

2022 FOOTBALL OUTLOOK BRIGHT FUTURE AHEAD

he Georgia Bulldogs had been crowned 2021 national champions 45 minutes earlier. Celebratory confetti stuck to the players' cleats as they entered the locker room. Teammates, coaches, and support staff shared ardent hugs. The goal, some four decades in the making, had been realized.

And then, just moments later, the theme shifted. After Coach Kirby Smart thanked the seniors and the juniors who had delayed their NFL announcements, he put the returnees on alert. While embracing the 2021 title, begin focusing on how to do it again in 2022.

"I know all of the players will remember this feeling, but I also want the men coming back to stay hungry," Smart said. "It's special to win, but it takes blood, sweat, and tears. It takes connection and toughness. Our job now changes as coaches. We have to do a tremendous job of explaining to our kids how the wind blows at the top. I've seen it first hand and it is not easy. As you climb that mountain, it is windy up there. There are a lot of kids to replace off last year's team who were tremendous leaders, and hopefully that will carry over to the younger ones."

That process began with offseason workouts and continued through 15 practices last spring. Smart and his staff enter pre-season camp with a good working knowledge of their latest team's makeup and Smart, for one, likes what he's seen so far. We were really talented last year, and not that we're not talented now, but we're going to have to win in different ways."

"I've been concerned about the void in leadership and how we can create leadership opportunities," he said. "From Day One (in the Spring), they were pushing each other, cheering each other on the sideline. It's almost like they wanted to emulate the guys before them. They can emulate what some of those guys did on the field. They can emulate the standard, though, and I think they've done that really well.

What follows is a midsummer, position-by-position breakdown for the Bulldogs:

DUARTERBACKS

The Bulldogs are buoyed offensively by the return of Stetson Bennett, the Offensive MVP for both the CFP National Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl. Bennett threw for 2,862 yards and 29 touchdowns last season and checks into 2022 as the Bulldogs' third-leading returning rusher with 259 yards and a score. Carson Beck appeared in four games as a reserve last season, throwing for two touchdowns, and Brock Vandagriff took limited snaps in two contests. Early enrollee Gunner Stockton set Georgia state records for passing touchdowns (177), total touchdowns (254), and total yards (18,024) during his prep career. The Bulldogs also have at their disposal Jackson Muschamp, Nathan Priestley, and Collin Drake.

RUNNING BACKS

Kenny McIntosh and Kendall Milton are Georgia's top returning rushers with nearly 600 yards and four touchdowns combined. McIntosh added 242 yards and two touchdowns receiving and even threw a scoring pass in the Capital One Orange Bowl. Daijun Edwards was an effective late-game battering ram, rolling up 210 yards and three scores a year ago. Two highly-rated freshmen arrived in the summer to fortify the Bulldog backfield: Branson Robinson from Mississippi and Andrew Paul from Texas. Georgia also has available Sevaughn Clark, Cash Jones and Lorenzo Stephenson.

Brock Bowers logged an All-America and Freshman All-America season with in 2021, with team-high totals and Georgia tight end records for catches (56), vards (882), and touchdowns (13) in 2021. Darnell Washington battled through an early-season injury to become an effective weapon down the stretch for the eventual national champions. Arik Gilbert is a considerable talent who combines the size of a tight end with the athleticism of a wideout. With Bowers and Washington out of spring practice, Gilbert saw substantial time at tight end, and he caught two TD passes in the G-Day game. Early enrollee Oscar Delp, the nation's top-rated tight end prospect as a high school senior, caught a team-high seven passes at G-Day. Also available are Ryland Goede, Brett Seither, Drew Sheehan, Davis Day, and Samuel Johnson.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Passing game coordinator Bryan McClendon, who is returning to the Georgia staff after a 6-year gap, inherits a deep and talented corps. Ladd McConkey ranked second in catches (31), yards (447), and touchdowns (five) a year ago. Adonai Mitchell followed closely with 29 grabs for 426 yards and four scores, including the goahead touchdown in the CFP National Championship Game, while Kearis Jackson had 16 catches for 194 yards and a touchdown. Veterans Dominick Blaylock, Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint, and Arian Smith continue to improve following injuries. Early enrollees De'Nylon Morrissette and C.J. Smith, as well as fellow freshman Cole Speer, will get serious looks in the fall. Georgia also has Jackson Meeks, Mekhi Mews, Logan Johnson, Braxton Hicks, and George Vining on the roster.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Stacy Searels is back as Georgia's offensive line coach after an 11-year hiatus. The line he inherits - which paved the way for 442 total yards and 39 points per game in 2021 — is anchored by the return of starters Sedrick Van Pran at center, Warren Ericson at guard, and Warren McClendon at tackle. Broderick Jones was a spot starter at tackle last year and earned Freshman All-SEC recognition, while Amarius Mims also filled in regularly for the Bulldogs. Tate Ratledge started the 2021 opener vs. Clemson at guard but was lost for the season with an injury. Xavier Truss, Devin Willock, Austin Blaske, and Chad Lindberg were key reserves a year ago who will look to crack the rotation. Early enrollees Aliou Bah, Earnest Green III, Jacob Hood, and Griffin Scroggs, will also throw their hats in the ring.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

It can be argued that Georgia's defensive line in 2021 was its finest ever. Gone from that group is an astounding trio of first-round NFL Draftees: Travon Walker (first overall pick), Jordan Davis and Devonte Wyatt. Their departures created perhaps the biggest void across the roster. Jalen Carter returns for his junior season as the anchor of the Bulldogs' new unit. Carter racked up 37 tackles, including 8.5 for loss, 33 quarterback pressures, and a team-high two blocked kicks. Tramel Walthour and Zion Logue appeared in every game and had 14 and 11 stops, respectively, while Nazir Stackhouse and Warren Brinson each made nine tackles. Georgia also has veteran players in Bill Norton, Jonathan Jefferson, Tyrion Ingram-Dawkins. Early enrollees

Bear Alexander, C.J. Madden, Shone Washington, and Mykel Williams, as well as summer enrollee Christen Miller, will impact the depth chart as well.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

First-year outside linebackers coach Chidera Uzo-Diribe has a veteran presence with Nolan Smith and Robert Beal back. Smith is the Bulldogs' returning leader in tackles after ranking fifth a year ago with 56. He also registered 27 pressures, nine tackles for loss, a team-high three forced fumbles, an interception, a fumble recovery, and a blocked kick. Beal rolled up 23 stops, including a team-best 6.5 sacks. Chaz Chambliss had 11 tackles and made an impact on special teams, while MJ Sherman posted eight tackles.

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

The exit of linebackers Nakobe Dean, Quay Walker, and Channing Tindall (and their 200-plus tackles) creates an opportunity for the returning players. Jamon Dumas-Johnson tallied 22 tackles and returned an interception for a touchdown, while Smael Mondon picked up 12 stops. Xavian Sorey logged key plays in a reserve role, and Trezmen Marshall and Rian Davis are returning from season-ending injuries last year. Graham Collins is back as well. Early enrollee Jalon Walker got valuable reps during Spring and should contend early for playing time.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The 2021 title season began with a pick-6 by safety Christopher Smith and ended with a pick-6 by corner Kelee Ringo, and each player is returning for first-year secondary coach Fran Brown for 2022. Smith had 35 tackles and three interceptions, including the only touchdown in the 10-3 opening win against Clemson. Ringo added 34 tackles and two picks, highlighted by the knockout punch against Alabama in the CFP National Championship Game. The Bulldogs also welcome back veterans in Dan Jackson at safety and William Poole at star. Jackson rolled up 40 tackles and blocked a punt, while Poole picked up 14 tackles. Tykee Smith, a 2020 All-American sidelined by injuries last season, will factor into the secondary rotation as he returns. Kamari Lassiter was a reserve in all 15 games a year ago with 11 tackles and an interception. Javon Bullard saw action in 14 contests with 12 stops. David Daniel-Sisavanh and Nyland Green gained valuable experience as backups. Early enrollees Malaki Starks, JaCorey Thomas, and Daylen Everette got experience in the Spring and should contribute as freshmen. Georgia additionally has Drew Southern, Patrick Taylor and Payton Bowles.

SPECIALISTS

Kicker Jack Podlesny was the Bulldogs' leading scorer a year ago with 137 points. He converted 71-of-72 extra points and 22-of-27 field goals. Georgia also returns Jared Zirkel and Matthew Sumlin at kicker. To replace punter, holder, and kickoff specialist Jake Camarda, the Bulldogs will take a look at early enrollee Brett Thorson of Australia, Noah Jones, and Sumlin. Snappers Payne Walker (placement kicks) and William Mote (punts) are back, along with Jonathan Washburn. McIntosh and Jackson have experience as kickoff returners, while Jackson, McConkey, and Blaylock have experience as punt returners.

JUST ANOTHER DAY FOR BULLDOG MASCOT



ere in late summer when Nolan Sental Smith, Georgia's multipurposed linebacker, returned home for a promotion for the Boys and Girls Club, he was introduced to Uga X, the Georgia mascot, widely proclaimed by Sports Illustrated as the No. 1 mascot in the nation.

Although the accomplished linebacker—one distinguished in the classroom as well as in competition—was familiar with the heralded mascot, he had never spent time with the all-white male English bulldog which the Frank Wilkins Seiler family has maintained and coddled for well over a half century. He had never enjoyed a closeup and personal experience with Uga. He quickly inquired as to how he might someday own a descendant of Uga. He even had his photo made with "Q."

Nolan's reaction to the Uga scene was comparable to what he experienced in the Florida game last fall when he literally stole the ball from the Gator quarterback, which led to a touchdown late in the second quarter and intercepted a pass among other defensive maneuvers that have become standard with him and brought about one of the best linebacking reputations in college football.

While Nolan had seen Uga on the field and had been in near proximity to the most famous bulldog in the land during games, he never had linked up with the mascot for a photo op on Savannah turf. Nolan was full of questions for Charles Seiler, Uga's keeper.

Nolan's infatuation with and curiosity about Uga did not surprise Charles who, like his father, Sonny, has seen a similar reaction for years. The proud and handsome Uga line could have only become what it has become were it not for the Seiler family.

No family pet in the country has ever been given such tender loving care. He has a spacious back yard to romp and roam. He sleeps in air-conditioned comfort, and he has a generous diet which is organized by Charles and Wendy Seiler with Uga's health in mind.

