CFP SEMIFINAL RECAP: NO. 3 GEORGIA ADVANCES

#3 GEORGIA 34, #2 MICHIGAN 11

MIAMI, Fla.-----Third-seeded Georgia scored on its first five possessions to rout No. 2 Michigan 34-11 in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the 2021 Capital One Orange Bowl.

The Bulldogs (13-1) jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter as the Wolverines scrambled to recover after allowing just 22 points in the first quarter all season. Georgia carried a 17-3 advantage to halftime and led 34-3 before Michigan scored its lone touchdown with 4:25 left in the contest. The Big Ten Champion Wolverines were held to a season-low 11 points and season-low 88 rushing yards as they ended their season at 12-2.

Georgia senior quarterback Stetson Bennett threw for 313 yards and

three touchdowns to earn offensive MVP honors. Bulldog senior Derion Kendrick had a pair of interceptions and five tackles to take home the defensive MVP trophy. Junior Nolan Smith had a team-high eight tackles, one sack and a forced fumble while Nakobe Dean, winner of the 2021 Butkus Award, tallied seven tackles, one sack and a forced fumble.

Georgia advanced to its second CFP Championship Game. The Orange Bowl was the Bulldogs' 34th bowl win, the second most in college football history. Also, it was Georgia's 25th consecutive appearance in a bowl game, the nation's longest active streak.

Georgia improved to 3-1 all-time in Orange Bowls and 2-1 in the series history with Michigan. The Bulldog senior class tied the school record for most wins as they are 44-8, matching the 2005, 2019 and 2020 squads.

CFP SEMIFINAL RECAP: NO. 1 ALABAMA ADVANCES

#1 ALABAMA 27, #4 CINCINNATI 6

ARLINGTON, Texas-----Top-seeded Alabama registered a 27-6 win over previously unbeaten Cincinnati in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the 2021 Goodyear Cotton Bowl.

The Crimson Tide (13-1) built a 17-3 halftime lead and cruised to its latest CFP win as the No. 4 Bearcats ended their season at 13-1.

Running back Brian Robinson Jr., tallied a career-high and Alabama bowl record 204 rushing yards on

26 attempts to earn the game's offensive MVP award. Will Anderson Jr. garnered defensive MVP honors with six tackles and two sacks.

Cincinnati was limited to just a pair of field goals and 218 yards of total offense. Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Bryce Young completed 17-of-28 attempts for 181 yards and three touchdowns to pace the Alabama offense. He owns the school single season passing yards record now with 4,503.

Alabama advanced to its sixth CFP Championship Game. The Cotton Bowl was the Tide's 41st bowl win, the most in college football history.

CFP CHAMPIONSHIP GAME FLASHBACK ◀

Alabama defeated Georgia in the 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship Game, overcoming two 13-point deficits and an errant field goal attempt that would have won it in regulation.

Still, the Bulldogs led in overtime on the strength of a 51-yard field goal by Rodrigo Blankenship. They even took the upper hand by sacking Alabama freshman quarterback Tua Tagovailoa for a 16-yard loss on the Tide's first play in the extra period. But on second down, Tagovailoa hit freshman DeVonta Smith for a 41-yard scoring pass that ended the game.

Georgia controlled the first half, taking a 13-0 lead on sophomore Mecole Hardman's 1-yard run just before intermission. Alabama turned to Tagovailoa to start the second half. Hardman scored again on an 80-yard pass from Jake Fromm with 6:52 left in the third quarter, answering Alabama's first score of the night. Hardman became the first player with a rushing and receiving touchdown in a CFP Championship Game.

This game marked Georgia's first appearance since 1982 in a game where victory would have given it a national title

in football. It was also the first time that any Bulldog team had played consecutive overtime games as Georgia outlasted No. 2 Oklahoma 54-48 in double overtime to win the Rose Bowl Game in a CFP semifinal. Georgia' overtime record is now 8-6 all-time, including 3-3 at neutral sites. Alabama won its fifth national title in a nine-year span and second of the playoff era. It was Nick Saban's sixth national title, tying Bear Bryant for the most in the Associated Press Poll Era (since 1936).

We begin with sterling appreciation for Georgia's coaching clinic disposal of the current Big Ten champions on New Year's Eve, a heady conquering of a long-time power in college football but with the reminder that Michigan ain't Alabama.

While it was good to enjoy the fruits of a well-deserved victory, the fact remains that Alabama has more overall balance, speed and talent, a Heisman trophy winning quarterback and is coached by a man who seems to enjoy as much extraordinary luck as he does genius.

Winning streaks are as much a part of the college football landscape as shoulder pads and helmets. Then there is the media

attention that can beat a mild negative into headline sensation.

For a while, the Dallas Cowboys of Tom Landry had difficulty in winning a Super Bowl. It once appeared that John Elway was going to crowd out Fran Tarkenton (three) and Jim Kelly (four) for Super Bowl defeats.

Bobby Bowden had his troubles with Miami—you remember his "wide right" days? Bear Bryant never beat Notre Dame, losing four games by a heart-stopping 13 points. The boys of the Fourth Estate were bandying about, before the Notre Dame/Sugar Bowl game in 1980, that Vince Dooley had a problem winning in New Orleans. (He had lost in the Sugar Bowl in 1968 and 1976).

Then Georgia had those forgettable days against Florida in Jacksonville, after Dooley dominated that series during his career, but few of those streaks compare with Michigan's challenge with Ohio State, winning only three games in the last two decades.

