaged 46.6 yards per punt, excelled in handling kickoff duties for the final seven games, and also served as holder on placement kicks. At punter he will be backed up by Noah Jones and Noah Chumley. Podlesny earned Offensive MVP honors at the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, making the victorious 53-yard field goal with three seconds left. For the year, he was 13-of-16 on field goals and 38-for-38 on extra points for a team-high 77 points. Jared Zirkel returns at kicker after redshirting in 2020. Kearis Jackson, Kenny McIntosh, and Zamir White were Georgia's top return men a season ago. Wide receiver Ladd McConkey could emerge as a candidate for punt return duties.

6TH SEASON AT GEORGIA



Three straight SEC Eastern Division championships, 52 wins, one SEC title, four bowl victories, and an appearance in one national championship game are more than respectable rewards over a five-year period. That's what Georgia got when it hired Alabama defensive coordinator and former Bulldog player and assistant coach Kirby Smart to head the program in December, 2015.

His impact, along with a stellar coaching staff, players, and a passionate fan base has put Georgia on the national stage four years running.

Despite the challenges of practicing and playing in a pandemic, the 2020 Bulldogs became Smart's fourth consecutive team to earn a New Year's Six bowl game appearance. With a Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl victory over undefeated Cincinnati on Jan. 1, 2021, the 2020 Bulldog seniors tied the record for the most wins by a senior class in school history (44) set by the 2005 and 2019 teams. This is also Smart's fourth straight team to finish the regular season ranked in the top ten of the College Football Playoff rankings (2020, 9th; 2019, 5th; 2018, 5th; 2017, 3rd), the final AP poll (2017, 2nd; 2018, 7th; 2019, 4th; and 2020, 7th); and the

USA Today Coaches Poll (2017, 2nd; 2018, 8th; 2019, 4th; and 2020, 7th).

2019 — Smart's 2019 Bulldogs became the first team in school history to win 11 or more games for a third straight season. The senior class posted a four-year record of 44-12, matching the school record of 44 wins for a senior class. Along the 2019 schedule, Georgia defeated three Top 15 teams in the final CFP ranking — Notre Dame, Florida, and Auburn — and finished as the fourth-ranked team in the final polls. The Bulldogs capped their season with a dominant victory over Baylor in the Allstate Sugar Bowl game.

2018 — Georgia in 2018 posted an 11-1 regular season record, a second straight SEC Eastern Division title, and a ranking as high as number four in the College Football Playoff poll. Georgia landed in the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019—the program's tenth all-time appearance in the New Orleans classic. For his efforts, Smart was named a semifinalist in the Maxwell Club George Munger National Coach of the Year balloting and a finalist in the Bobby Dodd Trophy Coach of the Year competition.

2017 — Smart's second season in 2017 was a

special one, with an 11-1 regular-season record, an SEC championship, a win over Oklahoma in the Rose Bowl Game (College Football Playoff semifinal) and advancement into the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in the program's first appearance. In the SEC championship game, the Bulldogs avenged their only regular-season loss with a 28-7 victory over Auburn. It was the first conference title since 2005 for the Red and Black.

Both Smart and his players reaped the bounty of their banner 2017 season. He was named George Munger National Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club, SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and SEC Coaches, and the Regional Coach of the Year by the AFCA. Roquan Smith earned first-team All-America honors and the Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker. Smith, Isaiah Wynn and Sony Michel were all taken in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft, which also claimed seniors Nick Chubb, Lorenzo Carter and Javon Wims in subsequent rounds.

2016 — In Smart's first season leading the Bulldogs, Georgia made its 20th straight bowl appearance and posted four fourth-quarter comebacks, including wins over No. 8 Auburn and No. 22 UNC. He led the Bulldogs to an 8-5 final record, which included a victory over TCU in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Smart has also made a profound impact in recruiting circles by posting the nation's third-ranked class in 2017, followed by four more classes of signees that ranked either first, second or third by every recruiting authority.

In addition to his coaching duties, Smart oversees the Kirby Smart Family Foundation, which is focused on being champions in the community by supporting needy children and families facing adversity.

Smart officially came home to Georgia on Dec. 6, 2015, but he had unfinished business as defensive coordinator at Alabama, which was still chasing a national title. He juggled two jobs for a month until Jan. 11, 2016, when the Crimson Tide won its fourth national championship in a 7-year span. Twelve hours later, he was at work in Athens, where he remains one

of ten head coaches at schools from Power 5 conferences that are coaching at their alma mater.

Smart had served on the Alabama staff the previous nine years, the past seven as defensive coordinator. During his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won three BCS National Championships, one College Football Playoff national title, three SEC crowns, six SEC Western Division titles, and was ranked in the nation's final top 10 the last eight years in a row.

Smart was one of the nation's most respected defensive coordinators. During his time at Alabama, he coached players at three different positions, in addition to his coordinating duties. He was recognized as the 2012 AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the 2009 Broyles Award winner as college football's top assistant. He also was a finalist for the 2015 Broyles Award.

Prior to joining the Alabama staff in 2007, Smart spent the 2006 season as safeties coach with the NFL's Miami Dolphins. He served six years on the collegiate level as the running backs coach at Georgia (2005), defensive backs coach at LSU (2004), graduate assistant at Florida State (2002-03), defensive coordinator/linebackers coach (2001) and defensive backs coach (2000) at Valdosta State, and administrative assistant at Georgia (1999).

Smart was the running backs coach for Georgia's 2005 SEC Championship team. His unit averaged 162.2 rushing yards per game, third in the SEC. He



coached Thomas Brown, Danny Ware and Gregg Lumpkin — all future NFL players. In 2004 at LSU, he tutored two NFL draft picks: Corey Webster (2nd round, New York Giants) and Travis Daniels (4th round, Miami).