When something needs fixing with his 62-pound body, the University of Georgia College of Veterinary Medicine provides the best expertise there is to ensure that Uga is the best cared for live mascot in the country. His health is of the highest priority for the Vet school and, of course, the Seiler family.

I have known all the Uga's from Uga I right on down to current Uga X who is getting long in the tooth. He still has plenty of showcase verve and fan appeal left, but it is easy to forecast his retirement since he is nine years old, which makes him a senior citizen in the canine kingdom.

Uga has achieved widespread fame as Georgia's mascot. When Clint Eastwood came to Savannah to produce the movie, "Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil," he told Uga, "I'm going to make you a star." Cecilia Seiler, Charles' late mother promptly said to the famous actor, "Oh Mr. Eastwood, he is already a star."

Uga has achieved widespread fame as Georgia's mascot with Uga X the latest to add a national championship to his legacy.

From the halls of Congress to the Heisman trophy presentation to the Rose Bowl to the St. Patrick's Day parade in Savannah, Uga has seen and done it all and will be at his smiling best when he leads the Georgia Bulldogs into action this fall in Georgia's defense of the national championship.

In Cassie Wright's gifted lens, you notice in the background a photo on the wall of Uga IV lunging at the Auburn receiver who taunted Uga after scoring a touchdown in 1996 at Auburn, the year of the first overtime game in SEC history.

The wall photo was taken by a female photographer who was on assignment from the Montgomery Advertiser. She captured Uga's intent and Robert Baker's fright perfectly which caused a flood of orders of the print. In those pre-digital days, the requests for the photo were so voluminous that that the negative wore slap out.

This prompted Sonny Seiler, when that factoid was disclosed, to wonder aloud, "I'm a little surprised that so many Georgia people would want that photo."

The photographer exclaimed, "Oh Mr. Seiler, it was the Alabama people."

GARY STOKAN: A BUSINESS TITAN IN ATLANTA

ith the Bulldogs and the Ducks preparing for the Kickoff Classic to start their 2022 season, there is the reminder that we can never overstate the importance of the genius of the man behind the concept.

Gary Stokan, Peach Bowl, Inc., CEO and president since 1998, has enabled Georgia's capital city and event organizers to proclaim that Atlanta is the capital of the football world.

While there may be someone to take exception to that notion, it is a fact that much of what the Atlanta sports scene is today was brought about by the vision and leadership of Stokan, who has often needed to be a juggler to manage the multiple hats he wears during the course of the year and has worn throughout his accomplished career.

He has been around and can get things done as well as anybody who has ever called Atlanta home. As a kid growing up in Pittsburgh during safe inner-city times of the sixties, he had the good fortune of living on a hill with a park at the bottom of the neighborhood. He played there in the afternoons after school. In summer, he left following breakfast and did return home until his mother sent for him at suppertime: Football, basketball, and baseball. Whatever was in season. That is where he developed a requited love with sports that would endure.

While he was enraptured with all sports, basketball became his ticket to a college scholarship via a walk-on opportunity at N. C. State, and, more importantly, a degree in business management. Initially, he planned to coach and teach, but was bothered by some of the things he saw going on in basketball recruiting. He chose a different career path.

This is a man who at the age of 24 was negotiating shoe contracts with basketball royalty: Larry Bird, Magic Johnson, and Michel Jordan. At age 29, he represented Converse when the company signed Johnson and Bird in the same year for \$500,000 each but had moved on to Adidas which had a superior product, its triple striped shoes, but not enough resources to close a deal with Jordan. Nike, facing bankruptcy, gambled on Jordan whose "Air Jordan" brand sold 126 million pairs of shoes his rookie year, 1986, which made him and Phil Knight instant multi-millionaires.

Stokan had sent a package, worth \$2.5 million, that was acceptable to Jordan, to Germany, but Adidas brass responded that they did not have that kind of money to invest in foreign athletes. Only if the German brass had had an executive with the vision of its rookie salesman. Phil Knight wrote in his book that Nike was hurting financially to the extent that he was having trouble finding a bank to fund the growth of his young company.

Knight rolled the dice and gave Jordan his own brand which not only ushered Jordan to extraordinary wealth, but that move likely kept his company from insolvency. Nobody ever hit the lottery like Phil Knight when he made Jordan a partner.

When it comes to business, conservatism has its place. You can't give the store away. On the other hand, bold decisions and creative thinking can enlarge and enhance the coffers. It is obvious that Phil Knight didn't care if Michael Jordan made as many millions as he did.



The sporting goods arena was a fruitful experience for Stokan, getting to know coaches and athletes who found his gentlemanly manner, integrity, and square dealing refreshing. There is something else that sets Stokan apart. He has an indefatigable work ethic. In his early days at Converse, he was given to sleeping in his office. He would work past midnight into the wee hours, nap on a cot briefly, arise and take a shower which enabled him to get a couple of hours of uninterrupted work completed before his staff arrived.

This is what has happened on Stokan's watch since 1999: Under his management, Peach Bowl, Inc. events have generated an economic impact of \$1.29 billion and \$79.34 million in direct government tax revenue for the city of Atlanta and the state of Georgia; positioned the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl as one of the best bowl game organizations in the country, making the game one of the New Year's Six Bowl games in the College Football Playoff (CFP) including serving as host of CFP semifinal games in 2022 (and will again in 2025); inked contracts with Mercedes-Benz Stadium though 2025 with Chick-fil-A to continue its title sponsorship of both the bowl and the Kickoff Classic.

The Chick-fil-A Bowl has experienced sellouts in 23 or the past 25 years and has distributed \$281 million in team payouts and has seen the bowl donate a record \$58.8 million to charity since 2002. In 2019, Peach Bowl, Inc. donated a record \$20 million to Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, creating the Peach Bowl LegACy [sic] Fund to find cures for childhood cancer.

It was Stokan who originated the Kickoff Classic,

which has capitalized on the football passion in the Southeast, matching top teams to start the football season which quickly got network attention. With schools, such as Alabama and Georgia, playing brand named teams to begin the season, it has brought healthy ratings as opposed to traditional openers with no-name directional schools and depressing ratings.

The 2022 College Football Playoff semifinal game at the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 31 is already sold out. It has the distinction of being the quickest sellout since the College Football Playoff was created. Also, it was announced this August that Atlanta will now be the host city for the 2025 CFP National Championship Game (2024 season) after Las Vegas could no longer serve as the site. The title game will be on Jan. 6, and Atlanta joins Miami as the only two cities to host two title games during the CFP's original 12-year contract.

By the time of the Georgia-Oregon kickoff, it is likely that he will have generated another idea or initiative that will enhance the sports financial health of Atlanta and the state to say nothing of the acclaim that supports the notion that Atlanta is truly the football capital of the world.

GETTING TO KNOW MIKE WHITE

ays before Mike White took his final exam as an Ole Miss undergrad, the former Rebels men's basketball point guard, a four-year starter, got his first job in coaching, at mid-major Jacksonville State. It wasn't a glamour job at a blue-blood program, but it was a start.

From 2003-04, White worked with and learned under Michael LaPlante. From there, White went back to his alma mater as an assistant from 2004-11, before getting his first head-coaching position, in 2011, at Louisiana Tech. Then came a long run at Florida, from 2015-22.

In March, White was hired as the Bulldogs' new coach. Between building his staff and spending endless hours recruiting, White hasn't had a ton of

time to get to know the Athens area, but he very much likes what he's seen so far. During a Quick Chat in August, White talked about exploring his new home, what kind of player he was, his start in coaching, and much more.

You'd obviously been to Athens several times before, as a player and a coach, but did you have much of a feel for it before taking the Georgia job?

White: The past seven years playing here (as Florida's coach), and of course the time we played here when I was at Louisiana Tech, but also the times that we played here as a player and an assistant at Ole Miss, each one of those stops was one night — shootaround, pregame meal, game, and get out.

What has it been like to get to know a new place, one of the great college towns in America?

White: It's been incredible. I've been to a lot of great college towns, and I've lived in some great college towns, considering what my father did for a living while raising us. [White's father, Kevin, worked in athletics administration for many years, including as athletic director at Notre Dame and Duke.] There's not a better college town in the country, there's just not, that I know of.

There's the great downtown area, the surrounding areas are beautiful, and you can feel the support and pride of Bulldog Nation while you're in Athens. It's very evident why so many people are so excited about being here.

How would you describe yourself as a player?

White: I was playing football on the basketball court. I was very much a role guy - pass to the good players and get out of there. I fouled a bunch and hoped that they wouldn't call a lot; I knew I was limited, and I certainly maxed out as a player. [White started 109 of 117 games at Ole Miss, averaging 5.1 points and 3.2 assists per game.]

For me, in college, it was about winning. It was



about, how can I help Ole Miss be the best program and the best team that we can be. And we had a really good formula and a high level of basketball character and connection, and we did some special things there. But I certainly knew that I was very much a role player.

I looked it up and you had seven career blocks. White: That's hilarious.

Is there one that you actually remember?

White: No, I can't imagine that those were tallied correctly. I don't remember any of them [laughs].

Basketball in the NBA has evolved so much over the last decade or so, with the emphasis on analytics and the 3-point shot. How much of that is trickling down to the college game? And what is it like being a coach amid all the changes?

White: I think certain coaches will flaunt how analytically driven that they are, but we're all into it. We all want layups and 3s. How do you get layups and 3s? That's the real question.

The game has certainly evolved; if I could credit one organization with that level of how much the game has changed, at least offensively, it would be Golden State and what they've accomplished and how they've played over the last decade. We've tried to emulate a lot of that stuff over the last few years, and we'll continue to do so, as well as some things other NBA organizations are doing. It's a new brand: a higher skill level, a lot of times five guys being beyond the arc that can shoot it, more skilled 5s, of course, and less calls and more continuity, less sets, and more concepts.

The game continues to evolve, and I think it's made for more exciting games to watch. We're all stealing as coaches and we're trying to steal from that level as much as anywhere else.

J. Reid Parker Director of Athletics Josh Brooks along with UGA President Jere W. Morehead introduced Mike White as the new Georgia basketball coach this past March in a public event at Stegeman Coliseum.

Did you always know you wanted to get into coaching?

White: I figured it out late. I've said this a few times, it was on the bus my senior year, coming back from a road game. I realized that time was running out and I was going to give it a shot, to play professionally, while also realizing that it was going to be very difficult for me to be an NBA guy.

I just thought at that point, when the ball stops bouncing for me, what else do I know? I'd poured so many hours and years into this game, and I just couldn't see myself leaving the game. And that's what happened.