Nothing could have been more debilitating than the curse of the Bambino which Boston Red Sox loyalists endured—an 86-year drought between World Series trophies.

If you take the time to research, few coaches in the Southeastern Conference have had much success against Nick Saban. The Alabama insiders will tell you that Kirby Smart is more like Saban as a coach than any who have worked under the guy who moonlights as a Mercedes-Benz dealer.

While none is clairvoyant, this will change. When, we don't know although there is faith that come next week the new champion will be the one wearing Red and Black.

There is something especial about this Georgia team, and I have faith it will rise to the occasion. "Just one more time," became the unofficial battle cry of the 1980 Bulldogs. Erk Russell gave objective traction.

An undefeated season was on the line when the Bulldogs outfought Notre Dame in New Orleans, four decades ago. The Irish were a physical behemoth, and they were

also agile and efficient. In addition, they were fixated on sending their coach, Dan Devine, into retirement a winner.

There was constant chatter that the Irish defense was determined to keep Herschel Walker from accumulating a hundred yards rushing. He didn't. He gained 150 while Notre Dame made more first downs and outrushed and out passed Georgia as a team. Even today, four decades later, Herschel's performance does not get its due. His yardage total does not have the asterisk that deserves prominence. He gained all those yards by taking 34 snaps with a dislocated shoulder.

The goal of the Georgia team is to play as a team. It doesn't matter if a back gains a hundred yards. Be happy if the backs as a group gain a hundred yards or more.

Give Stetson Bennett time to manage the offense like the offensive line did against Michigan and things should be different. The last time Georgia won a national championship they wore "BIG TEAM, little me" tee shirts. This Bulldog team is more like the '80 team than any I have observed since that glorious year.

The famous BIG TEAM slogan of the '80 team characterizes the attitude of this team, plus they are going to Indianapolis with a chip on their collective shoulders.

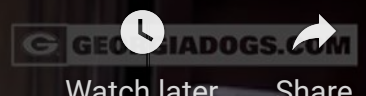

- Third-seeded Georgia (13-1) is now 2-for-2 in advancing to the College Football Playoff National Championship Game following its 34-11 rout of No. 2 Michigan in a CFP semifinal at the Capital One Orange Bowl in Miami. Georgia's first CFP appearance came in 2017 when the SEC Champions were the No. 3 seed. The Bulldogs defeated No. 2 seed Oklahoma 54-48 in double overtime in the Rose Bowl Game. Then, the Bulldogs fell to No. 4 seed Alabama 26-23 in overtime in the National Championship Game in Atlanta. And like in 2017, the Bulldogs will face Alabama after they dispatched No. 4 seed Cincinnati in the Goodyear Cotton Bowl in Dallas. The CFP National Championship Game is set for Jan. 10 inside Lucas Oil Stadium, home of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts.
- Alabama leads the all-time series with Georgia 42-25-4 including riding a seven-game winning streak. The teams last met on Dec. 4 in Atlanta for the 2021 SEC Championship. Third-ranked Alabama upset the top-ranked Bulldogs 41-24. Georgia's last win in the series came in 2007 in Tuscaloosa, a 26-23 triumph in overtime. Alabama enters this latest matchup ranked No. 1. This will be the first time that the teams face each other outside their respective states.

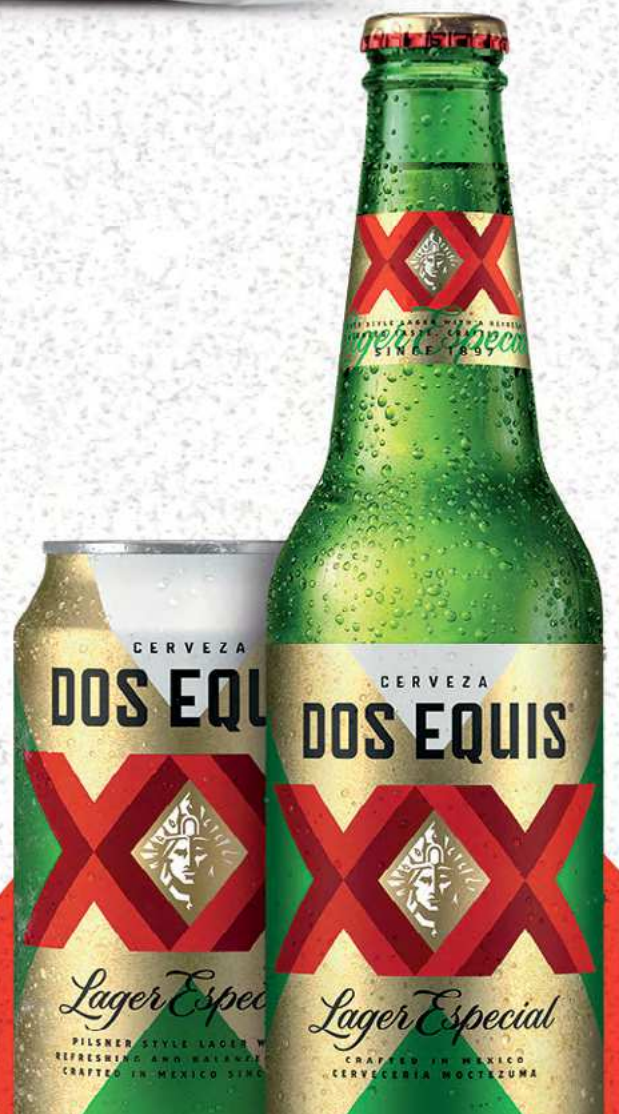