As a player, Smart was a four-year letterman at defensive back for Georgia, where he was a First-Team All-SEC pick as a senior. He finished his career with 13 interceptions, a mark that still ranks sixth in UGA annals, and paced the Bulldogs with six interceptions in 1997 and five in 1998. He led the SEC in interceptions during his final season. Smart also scored two points as a collegian. He was the first player in UGA history — and one of just two Bulldogs since the rule was introduced in 1988 — to return a blocked PAT for two points, having brought one back 88 yards against New Mexico State in his freshman year of 1995.

A four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Smart received his bachelor's degree in Finance from Georgia in 1998 and his master's in Physical Education from Florida State in 2003.

The Bainbridge, Ga., native is married to the former Mary Beth Lycett of McDonough, Ga., a 4-year letterwinner and 2-year starter, on the Georgia women's basketball team from 2000-03. The couple met long after their undergraduate days at Georgia, when Lycett — then working in the UGA Athletic Association Business Office — helped arrange Smart's trip to interview for the Bulldogs' running backs coaching job in 2005. They are the proud parents of twins Weston and Julia (born Feb. 8, 2008) and son Andrew (born May 25, 2012).

BULLDOGS IN THE NFL DRAFT

COMPETING AT THE NEXT LEVEL

Georgia defensive back Eric Stokes was selected by the Green Bay Packers with the 29th overall pick in the opening round of the 2021 NFL Draft.

Stokes, a native of Covington, Ga., watched day one of the Draft with his family in his hometown. With his pick, the Bulldogs have now had at least one player drafted in each of the last 29 years.

This marks the fourth consecutive year that the Bulldogs have had at least one First Round pick and seventh time in the last decade that Georgia has had a player selected in the opening round. Stokes is the sixth Bulldog defensive player selected in the First Round since 2013.

Stokes is the first Bulldog selection for the Packers since defensive end Jarius Wynn went in the seventh round in 2009.

Defensive back Tyson Campbell was chosen by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the 33rd-overall pick, the first selection of the evening, while linebacker Azeem Ojulari was selected by the New York Giants with the 50th-overall pick.

In the third round, linebacker Monty Rice was selected by the Tennessee Titans with the 92nd overall pick, quickly followed by offensive lineman

Ben Cleveland, who was picked 94th overall by the Baltimore Ravens, and tight end Tre' McKitty, who went 97th overall to the Los Angeles Chargers.

Defensive back Richard LeCounte was selected by the Cleveland Browns in the fifth round with the 169th-overall pick, followed by Trey Hill being chosen in the sixth round by the Cincinnati Bengals with the 190th-overall pick. The Georgia contingent was rounded out by defensive back Mark Webb, who was picked 241st overall by the Los Angeles Chargers.

SEC CHAMPIONSHIP

FOOTBALL RULES

SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative.

1. TWO-TEAM TIE

(If two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedures will be used in order.)

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division;
- G. Best cumulative Conference winning percentage of non-divisional opponents; and
- H. Coin flip of the tied teams.

2. THREE-TEAM [OR MORE] TIE

(If three teams or more are tied for a division title, the following procedures will be used in order. If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker as stated above will be used.)

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;

- C. Head to head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. Best cumulative Conference winning percentage of non-divisional opponents (Note: If two teams' non-divisional opponents have the same cumulative record, then the two-team tiebreaker procedures apply. If four teams are tied, and three teams' non-divisional opponents have the same cumulative record, the three-team tiebreaker procedures will be used beginning with 2.A.);
- H. Coin flip of the tied teams with the team with the odd result being the representative (Example: If there are two teams with tails and one team with heads, the team with heads is the representative.)

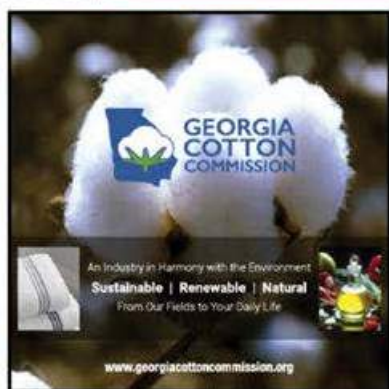

DOOLEY FIELD AT SANFORD STADIUM

NOTHING LIKE BEING “BETWEEN THE HEDGES”

With a \$25 million expansion completed in 2003 and another \$8 million in 2004, Sanford Stadium added a second upper deck on the north side and 27 new north side SkySuites bringing the stadium capacity to 92,746 — the ninth largest on-campus stadium in the country.

Named for the late Dr. S. V. Sanford, former president of the University and Chancellor of the University system, Georgia’s Sanford Stadium celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2004. An overflow crowd of 30,000 saw the stadium’s first game on Oct. 12, 1929, when Yale University made its only trip South. Georgia won the now famous game when a young sophomore end from Macon, Vernon “Catfish” Smith, scored all 15 of the Bulldogs’ points. Final score: Georgia 15, Yale 0.

Through the years, the stadium has experienced various expansion projects. In 1940, lights were added to the field level paving the way to the first Sanford Stadium night game, a 7-7 tie between Georgia and Kentucky on Oct. 26, 1940.

Eventually, the East end of the stadium was enclosed, more lights added, and the capacity increased to 82,122. The 1991 project cost the University Athletic Association \$3.7 million and enclosed the West end. The price tag was rather hefty, considering that the original price to build the stadium was a mere \$360,000.

Legendary Sanford Stadium added yet another chapter to its history by hosting the medal round of the 1996 Olympic men’s and women’s soccer competition, watched via television by more than 3 billion people around the world.