I was cut three times in the next few months, twice by the same organization in Albuquerque (N.M.), called the New Mexico Slam, and once by a team in England. I begged my way back into Ole Miss with two classes left to finish, and I returned in the spring of 2000 to get my undergraduate degree in general business.

I realized that as soon as I got my diploma I was going to get into coaching. ... Michael LaPlante was at Auburn as Cliff Ellis' right hand, and he got the Jacksonville State job. He called me and offered me the job over the phone, and I said, "I have one more exam on Friday, is it OK if I drive over on Saturday?" And I met him in the office at Jacksonville State on Saturday afternoon.

I remember, we had an unofficial visit on campus that day and we literally walked around campus. It was me, Mike, and the recruit, and it was the first time any of us had seen it. And the rest is history.





GETTING TO KNOW KEIDANE McALPINE

eidane McAlpine thought that he would get into the music business after wrapping up his soccer career at Birmingham-Southern. Instead, he found his calling coaching the sport he loves so much.

McAlpine, from Huntsville, Ala., was hired as Georgia's new women's soccer coach in December, coming to Athens from Southern California, where the 2021 Pac-12 Coach of the Year had a stellar eight-season run coaching the Trojans, highlighted by the 2016 national championship.

McAlpine and the Bulldogs will make their 2022 debut against Georgia Southern at the Turner Soccer Complex on Aug. 18. This follows a pair of exhibition wins over Duke and Furman in Athens.

During a recent Quick Chat, McAlpine talked about his days as a player, his start in coaching, his interest in music, and much more. Here's some of what he had to say:

How did you first get started in soccer? Did you play a bunch of different sports when you were young?

McAlpine: This was always my No. 1. My dad saw Pele play in New York and was like, Man, that's a pretty cool game. He started rolling the ball out to me when I was little, about 4 or 5, and I started playing. This was always my No. 1 sport and I never wavered. I played some baseball, basketball, I even wrestled a year in high school just to get a letter [laughs]. They needed someone in my weight class.

Back when I was writing about high school sports for newspapers, I developed so much respect for those

McAlpine: The longest 6 minutes of your life.

Did that wrestling experience help you as an athlete or a coach?

McAlpine: I do think there's a level of appreciation of the mano-y-mano, person-versus-person element. It doesn't matter how strong I am, what matters is my technique, my recognition, how shifty I am. For me, it was a lot like soccer; it was chess game, a battle of skills, a battle of wits. But then if a 140 (pounder) came down to a 112, it was a problem [laughs]. But you could still find your way and get a point here, a point there, but there were times where at the end of the day you just have to say, "You're better than me."





How would you describe yourself as a soccer player?

McAlpine: I grew up with a lot of Caribbean coaches, African coaches, and so it was all individual technique, and I thought I was pretty good individually. But as I grew up, I'll never forget, in my freshman year, I called my club coach and I was frustrated because I couldn't show the things that I liked to do. And he reminded me that as good as I was as a player technically, I was much smarter as a team person. ...I always felt like I was determined, passionate, skilled enough, and then I was fast, even though I was small [laughs].

When did you know that coaching was what you wanted to do? I saw that you majored in music business, which is a long way from coaching.

McAlpine: I thought I was going to be living in Atlanta and working in the music industry. When I finished (at Birmingham-Southern), I tried to go play professionally. I went to Germany and tried out for some teams, tried out for the (Atlanta) Silverbacks - I actually had a great tryout for the Silverbacks. I played really well, scored a couple of goals, but they didn't need me.

I went back home and my mom told me I had to coach my little sister's team. I was trying to go back to school at the time, so I was taking some classes on the side and coaching. That's when (associate head coach Jason Lockhart) and I started coaching together — we grew up together — and he was coaching a boys team and I was coaching my little sister's, and we were each other's assistants.

While I was still in school, the women's program started (at Birmingham-Southern). When I called the coach (Lorrin Etka-Shepherd) about getting a game for my little sister's team, she was like, "I've got a job for you." I commuted back and forth that year, and that was the beginning. ... She retired a couple of years later and I took over, and I've been running

It's not often you hear about someone that finds themselves in coaching without really planning on it.

McAlpine: I'm a big believer that you prepare for a lot of things and you put yourself in some decent places. And the doors that open might be trying to tell you something. These doors just kept opening.

What's something you could eat every day and never get tired of it?

McAlpine: I'm the wrong person to ask that question to because I'm a creature of habit. I could eat oatmeal every day and love it. It's not the flashy thing, but it's good, it's quick, I can eat it and keep moving.

Do you still play music?

McAlpine: I was more a singer at the time and did all of the choir things and whatnot. I did get a piano to try to get back to it, and the girls have been messing with me because one of my hobbies is I was salsa dancing at the time. I haven't found my place here yet, I've been running around too much, but it's something else to do.


I grew up in an arts magnet school and all of that stuff is fun to me.

Has the team heard you sing?

McAlpine: I gave that up a long time ago. That won't be a thing they hear any time soon [laughs].

What's the best concert you've ever seen?

McAlpine: Oh, man, the Jackson 5 reunion tour. My mom took me when I was a kid. It was unbelievable. And now, being able to appreciate it when I'm older, that I saw that man (Michael Jackson) perform, that was the best.

REMEMBERING BOB HARRISON

n one's lifetime, many interesting people come your way, and for those who are especial, there are many positive adjectives that define them. Perhaps, the most resounding trait for the good men you come to know is that they are genuine.

There are plusses and minuses in the makeup of all mortals, but when a man is truly genuine, that is, perhaps, the quality that is most defining. Genuine men are good men. Genuine men are honest men. Genuine men are giving and forgiving. Genuine men are selfless and moved to extend a helping hand.

Bob Harrison, the longtime Bulldog assistant coach who ended his career as a scout with the Atlanta Falcons, was all the above and more. Dating back to the fifties, I have observed many Georgia assistant coaches ply their trade and can remember those who were extraordinary and a few who left no memory of consequence.

That genuineness which characterized Bob Harrison, who died this past April, enabled him to teach kids the classic rudiments of the game of football, but perhaps it paid off more consequentially when he went on the road recruiting. Two noteworthy examples of that came with visits with two former players who likely would not have enrolled at Georgia had they not been recruited by Harrison, who gave priority to getting to know them and their families.

With an annual trip to New York when Rodney Hampton played for the Giants, I would find my way to Hampton's locker after practices and games. He volunteered that Harrison's straight talk and honest demeanor gave him confidence that he would enjoy a running back opportunity without any issues if he signed with UGA.


In 1987, Hampton gained 227 yards on 34 carries against Ole Miss in Oxford and caught two passes, including one for a touchdown leading the Bulldogs to a 31-14 victory. Ole Miss fought hard, but Hampton was the difference. In the locker room following the game, someone commented about the turning point in the game which prompted Coach Vince Dooley to note that the turning point came "when Coach Harrison signed Hampton."

Following his NFL career, Andre Hastings settled in Phoenix, and I met him at his upscale condominium one sunny afternoon in late February. The conversation was a pleasant as the weather. As soon as I turned on my tape recorder, Hastings wanted to know if I ever saw Harrison. An affirmative response brought about a lengthy tribute—heartfelt emotion from player to coach—as genuine as the finest Italian leather.

At one point, Hastings dropped his head momentarily in reverential tribute to the man whose sage advice and friendship had meant much to him in his transcendent years—from high school to college.

Harrison had an insightful perspective about the game he loved. He was a prescient coach whose analytical ability served him well wherever he coached. For example, he, with a wide exposure, enjoyed the beauty and big play value of the passing game, but knew the significance of being able to run the football.

His opinion of Vince Dooley and Dooley's affection for running the football was abundantly positive. It was a sound, fundamental concept that featured many plusses, most of all that there was minimal risk and



Dooley ball never created stress for the defense.

"It doesn't matter if you underscore the run or the pass," Harrison once said. "What matters is that you give priority to the fundamentals of the game." Most of all, he appreciated Dooley's character. If the former Bulldog head coach gave you his word, you could take it to the bank.

For years, I sat by Harrison in the Sanford Stadium press box for Bulldog home games. He was as measured in conversation as a seasoned professor whose expertise had been honed and practiced for a career. Harrison's economy of words, his succinct analysis reflected studied preparation and attention to detail. He appreciated the percentages of the game of football—

he never would have identified with a riverboat gambler when game planning.

His memory will always bring about a lift in emotions when I think of him. His football credentials were exceptional and so was his treatment of the players who came his way.

Bob Harrison was a good man who did right by others because he quietly preached what he practiced.

THE FINAL WORD: JACK BAUERLE

or most of his life, Jack Bauerle has gotten up early, well before dawn, and headed to the pool. A driven and determined swimmer, Bauerle became a legendary coach by mixing that drive and determination with his passion for working with talented and motivated people and his deep love for the University

On June 8, Bauerle, Georgia's women's swimming and diving head coach since 1979 and the men's coach since 1983, the longest-tenured coach of any sport in the SEC, retired. During his storied career, Bauerle guided the Georgia women's program to seven NCAA team titles, produced dozens of individual men's and women's NCAA champions and Olympians, and was the head coach of the 2008 U.S. Olympic women's team. During a recent Q&A, Bauerle said he was still waking up really early, but now he could roll over and get some more sleep if he wanted.

Bauerle, a Philadelphia-area native, came to Georgia in the fall of 1970. By the time he was done swimming, he had set school records in the 200-yard butterfly and the 1,650 freestyle. He'd also fallen head over heals in love with UGA and Athens, and that love has only grown stronger in the decades that have followed. As he said in this interview, Georgia is the place that gave him his life.

One of the most accomplished and beloved coaches in Georgia history, Bauerle sat down for one last Quick Chat in July of 2022, or Final Word, to discuss his plans for the future, his appreciation for the past, and

the best moments from his time as a Bulldog. Here's some of what he had to say:

What have the final few weeks been like?

Bauerle: Great [laughs]. I can't stop thinking about the swimmers and I was involved in the practices for Luca (Urlando) and Chase (Kalisz) while they were over in Budapest (for the world championships), and that didn't stop until three or four days ago.

I think more than anything else, for the first time in my life I don't feel like I'm rushing around. I was involved in a sport that revolves around a clock and I was tied to one also. Up at 4:30 or 5 every morning for 40-plus years, and then when you do that, you can't really sleep at all when you can. On a Sunday I was usually up at 5:30 or 6.

I'm still waking up pretty early but I'm just taking it easy, spending time at the house with (wife) Leigh Ann, (son) Duke, and I don't have to rush off. It's pretty cool.