Prior to Georgia’s 2019 home opener, the playing field at Sanford Stadium was formally renamed in honor of Vince Dooley, the Bulldogs’ all-time winningest head coach. Dooley served as head football coach of the Bulldogs from 1963 through 1989 and director of athletics from 1979-2004. As head coach, he won 201 games, one national championships and six SEC titles. While Dooley was athletic director, UGA won 23 national championships and 78 SEC team championships.

DOOLEY FIELD AT SANFORD STADIUM

NOTHING LIKE BEING “BETWEEN THE HEDGES”

DR. STEADMAN V. SANFORD

Born Aug. 20, 1871, Dr. Steadman Vincent Sanford joined the Georgia faculty in 1903 and instantly became one of the University's most popular people.



He founded the Henry W. Grady School of Journalism in 1921, served as University Dean from 1927-32, and held the post of University president and chancellor until 1935 when he was named chancellor of the entire University System of Georgia.

He also held the position of faculty chairman of athletics while on the UGA faculty. He was the force behind the construction of Sanford Stadium in 1929 and was termed many times as “the best friend of athletics.”

He was largely responsible for persuading the Bulldogs of Yale to make their first trip south of the Mason-Dixon line to play the dedication game of Sanford Stadium in 1929. He died Sept. 15, 1945.

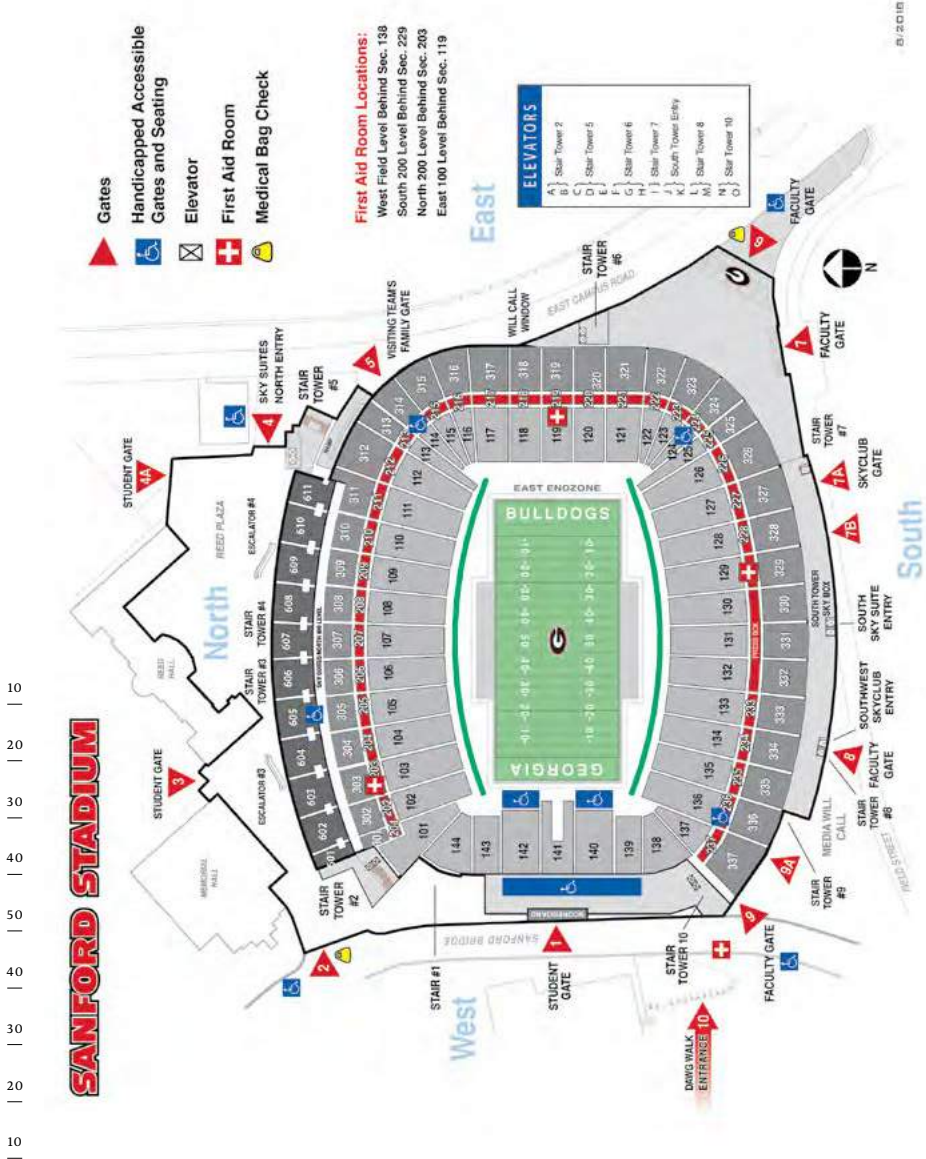

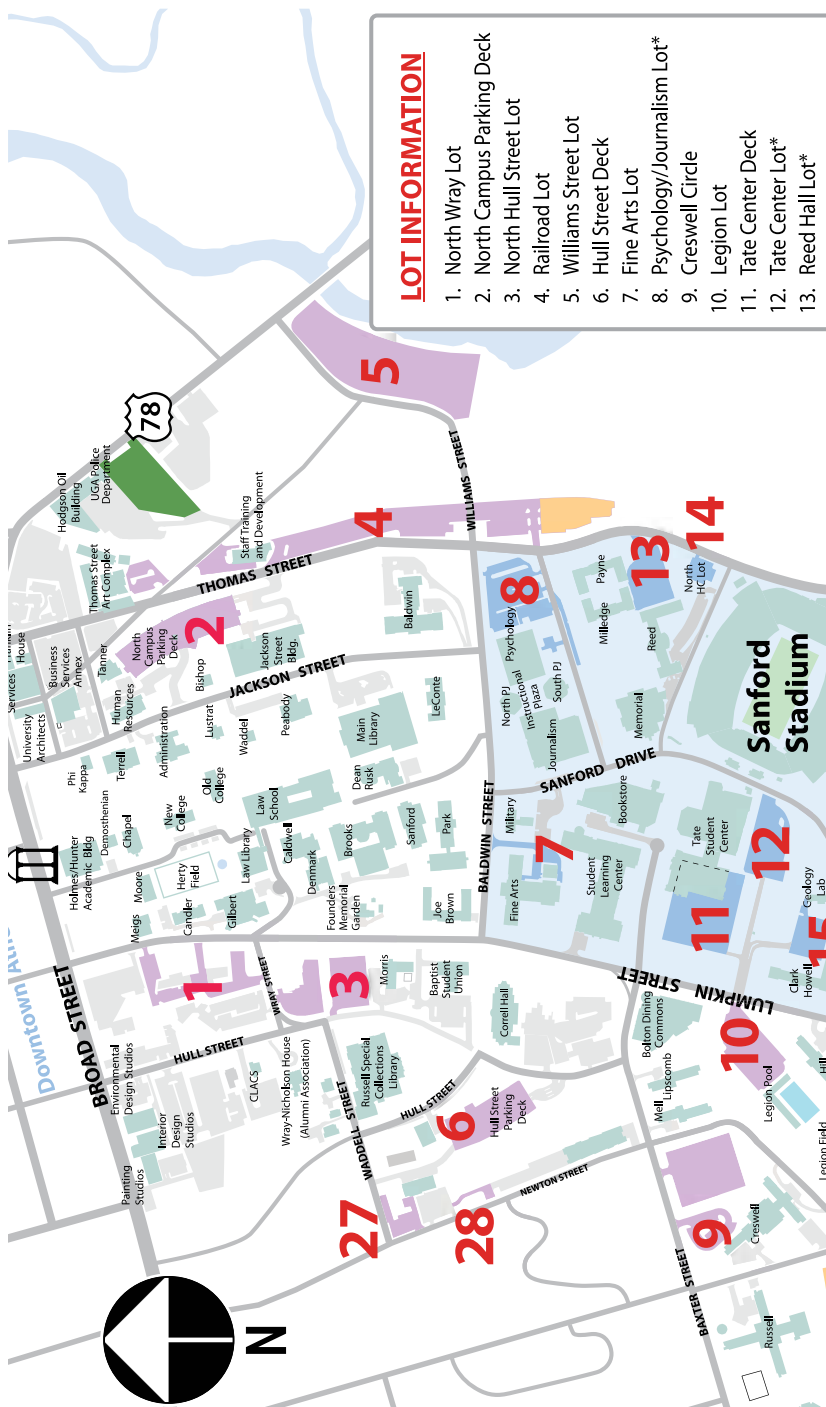

Saturdays in Athens are an exciting time. More than 100,000 fans pour into Athens on gamedays, and it takes each of us doing our part to make the day successful.

To preserve the unique settings that make gamedays in Athens one of a kind, the University and the Athletic Association ask that fans adhere to the following guidelines to better preserve our campus and make gamedays a great day for everyone.

It is our hope that everyone will continue to enjoy an incredible gameday experience and a safe, family-friendly environment.

Your first stop as you plan for gamedays should be www.gameday.uga.edu. This site includes parking maps and all the details you need to plan for another exciting season of Georgia football. On these pages, you will find some key information to make your gameday safe and enjoyable.

SET UP AFTER 7 A.M.

The campus is a “neighborhood” for UGA students. No one wants to wake up at the crack of dawn on a Saturday to a party at his or her front door. For this reason, fans are allowed to arrive early on campus and park in open parking lots in advance of games as long as they do not begin creating noise or setting up tailgate equipment prior to 7 a.m. Gameday begins no earlier than 7 a.m. Saturday morning. Prior to that, a quiet environment must be preserved for students who call campus home.

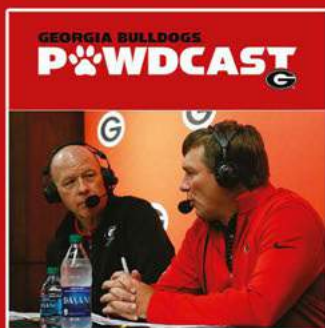
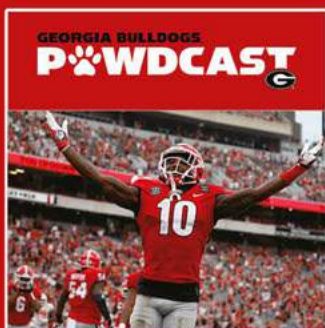
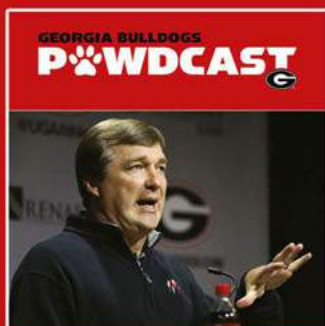
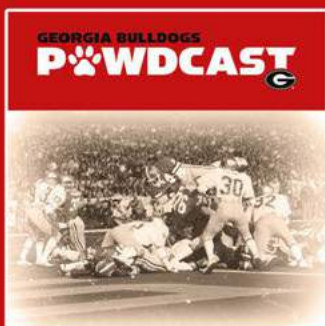
PARK IN AN APPROVED SPACE

BRING TRASH BAGS

Following games, students and local residents are left to face the aftermath of the previous day's festivities. On an average gameday, more than 39 tons of garbage are collected from the campus. That number can swell to more than 100 tons after a night game! Many fans leave town after the game unaware of the effort involved in restoring the campus and community to its picturesque state.