Are you rolling over until 6 or do you still get up?

Bauerle: The last week I've gotten better about going back to bed for another 30 minutes or something. I imagine it will be a while before I'm really sleeping in — I've never needed much sleep; I probably needed it, I just didn't get it.

The neat thing is, I've already done a couple of things that I haven't done. I've taken time to see a couple of people that I haven't seen, that I should have seen, and I have a lot of things booked already. I'm going to be an officiant for Shannon Vreeland, she's getting married — another gold medalist — and that's an honor, a terrific honor. I knew I could say yes to it, when she asked,

because I knew this was forthcoming. That's important to me, to be able to do that for a former athlete — it's one of my greatest honors.

I've got some things in the book: I've got some pheasant hunting; I've got a surf trip to Costa Rica; I've got to do some therapy on my knee replacements to get some more range of motion. I'm also definitely in the books for the Army-Navy game at West Point next year. And I'm going fishing on the Snake River out in Idaho, as well as a hunting trip down in the bayou (in Louisiana).

Leigh Ann and I are also now in the planning stage of taking a safari next summer.

Is there anything you've said no to at this point? It sounds like you've said yes to a heck of a lot already.

Bauerle: I've said yes to everything so far, and anything else that comes up, I'll probably say yes to that, too.

Is there anything that you were scared of as it relates to retiring?

Bauerle: No, not at all. I have a lot of stuff I want to do — it's piling up, actually. There are places I want to go and many things I want to see with Leigh Ann and the boys. I want to sit in on some classes here, because I

could have done a better job when I was here as an undergrad [laughs]. I'll probably pay attention more now.

The only thing I was afraid of, I guess, I just know I'm going to miss being with the swimmers. Do they keep you young? Yes, they do. Seeing them in the mornings, there's a real strong connection after you spend that much time together. Not coaching them, that's the hardest part.

When you got to Athens as a freshman, what did you think your future would look like? Did you have any idea of what you wanted to do after college?

Bauerle: It's funny, and I don't think I was in any way unique: I think a lot of us went to school back then not having any idea. We just went to school. ... I didn't give it one thought. I was going day-to-day and the first time I gave it any thought was probably my junior year, and that's because of my two English professors that I really liked. They started guiding me. And my fifth year, when I was finishing school, I was asked to coach.

I had a whole group to work with and I was thrust in like a full-time assistant, but I was called a fifth-year guy. I started coaching and I though, OK, I think I can do this and maybe teach English somewhere at a prep school. That's about as close I got to it.

Is there one moment that stands out above all others? Is there one collegiate moment and one Olympic or international moment?

Bauerle: One college moment would be my last race. It didn't turn out as well as I would have liked, and I never really swam as well as I did my freshman and sophomore years, when I swam for John Stafford. I wasn't that talented, and I had to work harder than most, and John worked me harder than most. And I loved it.

That sticks out, that disappointment, and that's maybe not a bad thing. I think sometimes that helps you as a coach.

On the coaching side, two things stand out — equally important but very, very different. I was by myself in 2000 at Sydney and I borrowed a phone to call my mom and Coach Dooley. That was a proud moment because we had five women that made that Olympic team, and that was my first Olympic appointment (as an assistant coach).

That was a dream come true, but the year before that (when Georgia hosted the 1999 NCAA Championships), when I look up in the stands and I see my mom sitting with Coach Dooley and Coach Magill and Dick Shoulberg, who was my mentor at Germantown Academy, an Olympic coach himself. And then we won the national championship.

I think that might have been the best night of my life. Everyone I wanted to please was there. To be a part of a national championship for Georgia, when back in the 1970s and '80s and even the early '90s was considered not even possible, that night sticks out big time.

The other one was really recent, when Chase (Kalisz) and Jay (Litherland) won gold and silver (in the 400-meter individual medley) at the Tokyo Olympics last year. I've got to tell you, I don't remember anything for five or six hours after that. ... As many years as I have



coached, I was not prepared for that. I've had elation but that was on a level that I have never experienced — and I don't remember hardly a thing. Nothing prepared me for that.

Did you consider retiring right after that?

Bauerle: Yes. I just felt it was untimely to do that because it was August when I was coming back. I thought it was important to do another year, for sure. It was fun, I had a fun year, and it was a better way to do it.

I wasn't burned out on coaching, I'm not burned out on it at all, but for the first time in my life I just feel like I need more time to be with those I love. That's it. No matter what you say, that's what it all comes down to.

The Bulldogs finished eighth at the 2022 NCAA Championships, highlighted by freshman Matthew Sates winning the 500 freestyle and sophomore Luca Urlando's American Record in the 100 backstroke. Eight Bulldogs combinesd to earn 25 All-America citations, as well as post nine school records.

You've had one heck of a career. Congratulations, and I hope you have a blast in retirement.

Bauerle: The best thing you can ever hear — when I announced the retirement, the one phrase that rang loud and clear, and the one I heard most often, was "Thanks for doing a good job." And, truly, that's the best thing I could have ever heard. That's all I wanted, hearing that you did a good job at the place that gave you your life.





GETTING TO KNOW KATIE ABRAHAMSON-HENDERSON

he last time Katie Abrahamson-Henderson lived in Athens, back in the mid-1980s, the food options in town were nothing compared to the high-quality and sometimes high-end cuisine found in abundance in

The food is just one of the many things different this time around for Abrahamson-Henderson, who prefers "Coach ABE" and who on March 26 became the Georgia women's basketball head coach. Coach ABE played her first two collegiate seasons for the Lady Bulldogs, learning under Hall of Famer Andy Landers and playing alongside two Hall of Famers in Teresa Edwards and Katrina McClain.

Coach ABE went home to Iowa for her final two years of college before jumping into a coaching career that has been successful at every stop. She came back to Athens after five years at UCF in Orlando, where her teams went 131-49 and this March they produced the program's highest ever NCAA tournament seed, No. 7, and UCF's first NCAA tourney victory.

Now, after more than 35 years away, Coach ABE is back. She's getting to know her new team, which includes several returning players and numerous transfers, including several from UCF. Georgia will also have several freshmen this season, including Savannah Henderson, daughter of Coach ABE and her husband, Michael, a former Harlem Globetrotter who now is a Division I women's basketball official. And no, he's not allowed to work Georgia games.

During a recent Quick Chat, Coach ABE talked about being back in Athens, playing alongside two stars and Olympians in Edwards and McClain, recruiting, and coaching her daughter, and much more. Here's some of what she had to say:

Athens is a very different place from when you last lived here, in the 1980s, so what is it like being

Coach ABE: You assume I've been here - we've been recruiting. April, May, June was kind of a down time, and now July, it's like back-and-forth, back-and-forth.

What I notice them most is the restaurants, there are a lot of good restaurants here. I was 18, I don't remember half the stuff back then, but now, the restaurants, there are a lot of really cool not-chain restaurants. We love that - we found some really good Italian places, we found some Thai places, we found some really cool soul food places. There are a lot of really cool places to eat.

Is there one that's become your favorite?

Coach ABE: No because I'll get in trouble [laughs]. They're all good; everyone's good.

We're kind of boujee, our coaches, and we like to eat at boujee places — boujee meaning sophisticated, like nice, very good restaurants. Obviously, some of them are a little bit more expensive, but (assistant coach) Nykesha Sales, she's the foodie and she always finds the really good places to eat and dine. She always finds the best places to eat.

When you think back to your days as a Georgia player, is there one moment that stands out above the rest?

Coach ABE: There are two things. The first thing is, Teresa Edwards - well, there's two things with Teresa Edwards. When I came in as a freshman, I was a hotshot, I thought I was really good. I played the 4 and 5 in high school, clearly, and Andy Landers wanted me to play the 3. I was running in transition and she's coming down, she comes to the foul line, jump-stopping, looks over there and throws it to me. And it bounces off my hands.

She was like, "Yo, freshman, you better catch my passes." And I'm like, "OK." After that, I came down and I think I missed it again, and she gave me a look. The next time, she started throwing it at my face. I'm like, "I'm catching it!" And she's like, "You better catch it."

The second thing is, Andy made me play denial defense against the whole team, because I guess my defense stunk when I was a freshman. I could deny and get backdoor and deny and get backdoor, and here comes Teresa Edwards, and I can't get her, I can't do it, and she's scoring. Andy's like, "You can't guard her?" In my head, and I should have never said it, I'm like, "It's Teresa Edwards! She's the best player in the world, of course I can't guard her."

And then I remember Katrina McClain running the wing and catching it. I could throw that thing anywhere, and she'd catch it. Her hands, her agility, and the way she'd catch the ball and finish, I loved it.

Being a really good coach in 2022, is that different from being a really good coach when you were playing for Andy? It just seems like there are so many more parts to the job now beyond coaching the players on the court.

Coach ABE: Media, that's a little bit more. I think now with the (transfer) portal, it's shifted us all. For me and my staff, we have never had a lot of people transfer. The way we run our program is, family first, academics second and then basketball. They love us and they love my staff. Now, with the portal, in terms of recruiting younger players, if we don't get a freshman, someone we want in those classes, we just go into the portal — and that's a whole different

It's different; it's good, it helped us out this year big time, getting some high-level kids. It really helped us, and I can't imagine coming in here and there was no portal. I think that really is the difference in college athletics right now.

When you sign your daughter, do you have to give some thought to how you're going to coach her? Or do you intentionally not think about it because you can't treat her any different from the other players?

Coach ABE: Well, I'm different, because I'm a different person on and off the court. Honestly, when Savannah decided to come UCF (before following her mom to Georgia), we went through the whole recruiting process. This was COVID time, so we did a home visit, and I went in the other room and my husband and her were in another room, and my coaches were at their houses, and we did a (virtual) home visit pre-

She met with some of the administrators at UCF on that and she called me in one day and said she wanted to commit. I was like, "Oh, my God!" because she had a bunch of people recruiting her. She made a decision because of all the right reasons, and I was supportive, I was the mom at that time. I was like, "I want you to be happy. I don't want you to play for me because you feel pressure to play for me." My whole staff has been with me for years and that's her family, too.

What do you do to get away from basketball and give your mind a break?

Coach ABE: I work out, I spend time with my kids — we'll go to movies, we'll go shopping. I spend time with my husband — we'll go to dinner; we were playing golf a lot where I was and now, I've got to figure out where the golf stuff is. I think my clubs are back in Orlando. We do just typical, normal hangout stuff.