To help control this, there are hundreds of trash receptacles placed in heavy-traffic areas around the campus. We ask that you please bag your trash and either take it with you or leave it at your tailgating area. The UGA clean-up crew will gladly remove it for you. Placing trash in bags makes the postgame cleanup faster and more effective.

Village Commons. We have also added a designated area for corporate tailgates, allowing more space in traditional areas for regular fans.

Rest assured, legal and responsible consumption of alcohol will not be affected by these regulations, so be smart and enjoy the day.

NOTE: For safety reasons, certain items are not allowed on campus during gamedays, including:

- Propane tanks or cylinder containing compressed gas are not allowed for any purpose (turkey fryers, low country boils, grills, or portable heaters). This regulation does not apply to grills using disposable propane canisters of 17 ounces or less.
- Grills inside of or on top of parking decks.
- Golf carts and ATVs.

Additional restrictions for North Campus are in place to reduce physical damage to grounds and mitigate behavioral concerns. North Campus is defined as the area bounded by Broad Street, Lumpkin Street, Baldwin Street and Jackson Street (including, but not limited to, the quadrangle between Broad Street and Old College, the quadrangle between Old College and the Main Library, and Herty Field).

- Tailgating on North Campus is allowed beginning five (5) hours before kickoff.
- Tables cannot exceed six feet.
- Tents are allowed.

The following items are not allowed on North Campus on gamedays:

- Kegs
- Generators
- Televisions
- Amplified music
- Grills or cookers of any type
- Household furniture (foldings chairs not included)

GRAB A SNACK OR MEAL ON CAMPUS

Don't feel like preparing a meal on gameday? Whether it is just a snack or a full meal, a host of dining options, convenient to parking areas, are

available to fans on campus. UGA Foodservices serves hearty fare at multiple locations on gameday, including East Village Commons, the Georgia Center for Continuing Education, Snelling Dining Commons, Oglethorpe Dining Commons, Bolton Dining Hall and the Tate Student Center.

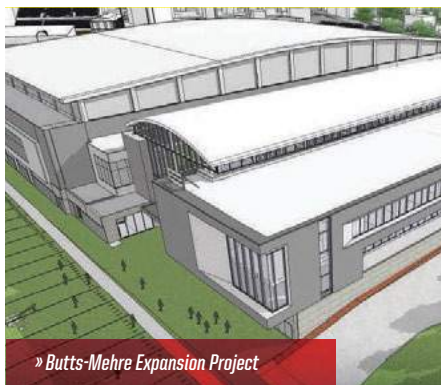

WELCOME TO BULLDOG GAMEDAY

ARTIFICIAL NOISEMAKERS

Any artificial noisemakers (air horns, cowbells, etc.) are not permitted in Sanford Stadium. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Please keep portable radios at a low volume.

ATMS

With the addition of credit/bank card capabilities at all stadium points of sale, ATMs are no longer available inside Sanford Stadium. For guests needing access to an ATM on gameday, available machines are located outside the stadium in the Tate Center plaza. Spectators inside the stadium will not be able to leave the stadium to use an ATM and then re-enter the stadium.

CONCESSIONS

UGA Athletics would like to remind all fans that transactions at our concessions stands are contactless. Methods of payment accepted include AMEX, Discover, Mastercard and VISA.

Also to assist in making your gameday experience a good one, UGA Athletics has focused on making the “core concessions items” more affordable for you and your guests. The following items have reduced pricing for the 2021 football season.

- \$2.50 jumbo hot dogs — sold at all full-service permanent stands
- \$2.50 20oz bottle soda — sold at all portable stands
- \$2.00 20oz bottle Dasani — sold at all full-service permanent and portable stands
- \$2.00 85oz Popcorn Tub — sold at all full-service permanent stands
- \$2.00 candy — sold at all full-service permanent and portable stands

DISABLED SERVICES

Wheelchair seating is located in the West End of Sanford Stadium, three locations at the top of the lower level, as well as the 600 level. All spaces are reserved and must be purchased at regular price through the Ticket Office.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In case of an emergency, the public address announcer will notify fans of developing situations in order to make informed decisions concerning their well-being. Please familiarize yourself with the nearest exit points of the stadium.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR GAMEDAY EMERGENCIES

- Monitor the weather prior to the game. Take the necessary precautions to protect your family and friends should severe weather be encountered before, during or after the game.
- In the event of an emergency inside the stadium, remain calm at all times, assist others and, if necessary, leave in an orderly fashion.
- During any emergency inside the stadium, follow the directions of the announcer, event staff and emergency responders. Assist individuals who may not be able to

hear the emergency announcements.

- Always designate a pre-determined location both inside and outside the stadium to meet friends and family in case you get separated or in the event of an emergency.
- Upon arriving at your seat location, first find the nearest exit/emergency exit and then locate an alternate exit in case of an emergency.
- Specific emergency instructions are provided for the guests in the sky suites and other private areas. Patrons at those locations should read and be familiar with the emergency evacuation instructions located there.
- Do not use elevators in the event of a fire evacuation or power failure.
- Listen to AM 1650 for gameday traffic updates.
- If you see or become aware of any activity that is unusual, suspicious or causes you concern, please report the activity to the nearest police officer or event personnel.
- Remember, text messaging may be an option when voice phone calls do not work.

FACULTY GATES

Faculty members are encouraged to use Gates 6, 7, 8 and 9. Each person is required to show proper UGA identification along with faculty season tickets.

FAN TEXT MESSAGE SYSTEM

The Athletic Association has implemented a text messaging system that allows fans to communicate directly with the stadium’s command post if assistance is needed in dealing with any special needs inside the stadium.