The big thing for me is to work out. I came in today and I was exhausted, so I was like, I've got to go work out. It helps me, mentally.

RECORD 15 BULLDOGS SELECTED IN THE 2022 NFL DRAFT

he University of Georgia established a benchmark for one school in the NFL Draft as the national champions saw 15 selected during this year's event at the Linq Promenade in Las Vegas.

Highlighted by defensive lineman Travon Walker going first overall to the Jacksonville Jaguars, the Bulldogs saw a program-record five players selected in the first round this past April. Then, four more Bulldogs were taken during day two coupled with six more players on the final day gave the Bulldogs a record for most players chosen in the seven-round era (since 1994) with 15. The prior record was 14 by LSU in 2020, while the previous school record was nine players selected in 2021.

After Walker's selection, defensive lineman Jordan Davis was selected 13th overall by the Philadelphia Eagles, followed by linebacker Quay Walker and defensive lineman Devonte Wyatt both being chosen by the Green Bay Packers with the 22nd and 29th picks. The selections closed with safety Lewis Cine going to the Minnesota Vikings with the 32nd pick. The selection of five defensive players in the opening round broke a record set by Miami in 2004 and Florida State in 2006.

The five players chosen led all schools in the first round and broke the previous program record of three selected in 2018 (Roquan Smith, Isaiah Wynn, Sony Michel). With Walker, Davis, and Wyatt being selected,


Georgia joined Clemson in 2019 as the only program to have three defensive linemen selected in the same first round in the Common Draft Era (1967-present).

Walker became the fifth Georgia football player to be selected first overall in the NFL Draft and the first since Matthew Stafford was picked first by the Detroit Lions in 2009. With the pick, Georgia tied Notre Dame, Oklahoma, and USC for the most first-overall picks by one institution at five. It is also the earliest selection for a Georgia defensive player in the Common Draft Era, besting the No. 6 picks previously used on Richard Seymour (2001) and Johnathan Sullivan (2003).

The Thomaston native started at defensive tackle in all 15 games last season for the Bulldogs, tallying 37 total tackles, six sacks, 7.5 tackles for loss, and a team-high 36 quarterback hurries. Walker closed out his Georgia tenure with a career-best seven pressures in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game against Alabama.

Davis, the Outland Trophy and Bednarik Award winner, started 14 games for the Bulldogs in 2021, racking up 32 tackles, 5.5 stops for loss, and two sacks. The Charlotte, North Carolina native also scored a rushing touchdown in the home finale against Charleston Southern. Among his many plaudits in his senior campaign, he was named to the First Team All-SEC and was a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Lott IMPACT Trophy.

Walker started all 15 games in 2021, finishing the season with 67 tackles and 5.5 tackles for loss. In the national title game, the Cordele native led the Bulldogs with eight tackles, along with six quarterback pressures. During the regular season, he notched 13 tackles against Florida and nine against Kentucky. In his junior season, he helped lead the Bulldog defense against Cincinnati in the Peach Bowl with seven tackles and a key fourth-quarter sack.

Wyatt, a First Team All-SEC selection by the league's coaches, started in 14 games last season, leading all interior linemen with 39 tackles. The Decatur native earned SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week honors following a six-tackle performance against Arkansas, adding in 1.5 sacks and three pressures. He also stifled Kentucky with a blocked field goal to close out the third quarter.

By selecting Walker and Wyatt, Green Bay has selected three consecutive Georgia players in the first round, following the pick of defensive back Eric Stokes last year.

Cine, a First Team All-SEC selection by the Associated Press, led the Bulldogs last season with 73 tackles and nine pass breakups. The Cedar Hill, Texas native was named Defensive MVP of the national championship with seven tackles and a breakup. In the season-opening victory over Clemson, Cine led the team with nine tackles.

The Bulldogs had four more team members taken during the second and third rounds.

Receiver George Pickens was taken by the Pittsburgh Steelers with the 20th pick of the second round (52ndpick overall). James Cook was then taken by the Buffalo Bills with the 31st pick of the second round (63rd pick overall). The next Georgia player taken was linebacker Nakobe Dean, by the Philadelphia Eagles with the 19th pick of the third round (83rd overall). The final Bulldog selected on day two was fellow linebacker Channing Tindall, by the Miami Dolphins with the 38th pick of the third round (102nd overall

Pickens bounced back from an ACL injury in March 2021 to play in the Bulldogs' final four games during the team's run to this past season's national championship. Highlighted by 727 yards and eight touchdowns in 2019, Pickens finished his career with 1,347 yards and 14 scores, carrying an average of 15.0 yards/catch.

CFP HIGHLIGHTS FROM GEORGIA'S LATEST

2021 College Football Playoff national championship, a 2018 CFP title game appearance, 2017 Southeastern Conference Championship, four SEC Eastern Division titles, 66 wins and six bowl victories are more than respectable rewards over a six-year period. That's what Georgia got when it hired former Georgia player and Alabama defensive coordinator Kirby Smart to head the program in December of 2015.

His impact, along with a stellar coaching staff, players, and a passionate fan base has put Georgia on the national stage six years running.

2021 - His 2021 team became UGA's first national champion since 1980, the first since 1982 to go undefeated in the SEC regular season, a No. 1 national ranking by all the major polls and the first ever to win 14 games. It marked the fifth straight team to finish the regular season ranked in the top ten of the College Football Playoff rankings. The team set 21 school records, highlighted by the nation's top-ranked defense. The third-ranked

Bulldogs defeated #2 Michigan, 34-11, in the Capital One Orange Bowl in Miami and then No. 1 Alabama, 33-18, in the championship game in Indianapolis. The senior class also set the mark for most career wins by going 45-8. After the regular season, Smart was named SEC Coach of the Year for the second time in five years.

Georgia's championship season enjoyed a fitting exclamation mark at the 2022 NFL Draft. The Bulldogs set a Draft record with 15 players taken, including five defenders in the first round, led by the first overall selection, junior Travon Walker.

2020 - The 2020 Bulldogs became Smarr's fourth consecutive team to earn a New Year's Six bowl game appearance. With a Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl victory over undefeated Cincinnati on Jan. 1, 2021, the Bulldog seniors tied the record for the most wins by one class in school history (44).

2019 - Smart's 2019 Bulldogs became the first team in school history to win 11 or more games for a third straight season. Georgia defeated three teams in the final Top 15 CFP ranking — Notre

Dame, Florida, and Auburn — and finished fourth in the final polls. The Bulldogs capped their season with a dominant victory over Baylor in the Allstate Sugar Bowl game.

2018 -- Georgia in 2018 posted an 11-1 regular season record, a second straight SEC Eastern Division title, and a ranking as high as number four in the CFP poll. Georgia landed in the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019—the program's tenth all-time appearance in the New Orleans classic.

2017 -- Smart's second season in 2017 was a special one, with an 11-1 regular-season record, an SEC title, a win over Oklahoma in the Rose Bowl Game (CFP semifinal) and advancement into the CFP National Championship Game. It was the first conference title since 2005 for the Red and Black.

Both Smart and his players reaped the bounty of their banner 2017 season. He was named George Munger National Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club, SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and SEC Coaches, and the





Regional Coach of the Year by the AFCA. Roquan Smith earned first-team All-America honors and the Dick Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker.

2016 -- In Smart's first season leading the Bulldogs, Georgia made its 20th straight bowl appearance and posted four fourth-quarter comebacks, including wins over No. 8 Auburn and No. 22 UNC. He led the Bulldogs to an 8-5 final record, which included a victory over TCU in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Smart officially came home to Georgia on Dec. 6, 2015, but he had unfinished business as defensive coordinator at Alabama, which was still chasing a national title. He juggled two jobs for a month until Jan. 11, 2016, when the Crimson Tide won its fourth national championship in a 7-year span. Twelve hours later, he was at work in Athens, where he remains one of ten head coaches at schools from Power 5 leagues that are coaching at their alma maters.

Smart had served on the Alabama staff the previous nine years. During his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won three BCS National Championships, one CFP national title, three SEC crowns, six SEC West titles, and was ranked in the nation's final top 10 the last eight years in a row.

Smart was one of the nation's most respected defensive coordinators. During his time at Alabama, he coached players at three different positions,

in addition to his coordinating duties. He was recognized as the 2012 AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the 2009 Broyles Award winner as college football's top assistant.

Prior to joining the Alabama staff in 2007, Smart spent the 2006 season as safeties coach with the NFL's Miami Dolphins. He served six years on the collegiate level as the running backs coach at Georgia (2005), DBs coach at LSU (2004), grad assistant at Florida State (2002-03), defensive coordinator/LBs coach (2001) and DBs coach (2000) at Valdosta State, and administrative assistant at Georgia (1999).

Smart was the running backs coach for Georgia's 2005 SEC Championship team. His unit averaged 162.2 rushing yards per game, third in the SEC. He coached Thomas Brown, Danny Ware and Kregg Lumpkin — all future NFL players. In 2004 at LSU, he tutored two NFL draft picks: Corey Webster (2nd round, New York Giants) and Travis Daniels (4th round, Miami).

As a player, Smart was a four-year letterman at defensive back for Georgia, where he was a First-Team All-SEC pick as a senior. He finished his career with 13 interceptions, a mark that still ranks sixth in UGA annals, and paced the Bulldogs with six interceptions in 1997 and five in 1998. He led the SEC in interceptions during his final season. Smart also scored two points as a collegian. He was the first player in UGA history — and one of just two Bulldogs since the rule was introduced in 1988 - to return a blocked PAT for two points, having brought one back 88 yards against New Mexico State in his freshman year of 1995.

A four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Smart received his bachelor's degree in Finance from Georgia in 1998 and his master's in Physical Education from Florida State in 2003.

The Bainbridge, Ga., native is married to the former Mary Beth Lycett of McDonough, Ga.,

Kirby and Mary Beth Smart also oversee the Kirby Smart Family Foundation, which is focused on being champions in the community by supporting needy children and families facing adversity.

TODD MONKEN was named Offensive Coordinator at Georgia on January 17, 2020.

In just his second season, Monken was part of a 2021 staff led the Bulldogs to the College Football Playoff National Championship with 33-18 win over Alabama in the title game. GLENN SCHUMANN was named Co-Defensive Coordinator & Inside Linebackers coach at Georgia in February of 2019 after three seasons in charge of the Bulldogs' inside linebackers. He came to UGA after eight seasons at the University of Alabama, his last two serving as the Director of Player Development and Associate Director of Player Personnel.

Last season , Schumann 's defense set marks for Fewest Points Allowed (153, 1st nationally), Fewest Average Points Allowed (10.2, 1st nationally), and Interception TD's (4). Georgia also finished first nationally in Red Zone Defense, second nationally in Rushing Defense and Passing Efficiency Defense. The Bulldog defense surrendered only three rushing and 10 passing TD's all year.

During Schumann's tenure in Athens, in addition to the 2021 season, Georgia won 11 or more games in three straight seasons for the first time in program history (2017-19). The Bulldogs have also won four SEC Eastern Division titles (2017-19, 2021), earned four consecutive New Year's Six Bowl berths and played for the 2018 CFP national championship.





DELL McGEE was named Run Game Coordinator and Running Backs coach in 2019 after serving three years as running backs coach and one (2018) as assistant head coach.








RULE CHANGES FOR THE 2022 COLLEGE FOOTBALL SEASON

ere is a review of the key rule changes that will take effect this fall courtesy of the National Football Foundation (NFF) & College Hall of Fame.

Since 2011, the NFF has partnered with the College Football Officiating (CFO), led by Steve Shaw and chaired by Mid-American Conference Commissioner Jon Steinbrecher, to help generate awareness for the rule changes in college football. The CFO functions as the national professional organization for all football officials who work games at the collegiate level, and the organization has held its annual winter meeting of conference coordinators for football officials at the NFF headquarters in Irving, Texas for ninth time this past January.

Shaw, who became the CFO National Coordinator of Football Officials in March 2020, previously served the Southeastern Conference and Sun Belt Conference as coordinator of officials. He also serves as the Secretary-Rules Editor of the NCAA Football Rules Committee, a position critical to the development of competition rules and policies. Shaw excelled as a head referee for 15 years in the SEC, earning 14 postseason assignments, including two national championship games. He has been a leader in revamping the sport's officiating mechanics and advancing the use of technology to assist officials.

"The mission of the Rules Committee is to develop and evaluate rules changes that will enhance the sport, protect the image of the game, and enhance the student athlete's health and safety," said Shaw. "Player safety has been the highest priority of the committee for many years now resulting in significant changes that have improved the game in terms of mitigating injuries. Specifically, the new Blocking Below the Waist rule, and the other modifications to the rules for 2022 will be a benefit for the student-athletes, the fans, and the game."

The NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel approved the following football measures during their April meeting, and all these rule changes will take effect in the 2022 season.

TARGETING CARRYOVER APPEAL PROCESS

In games that have instant replay, when a targeting foul occurs in the second half, the carryover penalty (of sitting out the first half of that player's next game) will be eligible for further appeal. The process will begin with a conference submitting a request to the NCAA national coordinator of officials, who would review video of the play. If it is obvious that a player was incorrectly penalized for targeting, the call would be overturned, and the player would be cleared to play in the first half of the next game.

DECEPTIVE INJURY TIMEOUT INVESTIGATION PROCESS

To address teams that are awarded an injury timeout through deceptive actions, panel mem-



bers approved a reporting and investigation process. Schools and conferences will be able to report questionable scenarios to the national coordinator of officials, who will review and provide feedback to the conference for further action. Any penalties levied would be up to the conference office or school involved.

The NCAA Football Rules Committee considered several in-game options to address this, including altering the injury timeout rule to remove the injured student-athlete for more than one play. Currently, an injured player is required to sit out one play. This concept was debated at length, but the committee was concerned with the additional issues that could be created and did not want to encourage players to continue to participate when injured.

Committee members discussed how the pace of play appears to be contributing to this concern. "We considered all options to address this issue, including allowing both teams an opportunity to substitute after a first down," said David Shaw, chair of the Football Rules Committee and coach at Stanford. "This is another step to consider in the future."

BLOCKING BELOW THE WAIST

The panel approved a proposal to improve safety and simplify the rules governing blocking below the waist. The proposal will allow blocking below the waist only by linemen and stationary backs inside the tackle box. Outside the tackle box on scrimmage plays, blocking below the waist will be prohibited. Analysis of available NCAA injury surveillance data indicates a decreasing knee injury trend that coincides with recent rules changes in this area.

OTHER RULE CHANGES• If a ball carrier simulates a feet-first slide, officials will declare the runner down at that spot.

- Defensive holding will remain a 10-yard penalty but will always carry an automatic first down.
- The replay official will address any clock adjustment and status only when a ruling is overturned with less than two minutes in the 2nd or 4th quarter.
- Illegal Touching by an originally ineligible player is penalized five yards from the previous spot and now includes loss of down.

Cook was Georgia's second-leading rusher in 2021 with 728 yards (6.4 yards/carry) with seven touchdowns and added 27 catches for 284 yards and four scores. He wrapped up his four-year career with 1,503 rushing yards and 14 touchdowns to go with 67 receptions for 730 yards and six scores through the air.

Dean was a unanimous All-American and the Butkus Award winner last season. He totaled the team's second-most tackles in 2021 with 72 stops, including 10.5 tackles for loss and six sacks, to go along with two interceptions, including a pick-six versus Florida. Dean finished with 168 stops in just three years while starting the last 25 consecutive games.

Tindall shared the middle of the defense with Dean and finished fourth on the team with 67 tackles, including 7.5 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks despite not starting a game. For his career, Tindall had 108 stops with 16 tackles for loss and a dozen sacks and a forced fumble.

Running back Zamir White was selected by the Las Vegas Raiders in the fourth round with the 122nd-overall pick, while Jake Camarda was also chosen in the fourth round by Tampa Bay Buccaneers with the 133rd-overall pick. A pair of offensive linemen went in the sixth round, Justin Shaffer, who was picked 190th overall by the Atlanta Falcons, and Jamaree Salyer went 195th overall to the Los Angeles Chargers.

The Georgia contingent was rounded out by backto-back picks in the sixth round. Defensive back Derion Kendrick was selected 212th overall by the Los Angeles Rams, while tight end John FitzPatrick was picked 213th overall by the Falcons.

Georgia's 15 selected players rank ed first in the nation. This was the first time Georgia ranked first among SEC schools and the fifth time the Bulldogs have finished in the top-5 nationally in the Kirby Smart era (since 2016).

White, a native of Laurinburg, N.C., played in 38 games for the Bulldogs, earning the start in 22 games.

He was Georgia's leading rusher in 2021 with 856 yards (5.4 yards/carry) with 11 touchdowns and added nine catches for 75 yards. During his career, White tallied 2,043 total yards on 382 attempts with 25 touchdowns.

Camarda, a senior from Norcross, became the first punter in Georgia history to get drafted. He wrapped up his four-year career with 187 punts for a school record average of 45.8 yards, with a career-long 68-yard boot against Alabama in the 2021 SEC Championship game. He pinned 70 career punts inside the 20-yard line and totaled 67 punts over 50-yards. The senior also handled kickoff duty for the Bulldogs, logging 107 career touchbacks on 143 attempts.

Shaffer, a senior from Ellenwood, started his final 25 games at guard. The 2021 All-SEC Second Team performer played 88 percent of Georgia's offensive

snaps during the past season, including every possible play in five games: Clemson, Kentucky, Florida, Michigan, and Alabama.

Salyer, a senior from Atlanta, played in 51 games, starting at left tackle in 20. The 2021 All-SEC Second Team performer and team captain played 79 percent of Georgia's offensive snaps while available during the past season, including all the Clemson, Kentucky, Florida, Michigan, and both Alabama games. He had 10 "knockdown" blocks, surrendering only two quarterback hurries with zero sacks allowed during the 2021 season.

Kendrick, a native of Rock Hill, S.C., started all 15 games in his lone year as a Bulldog. He finished the 2021 season with 41 total stops, a team-high four interceptions, three QB pressures, and three pass breakups. Kendrick was named the Defensive MVP of the Capital One Orange Bowl.

FitzPatrick, a junior from Atlanta, saw action in 38 games, earning 13 starts. He recorded 200 career yards (11.8 yards/catch) on 17 receptions with one touchdown against Arkansas in 2020. FitzPatrick played a key role in the run game, helping pave the way for 7,192 yards on the ground over the past three seasons.

FitzPatrick joins Shaffer with the Falcons, becoming the third pair of Bulldogs to get drafted together to the same team.

ith a \$25 million expansion completed in 2003 and another \$8 million in 2004, Sanford Stadium added a second upper deck on the north side and 27 new north side SkySuites bringing the new stadium capacity to 92,746 — the ninth largest on-campus stadium in the country.

Named for the late Dr. S. V. Sanford, former president of the University and Chancellor of the University system, Georgia's Sanford Stadium celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2004. An overflow crowd of 30,000 saw the stadium's first game on Oct. 12, 1929, when Yale University made its only trip South. Georgia won the now famous game when a young sophomore end from Macon, Vernon "Catfish" Smith, scored all 15 of the Bulldogs' points. Final score: Georgia 15, Yale 0.

Through the years, the stadium has undergone various expansion projects. In 1940, lights were added to the field level paving the way to the first night game, a 7-7 tie between Georgia and Kentucky on Oct. 26, 1940. Eventually, the East end of the stadium was enclosed, more lights added, and the capacity increased to 82,122. the 1991 project cost the University Athletic Association \$3.7 million and enclosed the West end. the price tag was rather hefty, considering that the original price to build the stadium was a mere \$360,000. Legendary Sanford Stadium added yet another chapter to its history by hosting the medal round of the 1996 Olympic men's and women's soccer competition, watched via television by over 3 billion people around the world.

The latest major enhancement to Sanford Stadium was the \$63-million West End Zone Project that

was completed before the 2018 season. It entailed 120,000 square feet of new and improved space and featured a new home locker room, a space to host and entertain prospects on game day, improvements to restroom and concession areas below the bridge, and a new scoreboard and upper plaza.

Prior to Georgia's 2019 home opener versus Murray State, the playing field at Sanford Stadium was formally renamed in honor of Vince Dooley, the Bulldogs' all-time winningest head coach. Dooley served as head football coach of the Bulldogs from 1963 through 1989 and director of athletics from 1979 to 2004. As head coach, he won 201 games, one national championship and six SEC championships. While Dooley was athletic director, UGA won 23 national championships and 78 SEC team championships.



ARTIFICIAL NOISEMAKERS

Any artificial noisemakers (air horns, cowbells, etc.) are not permitted in Sanford Stadium. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Please keep portable radios at a low volume.