Should fans need assistance while inside the stadium, they will be able to contact event management staff by sending a text message from their phone. Simply text “DAWGS <space> the Issue and Location of incident” to 69050. Please note that standard SMS rates apply.

Be sure to include the problem and location of the incident, including section row and seat number (if applicable) in the message.

FIRST AID INFORMATION

First Aid Room Locations:

- Section 119
- Section 202 (Club Level)
- Section 229 (Club Level)
- West Endzone

Paramedics, nurses and physicians are stationed in all First Aid Rooms. Red Cross volunteers also are located throughout the concourses. A Red Cross station is located at Gate 7 of the 300 Level.

If assistance is needed with a health emergency, please report the situation immediately to any of the stadium ushers, Red Cross volunteers or uniformed police officers. Red Cross volunteers wear white shirts with the Red Cross emblem on the shoulder.

WELCOME TO BULLDOG GAMEDAY

GATE INFORMATION

All gates open two hours prior to kickoff.

HELP

Spectators are urged to arrive at their seats well in advance of kickoff. Excessive movement on the part of spectators during the game is a common complaint to our Game Administration officials.

As a courtesy to other patrons, please remain in your seat until the play has ended.

INFORMATION STATIONS

Look for the Bulldog Information Stations outside and throughout Sanford Stadium for event, stadium and public information. Located at Gates 2, 4, 6, 7 and 9, these customer service stands are the best source to answer your gameday questions.

For additional information on gameday, please call our Gameday Helpline at 706-425-3052.

PATRON SERVICES

Event service personnel are authorized to conduct an inspection of patrons upon entering the stadium for the sole purpose of eliminating hard objects and containers of any type from entering the stadium. Crowd control officers and stadium ushers are available to handle any inconveniences you may experience in the stadium.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Stadium security has the right to inspect any item at any time for the purpose of spectator safety. Prohibited items must be returned to cars or disposed of before entry. Prohibited items include:

- Non-clear bags
- Backpacks
- Clear bags larger than 12"x12"
- Laser pointers
- Thermos bottles
- Bottles and cans
- Infant seats
- Strollers
- Artificial noisemakers
- Umbrellas
- Weapons of any kind
- Ice bags
- Hard-surfaced materials
- Ice Chests
- Food/drink containers
- Cameras with detachable lenses
- Seatbacks larger than 16" or that have arms or pockets

RESTROOMS

Ladies' and men's restrooms are located on all concourses. Additional restrooms are located underneath the West End stands. Family restrooms are located in Reed Plaza and the 600 level of the North Side of the stadium.

SIGNS

Signs, banners, pictures, etc. that are offensive to individuals and teams, that are not in good taste, that block the view of spectators, or that create a safety hazard

will not be allowed. The hanging or displaying of signs on stadium walls, bleacher areas, ramps or an area of proximity to the stadium is prohibited as a safety precaution.

In the event of a special banner day being conducted, all signs and/or banners will be admitted through Gate 10 and must be pre-approved by game administration personnel.

STADIUM SEATBACK LEASE & CUSTOMER SERVICE LOCATIONS

On gamedays only and subject to availability, seatbacks can be leased for \$10 on a single game basis.

Returning for the 2021 season is the MVP Seatback, available for all seats located in the Club Level sections of Sanford Stadium.

Season packages can be ordered at www.ugabulldogseats.com or by calling 1-866-910-9293.

On gamedays, fans wanting to lease seatbacks for a single game or season and needing assistance with their seatbacks, can visit any of the customer service locations at Gates 2, 7 and 9 and outside Sections 123 and 124.

TICKETS

- All persons must have a ticket regardless of age.
- No re-entry is permitted at any gate. If you leave the stadium, you must have a new ticket to be admitted.
- Holder of the ticket is restricted to section, row and seat of ticket held.
- UGA student tickets require a valid student ID.
- Private party ticket transactions will be made at the buyer's own risk. The Athletic Association cannot guarantee authenticity of tickets purchased from sources other than the Athletic Association and its authorized ticket locations.
- All sales are final.
- Tickets cannot be refunded nor replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed.
- The University of Georgia Athletic Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.
- Holder of tickets to the University of Georgia athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and university policies.
- When available, reserved tickets will be on sale at the East End Ticket Windows (East Campus Road) the day of the game.

Cash, Visa, Discover, Mastercard and American Express are the only forms of payment that will be accepted the day of the game.

ANY TICKET HOLDER APPREHENDED IN SANFORD STADIUM WITH AN INTOXICANT WILL BE SUBJECT TO EJECTION WITHOUT REFUND.

TOBACCO PRODUCTS

In accordance with the University System of Georgia policy, the Georgia Athletic Association has declared all areas of Sanford Stadium smoke/tobacco free. This includes all smokeless tobacco, smoking devices, electronic cigarettes and vaping. Anyone violating this policy will be subject to removal from the stadium.

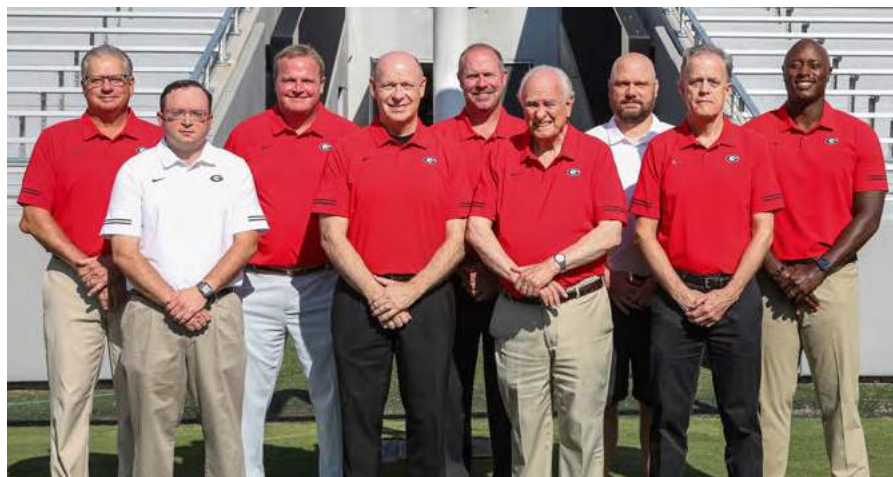

In the last 100 years of intercollegiate football, Georgia's Uga has established himself as the nation's most well-known mascot. The line of pure white English bulldogs, which epitomizes everything Georgia, has been owned by the Frank W. "Sonny" Seiler family of Savannah, Georgia, since Uga I first graced the campus in 1956. Through the years, Uga has been defined by his spiked collar, a symbol of the position in which he holds. He was given his name, an abbreviation for the university, by William Young of Columbus, a law school classmate of Seiler. Each of the Uga mascots is awarded a varsity letter in the form of a plaque, identical to those presented to all Bulldog athletes who letter in their respective sports.

As determined and published by the Pittsburgh Press, the University of Georgia is the only major college that actually buries its mascots within the confines of the stadium. Ugas I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII are buried in marble vaults near the main gate in the embankment of the South stands. Epitaphs to the dogs are inscribed in bronze, and before each home game, flowers are placed on their graves. The memorial plot attracts hundreds of fans and visitors each year. For the past 20 years, Uga's jerseys have been custom-made at the beginning of each season from the same material used for the players' jerseys. Old jerseys are destroyed.

Uga's on-field home is a permanent air conditioned doghouse located next to the cheerleader's platform, providing comfort in the heat of August and September. The custom-made doghouse is a gift from the Bahamian Bulldog Club of Nassau, Bahamas, through the courtesy of Fred Hazlewood.

UGA I (1956-66) RECORD: 53-48-6

The Uga line of solid white English bulldogs began with Uga I, Hood's Ole Dan, born Dec. 2, 1955, in Columbus, Georgia. Uga I was given to Cecelia Seiler by friend, Frank Heard, and appeared in his first game during the 1956 home opener. As recalled by Sonny Seiler, "... his original red jerseys were made by Cecelia ... There is no telling how many of these jerseys he wore out."

Epitaph: Damn Good Dog

UGA II (1966-72) RECORD: 42-16-3

Uga I was succeeded by his son, Ole Dan's Uga, at a 1966 pregame Homecoming ceremony. With the Redcoat Band lining the field, Uga II was led to its center by Charles Seiler. The student body erupted in a cheer, "Damn Good Dog!" Uga II had an impressive reign as Georgia participated in five bowl games and won two SEC championships.

Epitaph: Not Bad for A Dog

UGA III (1972-80) RECORD: 71-32-2

Born Oct. 9, 1972, Seiler's Uga III was present for Georgia football's finest moment as Herschel Walker took the Bulldogs to the 1980 national championship. Uga III led Georgia to six bowl games in nine years and closed out his career in ultimate fashion winning the 1980 NCAA championship. He retired on the 105th football game of his career, marking the season-opener of the 1981 season.

He died just weeks later.

Epitaph: How 'Bout This Dawg

UGA IV (1981-89) RECORD: 77-27-4

Uga IV was the most active of all Georgia mascots, standing as the only one to attend a bowl game every year of his service. He took over for Uga III in 1981. The highlight of his career was his appearance at the Heisman Trophy Banquet with Herschel Walker in 1982. He donned his game jersey and added the formal touch of a collar and black tie. Uga IV was the first mascot invited to the Heisman Banquet. Declared "Dog of the Decade" by Vince Dooley, he was posthumously awarded the highest UGA mascot honor, the varsity letter.

Epitaph: The Dog of the Decade

UGA V (1990-99) RECORD: 65-39-1

Uga V began his reign after his father's death in February. Uga V was the last pup sired by Uga IV and was born March 6, 1990. He was named in honor of Dan Magill, former Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations, longtime tennis coach and SID.

Uga V was known by his appearance on the cover of the April 1997 Sports Illustrated declaring him the "nation's best college mascot." He presided over Georgia's most successful

collective sports effort as it claimed four NCAA team titles during 1998-99 (gymnastics, women's swimming & diving, men's tennis, men's golf), placing second in the Directors' Cup race. He died just months after his retirement on Nov. 22, 1999.

Epitaph: "Nation's Best College Mascot" — Sports Illustrated

UGA VI (1999-2008) RECORD: 87-27

The pregame passing of the bone ceremony from Uga V to son, Whatchagot Loran, took place at the 1999 South Carolina contest. Only a year old at his coronation, Uga VI stood as the biggest of all Uga mascots weighing 65 pounds, 20 pounds heavier than his father. In 2007, Uga VI passed Uga IV for the most wins of any bulldog in school history. The fall of 2008 would have been his 10th season after reigning over more games than any mascot with 114.

He died June 27, 2008.

Epitaph: A Big Dog For A Big Job, And He Handled It Well

UGA VII (2008-09) RECORD: 16-7

Uga VII was introduced on Aug. 30, 2008. "Loran's Best" officially became Uga VII, prior to the Georgia Southern game. He was escorted onto the field by members of the Seiler family.

Uga VII passed away unexpectedly Nov. 19 of heart-related causes, before the final home game of 2009. A wreath was placed on his doghouse, and players wore a special UGA VII decal on their helmets to remember him during that final home game. "Russ," his 5-year-old half brother, served as mascot for the final two games of the season.