ATMS

With the addition of credit/bank card capabilities at all stadium points of sale, ATMs are no longer available inside Sanford Stadium. For guests needing access to an ATM on gameday, available machines are located outside the stadium in the Tate Center plaza. Spectators inside the stadium will not be able to leave the stadium to use an ATM and then re-enter the stadium.

CONCESSIONS

UGA Athletics would like to remind all fans that transactions at our concessions stands are contactless. Methods of payment accepted include AMEX, Discover, Mastercard and VISA.

■ Monitor the weather prior to the game. Take the necessary precautions to protect your



family and friends should severe weather be encountered before, during or after the game.

- In the event of an emergency inside the stadium, remain calm at all times, assist others and, if necessary, leave in an orderly fashion.
- During any emergency inside the stadium, follow the directions of the announcer, event staff and emergency responders. Assist individuals who may not be able to hear the emergency announcements.
- Always designate a pre-determined location both inside and outside the stadium to meet friends and family in case you get separated or in the event of an emergency.
- Upon arriving at your seat location, first find the nearest exit/emergency exit and then locate an alternate exit in case of an emergency.
- Specific emergency instructions are provided for the guests in the sky suites and other private areas. Patrons at those locations should read and be familiar with the emergency evacuation instructions located there.
- Do not use elevators in the event of a fire evacuation or power failure.
- Listen to AM 1650 for gameday traffic updates.
- If you see or become aware of any activity that is unusual, suspicious or causes you concern, please report the activity to the nearest police officer or event personnel.
- Remember, text messaging may be an option when voice phone calls do not work.

INFORMATION STATIONS/ SILVER DAWGS

Look for Bulldog Information Stations outside and throughout Sanford Stadium for event, stadium and public information. Located at Gates 2, 6, and 9, these customer service stands are the best source to answer your gameday questions. The Silver Dawgs, a volunteer group who welcome and greet guests to the University of Georgia campus, can be found outside around the stadium as well as inside on the concourses. They can provide gameday information too.

PATRON SERVICES

Event service personnel are authorized to conduct an inspection of patrons upon entering the stadium for the sole purpose of eliminating hard objects and containers of any type from entering the stadium. Crowd control officers and stadium ushers are available to handle any inconveniences you may experience in the stadium.


PROHIBITED ITEMS

Stadium security has the right to inspect any item at any time for the purpose of spectator safety. Prohibited items must be returned to cars or disposed of before entry. Prohibited items include:

- Infant seats

- Cameras with detachable lenses
- Seatbacks larger than 16" or that have arms or pockets

RESTROOMS

Ladies' and men's restrooms are located on all concourses. Additional restrooms are located underneath



the West End stands. Family restrooms are located in Reed Plaza and the 600 level of the North Side of the stadium.

SIGNS

Signs, banners, pictures, etc. that are offensive to individuals and teams, that are not in good taste, that block the view of spectators, or that create a safety hazard will not be allowed. The hanging or displaying of signs on stadium walls, bleacher areas, ramps or an area of proximity to the stadium is prohibited as a safety precaution.

In the event of a special banner day being conducted, all signs and/or banners will be admitted through Gate 10 and must be pre-approved by game administration personnel.

STADIUM SEATBACK LEASE & **CUSTOMER SERVICE LOCATIONS**

On gamedays only and subject to availability, seatbacks can be leased for \$10 on a single game basis.

GEORGIA TRADITIONS • HISTORY OF THE HEDGES

"LONE TRUMPETER"

Seven minutes to kickoff in Sanford Stadium, the Bulldog Nation directs its attention to a lone trumpeter standing in the upper deck of the southwest corner of the stadium. The soloist is recognized and begins to play the first 14 notes of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." The Battle Hymn solo was originally composed in 1987 as a student project by Jeff Simmons and became a part of the pre-game tradition in 2000. Each year, 25-30 members of the Redcoat Band audition for one of the four or five soloist positions.

THE CHAPEL BELL

The ringing of the chapel bell after a Georgia victory is a tradition that continues even though freshmen are no longer ordered to do the chore. In the 1890s, the playing field was located only yards from the Chapel and first-year students were compelled to ring the bell until midnight in celebration of a Bulldog victory. Today, students, alumni and townspeople still rush to the Chapel to ring the bell after a gridiron victory.



THE ARCH

Serving as the official symbol of the University of Georgia, the Arch was built in the 1850s and originally served as part of a larger iron fence securing the campus. Daniel Redfearn (BL 1909, BS 1910) is credited with making the Arch the sacred symbol of UGA. Recognized as one of the school's finest icons, students today hold the Arch in high regard as its three pillars represent the virtues of wisdom, justice and moderation.

GLORY, GLORY

Among the University's oldest and most lasting traditions is the school fight song, "Glory, Glory" which is sung to the tune of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." It was sung at games as early as the 1890s, but arranged in its present form by Georgia's immortal musician-composer Hugh Hodgson in 1915. There have been many Bulldog songs through the years and at least two collections dating back to 1909 have been published, but none have enjoyed more acceptance than "Glory, Glory."

THE BULLDOGS

Many oldtimers say Georgia acquired the nickname, "Bulldogs," because of the strong ties with Yale,

whose nickname is Bulldogs. Georgia's first president, Abraham Baldwin, was a Yale man and the early buildings on campus were designed from blueprints of the same building at Yale. But on Nov. 3, 1920, Morgan Blake of the Atlanta Journal wrote about school nicknames and said "The Georgia 'Bulldogs' would sound good because there is a certain dignity about a bulldog, as well as ferocity." After a 0-0 tie with Virginia in Charlottesville on Nov. 6, 1920, Atlanta Constitution writer Cliff Wheatley used the name "Bulldogs" in his story five times. The name has been used ever since.



THE DAWG WALK

About two hours and 15 minutes before each home game, the Bulldogs are greeted and fired up by thousands of Georgia fans and the Redcoat Marching Band as they unload on Lumpkin Street, walk through the Tate Center Parking lot and in to Sanford Stadium.

SILVER BRITCHES

Silver Britches were an innovation of coach Wally Butts, who took over as head coach in 1939. The handsome pants, complimented by a bright red jersey, made for a striking uniform. Through the years, fans referred to the Bulldogs' silver britches in their chants and on banners, but the phrase really caught on in the early '50s with a cheer, banners and colorful vests that proclaimed "Go, You Silver Britches." Coach Vince Dooley re-designed the uniform when he came in 1964 and used white pants; however, he re-instituted the silver britches in 1980 just prior to what turned out to be Georgia's national championship season.

BETWEEN THE HEDGES

A reference to Sanford Stadium that dates back to the early 1930s. The famous English privet hedges that surround Sanford's playing field were only one foot high when the stadium was dedicated in 1929 and were protected by a wooden fence. It was natural for a clever sports writer, referring to an upcoming home game, to observe "that the Bulldogs will have their opponent 'between the hedges.'" At least one old-timer says the phrase was first coined by the legendary Atlanta sportswriter Grantland Rice.

HOW 'BOUT THEM DOGS

This is a slogan of recent vintage, but one that has become a battle cry of Bulldog fans probably because of its obvious grammatical slur. It first surfaced during the mid to late 1970s especially during the 1978 season when the Bulldogs posted several remarkable, come-from-behind victories. It gained national attention and exposure when Georgia won the national championship in 1980. A major wire-service used the phrase in its story of Georgia's victory over Notre Dame and many newspapers picked it up in glaring headlines across the country proclaiming "How 'Bout Them Dogs!"



REDCOAT MARCHING BAND - NOTHING FINER IN THE LAND



oach Vince Dooley often refers to the Redcoat Band as the Heart of the Bulldog Spirit.

As true today as it ever was, the band's colorful presence, limitless enthusiasm, and compelling presentations are a part of what makes Georgia Football special to so many. But the finished product fans see and hear on Saturdays is a result of much more time, effort, and investment than meets the eye.

The 430 students of the Redcoat Band are the most important factor in its success. Besides being academically accomplished enough to be admitted to UGA, Redcoats have been practicing their performing crafts for years before arriving on campus. Members of the band's visual ensembles--the Majorettes, the Georgettes, and the Flagline--often begin performing as young children in community twirl or dance studios. The musicians, though they may have trained on other instruments before starting band in fifth or sixth grade, are beneficiaries of years of skillful mentorship from the school band directors of Georgia and elsewhere. Moms and dads make similar investments in their young performers through instrument purchase, lesson tuition, hours of shuttling kids to rehearsals, and flipping burgers at high school football games.

Once the students get to UGA, the work has just begun. Redcoats arrive five to ten days before most students for evaluation, conditioning, and a whirlwind of training in Georgia traditions. During Fall Semester, they commit to six to eight hours of rehearsal per week, and game days ranging from ten to twenty hours of activity that isn't as easy as the students make it look. As the season progresses, members refine and reinforce the fundamentals of their technique, while learning new material on a weekly basis for pregame, halftime, or their other contributions to game days. Throughout the year, Redcoats also perform at volleyball, soccer, basketball, gymnastics, and other events, producing about one hundred performances per academic year at athletic events alone. At a place with such a broad variety of academic fields--about 85% of Redcoats major in something other than Music--their time in

the band is but one part of a rich collegiate experience.

On the field and in the stands, band captain Sarah Secrist (Dallas) and fellow drum majors Robert Boone III (Conyers), Hannah Marston (Harris Co.), and Aizhia Nicole Poblete (Baxley) lead the 118th edition of the Redcoat Band in performance. They are joined as senior leaders by Dawson Burnes (Rome), Andrew Cerny (Macon), Kayleigh Crews (Lawrenceville), Tarik Itum (Marietta), Grayson Jones (Douglas Co.), Adonis Lewis (Dallas), Brennan Sweet (Hoschton), and Jonas Ventresca (Kennesaw). Behind the scenes, an experienced staff of graduate music students and alumni Redcoat specialists contribute to every aspect of the band's preparation and performance. The band's alumni presence is anchored by Tom Wallace, band staff arranger since 1976, and Dr. Tom Jackson, the Voice of the Redcoats since the 1974 Tangerine Bowl. School of Music director Pete Jutras, interim director of bands Jaclyn Hartenberger, associate director of bands Shiree Williams, and administrative associate Tracy Coker provide additional valuable administrative support. Factor in the support of the Athletic Association, Student Activities, the Franklin College of Arts and Sciences, the Hugh Hodgson School of Music, the Redcoat Alumni Band, and a generous group of supporters, and it's clear that the Redcoat Band truly is a huge machine in red and black.