Epitaph: Gone Too Soon

UGA VIII (2010) RECORD: 4-2

Born Sept. 12, 2009, Uga VIII was the grandson of Uga VI, named in honor of Dr. Bruce Hollett from the UGA School of Veterinary Medicine. Uga VIII was introduced at the Homecoming game against Vanderbilt and served six games before becoming ill. He was diagnosed on Jan. 7, 2011 with lymphoma, passing away in his sleep on Feb. 4, 2011.

Epitaph: He Never Had A Chance

UGA IX (2012-15) RECORD: 44-19

Uga IX, formerly "Russ," the half-brother of Uga VII, served as an interim Bulldog mascot for a total of 25 games. He worked nine games during the 2009 and 2010 seasons after Uga VII and VIII passed away. He roamed the sidelines at all 14 games during the 2011 season. He then served for two wins at the beginning of the 2012 season before being promoted as Uga IX prior to the Florida Atlantic game on Sept. 15, 2012. His time as mascot has included the 2011 and 2012 SEC Eastern Division championships, three road wins at Georgia Tech and a victory over Texas A&M in the 2009 Independence Bowl in Shreveport, Louisiana. He completed 2012 with a 12-2 record and a win over Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl and finished 2013 with an 8-5 overall record and 2014 at 10-3.

UGA X (2015-PRESENT) RECORD: 62-17

Uga IX officially retired as the Bulldogs' mascot at the end of the 2014 season. After a three-month "audition" in that role, his grandson Que was formally crowned as his successor in a collaring ceremony prior to the Georgia-Georgia Southern game on Nov. 21, 2015. Que assumed the title of Uga X at the age of 2 1/2. During his audition, he made appearances at the Countdown to Kickoff event in July 2015, as well as Picture Day in August, before presiding over the entirety of the 2015 football season. Que capped his inaugural season by leading the team to a 24-17 victory over Penn State at the 2016 Taxslayer Bowl. Que's second year saw an 8-5 record during Kirby Smart's first year. Highlights included a victory over South Carolina in Columbia, a home victory over Auburn and a successful postseason appearance in the Liberty Bowl against TCU. In his third year, Que traveled across the country to South Bend, Indiana, and Pasadena, California. In South Bend, the Bulldogs edged out the Fighting Irish 20-19, starting off a great road season. Entering the postseason after notching an SEC Championship, Georgia headed to the Rose Bowl. The Bulldogs, along with Que, faced off against the Oklahoma Sooners. In an exciting double-overtime semifinal, Georgia punched its ticket to the National Championship Game with a 54-48 win. UGA X aims to return to the sideline in 2021 pending the restrictions related to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

SPORTSMANSHIP

BYLAW 10.5 OF THE SEC MANUAL

All institutional staff members and student-athletes of a member institution, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifest not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program.

COMPETITION AREA ACCESS

Access to the competition area shall be limited to participating student-athletes, coaches, officials, support personnel and properly-credentialed individuals at all times. For the safety of participants and spectators alike, at no time before, during or after a contest shall spectators be permitted to enter the competition area. It is the responsibility of each member institution to implement procedures to ensure compliance with this policy.

Institutional penalties against individuals who improperly enter the competition area shall include, but not be limited to, expulsion from the facility, arrest for trespassing and the loss of future ticket privileges. In addition to these three penalties, violators who are students shall be subject to institutional student disciplinary measures.

As a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Southeastern Conference, The University of Georgia is dedicated to complying with all the rules and regulations set forth by those governing organizations.

STEP 1: Know the Terms



Prospect

Any student in high school



Booster

Individual who has made a financial contribution, including purchase of season tickets, to the University of Georgia Athletic Association



Inducement

Arrangement of benefits used to recruit a prospect to the University of Georgia



Extra Benefit

Benefit to a student-athlete that is not available to the general student body



Agent

Any person who markets an athlete's athletic ability for personal financial gain

STEP 2: Know the Rules



Recruiting

All recruiting must be conducted by the coaches



Benefits

You may not provide current or prospective student-athletes with impermissible benefits such as cash, travel, clothing, etc.



Marketing

Student-athletes may now use their name, image or likeness (NIL) to promote commercial entities. There are specific NCAA rules and institutional policies related to permissible NIL activities. See more info at georgiadogs.com/sports/2021/8/2/nil-policy.aspx

STEP 3: Know the Consequences



Loss of Opportunity

Current or prospective student-athletes may be declared ineligible to compete or receive athletic financial aid



Loss of Wins

Victories obtained while playing ineligible student-athletes may be forfeited and vacated



Disassociation

Boosters guilty of violations may be barred from the University of Georgia Athletics events



Sanctions

The University of Georgia may receive penalties from the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations committed by boosters and fans

TOP 10 THINGS TO KNOW



Breaking NCAA rules can render prospects and current student-athletes ineligible to compete at the University of Georgia.



You **may not** become involved in arranging for a prospect, a current student-athlete or their friends or family to receive money or financial assistance of any kind.



The University of Georgia can be sanctioned by the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations committed by boosters and fans.



You **may not** employ student-athletes and/or prospects without approval.



You **may not** provide a meal to a current student-athlete at your home or on campus without the University of Georgia Compliance approval.



You **may not** spend funds to entertain or provide transportation to prospects, current student-athletes or their friends and family.



NIL activities must comply with NCAA and University of Georgia policies, as well as state and federal laws. They cannot serve as an inducement for student-athletes or prospects to attend the University of Georgia. Contact Compliance before offering NIL deals to student-athletes.



You **may not** provide prospects or current student-athletes with impermissible benefits such as cash, clothing, travel expenses, etc.



You **may not** be directly involved in recruiting prospects on behalf of the University of Georgia.