SPIRIT SQUAD • UGA CHEERLEADING HISTORY



heerleading at UGA, as at other institutions, just happened. It was spontaneous. When teams challenged each other, spectators showed up and naturally cheered their favorites.

Historic records show that intercollegiate sports began on the University of Georgia campus in the early 1890s. Baseball was first and football followed soon after in

Mercer was the first gridiron opponent. Georgia won that game in Athens and then took on Auburn in Atlanta in what has become the oldest continuing series in the South.

An account of that first game in the college yearbook for 1892 refers to the yelling and chanting of the spectators and identifies Bob Gantt as a leader in urging the fans to support the team. The article claims, "the college yells did almost as much to win the game as the fine playing of the team."

The report says Gantt came to the game with a mascot — a goat with red and black ribbons. Gantt, from Athens, was a member of the class of 1893. He is the first documented cheerleader for UGA.

Soon, cheerleaders were selected by the student body in special elections. Women were added to the spirit squads after their admittance in the '20s. This method of selection continued until the late '40s when a system of try-outs was introduced.


Candidates were invited to public try-outs where special judges narrowed the number of candidates to a smaller number from which the final cheerleaders were named. Judges were enlisted from a pool of professors, campus leaders, coaches and former cheerleaders.

In the early days, cheers were submitted by classes, clubs and students. Popular cheers survived the years along with chants and songs. In 1943, a book of these old cheers was published by the University of Georgia Press called "Georgia Songs and Yells."

Through the years the cheerleading program was overseen by a coach or athletic staff member appointed by the football coach or athletics director. Two notable cheerleader "coaches" were Dan Magill in the '40s and '50s, who was followed by Mike Castronis, who served until his health failed in the mid '80s.

A Cheerleaders Alumni Association was organized in 1970 and former spirit leaders were invited back to campus for Homecoming and invited to cheer during the game. The alumni group has officers and is supportive of the current program, which is now headed up by a spirit coordinator who oversees each aspect of cheerleading.

CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY • TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

ver the 130-year history of football at Georgia, six Bulldog teams have actually been declared national champions at season's end in at least one of the national polls recognized by the National College Football Hall of Fame and included in the official NCAA Football Record Book. Three of those — 2021, 1980 and 1942 — were consensus selections, having been chosen in at least half of the recognized polls. The most recent champion, in 2021, won its title on the field and was voted No. 1 unanimously in the aftermath. Three other Georgia teams - 1927, 1946, and 1968 - were recognized by polls such as the Williamson, based on a power ratings system, and the Litkenhous, a difference-by-score formula.

1942

Rose Bowl Win Clinches Title

In 1942, James Wallace Butts of Milledgeville, Georgia, molded what was regarded as the Bulldogs' most powerful team in the first fifty years of Georgia football. Georgia was led by All-Americans Frank Sinkwich, who would win the Heisman Trophy following the season, and end George Poschner, along with a young back named Charley Trippi, who would years later be called perhaps the greatest all-around athlete ever to play for the Bulldogs.

Georgia knocked off nine consecutive opponents and ranked No. 1 in the nation. But Auburn ambushed the 'Dogs in Columbus, 27-13. Georgia, however, came back to win a Rose Bowl bid by blanking previously unbeaten Georgia Tech in Athens, 34-0, in the regular season finale. Georgia then edged UCLA, 9-0, in the Rose Bowl to finish the season 11-1. In the final polls, Georgia was declared national champion in six polls recognized by the NCAA — DeVold, Houlgate, Litkenhous, Williamson, Poling and Berryman.

1980

Undisputed Champions

Vince Dooley's 1980 national championship team was the most compelling after recording a perfect 12-0 mark including a 17-10 victory over Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl. Freshman sensation Herschel Walker helped move the Bulldogs up the poll ladder after being virtually unranked prior to the season.

Georgia had moved up to number two after defeating South Carolina, 13-10, in a battle of top 10 teams in the season's eighth game. The following week, it appeared Georgia's run was over when Florida led the 'Dogs, 21-20, with a minute and a half to play and UGA set for a final possession on its own 7-yard line. But quarterback Buck Belue, on third down and 10, hit receiver Lindsay Scott on a 93-yard TD pass with 1:04 to play to lift the 'Dogs to a 26-21 victory. The next day, Georgia was elevated to number one in the polls.

After victories over Auburn and Georgia Tech in the final two regular season games, Georgia met perhaps the most storied school in college football history — Notre Dame — in the Sugar Bowl. Led by Walker's two touchdowns, Georgia defeated the Irish, 17-10, to lay claim to its undisputed national crown. Virtually every major poll declared the Bulldogs No. 1 following a season in which Georgia was the only undefeated, untied Division 1-A team in the country.

2021

CFP National Champions

There was no debating Georgia's claim to the 2021 national title, its first in 41 years and first in the college football playoff era.

Indeed, the Bulldogs posted a perfect regular season in which they were rarely threatened, winning their first 12 games by an average score of 49-8. This dominance was highlighted by a defense that featured winners of the Outland Trophy (Jordan Davis), Chuck Bednarik Award (Davis) and Butkus Award (Nakobe Dean), as well as the first overall pick in the NFL Draft (Travon Walker). Fittingly, the first and last touchdowns of this historic season were scored by the Georgia defense.

The Bulldogs ascended to the No. 1 spot in the polls by mid-October. A loss to Alabama in the SEC Championship Game proved to be their lone misstep. After steamrolling Michigan in the CFP semifinal at the Orange Bowl, Georgia avenged the Alabama game by defeating the Crimson Tide 33-18 for the national championship, scoring 20 fourth-quarter points to put an unforgettable stamp upon its season.

1946

War Heroes Return


The 1942 juggernaut was dismantled by the events of World War II. But Charley Trippi and several of his Rose Bowl teammates returned to school in 1946 and led Georgia to a perfect 10-0 regular season and 20-10 victory over North Carolina in the Sugar Bowl. But despite Georgia's perfect record, Notre Dame was declared national champion by the majority of the polls; however, the Bulldogs were voted No. 1 in the final Williamson poll.

"Dream and Wonder" Team

Georgia's famous "dream and wonder team" of coach George "Kid" Woodruff won its first nine games, including the Bulldogs' first win ever over Yale, a college football power of the 1920s, in New Haven, Connecticut. It ranked No. 1 in the nation with one regular season game remaining. However, Georgia Tech spoiled the perfect season by upsetting the 'Dogs in the rain, 12-0, in Atlanta. But the '27 'Dogs were still voted number one in two final recognized polls — Boand and Poling. This team marked the culmination of five year's work by Woodruff, who had brought in several Knute Rockne protégés to install the Notre Dame box formation: line coach Harry Mehre; Jim Crowley, one of the four horsemen; and Frank Thomas. All later became great head coaches (Mehre at Georgia and Ole Miss, Crowley at Fordham and Thomas at Alabama).

1968

Dooley's 'Dogs Do It Again

In 1968, another of Vince Dooley's teams went through the regular season undefeated, but tied twice, finishing 8-0-2 and earning an invitation to the Sugar Bowl. Despite suffering a 16-2 loss in the bowl game to Arkansas, Georgia was still voted No. 1 in the Litkenhous poll.



GEORGIA BOWL HISTORY • 59 APPEARANCE IN PROGRAM HISTORY

he Georgia Bulldogs rank second nationally with 59 bowl appearances and have been to a record 27 straight bowl games in all. Georgia's bowl tradition began on Jan. 1, 1942, defeating TCU in the Orange Bowl, 40-26. UGA set a bowl record with its 14th win of the season, beating Alabama 33-18 in the 2022 CFP National Championship Game in Indianapolis, Ind.

Down 25, Georgia's dramatic, 28-25, overtime win over Purdue in the 2000 Outback Bowl at the time marked the biggest comeback in bowl history (Georgia trailed 25-0), eclipsing the 22-point deficit that Notre Dame overcame in its 1979 bowl game and BYU in its 1980 bowl game.

Georgia claimed consensus national championships in 1942, 1980 and 2021, following impressive bowl wins, beating UCLA, 9-0, in the Rose Bowl, Notre Dame 17-10 in the Sugar Bowl, and most recently winning the CFP National Title with a 34-11 victory over Michigan in the Orange Bowl followed by the triumph over the Crimson Tide in the National Championship Game. In 2017, Georgia captured the SEC title and a earned a spot in the 2018 College Football Playoff. The Bulldogs played a pair of overtime thrillers, defeating Oklahoma in the Rose Bowl Game and then advancing to Atlanta for the national championship game versus Alabama. The 2019 season culminated in New Orleans at the 2020 Sugar Bowl with a 26-14 win over Baylor. The 2020 season finished with a thrilling 24-21 comeback win over Cincinnati in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. Last season saw the Bulldogs defeat Michigan in the Orange Bowl and go on to defeat Alabama, 33-18 in the CFP Championship.





JERE W. MOREHEAD • UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA PRESIDENT

resident Jere W. Morehead began his tenure as the 22nd University of Georgia President on July 1, 2013. Under his leadership, the University has risen in the rankings of the best public colleges and universities and has completed a series of initiatives to enhance student learning and success, including a requirement for experiential learning for all undergraduates.



Additionally, the University completed the most successful

capital campaign in its history, raising \$1.45 billion, and launched an Innovation District initiative to create UGA's campus of the future, where students and faculty will partner with industry to generate ideas and solutions to continue the University's role as a powerful driver of economic development in Georgia. During President Morehead's tenure, UGA has increased its research expenditures by 41% and has been ranked among the top five universities in the U.S. for research-based products reaching the marketplace for the past seven years. UGA was ranked No. 1 in the nation for FY2019 and FY2017.

In keeping with his focus on student success, President Morehead launched the ALL Georgia Program to support students from rural areas and created the Double Dawgs program, which enables students to save time and money

by earning an undergraduate and graduate degree in five years or less. A UGA education is in greater demand than ever, with a record 39,500 applications submitted for a spot in the incoming Class of 2025 and an admission rate under 39%.

President Morehead has served the University of Georgia since 1986 in both faculty and administrative roles. Before becoming President, he was Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost from 2010 to 2013. Prior to 2010, he held several key administrative assignments, including Vice President for Instruction,

Vice Provost for Academic Affairs, Associate Provost and Director of the Honors Program, and acting Executive Director of Legal Affairs.

He is the Meigs Professor of Legal Studies in the Terry College of Business, where he has held a faculty appointment since 1986. He is a co-author of several books and book chapters, including The Legal and Regulatory Environment of Business, and he has published scholarly articles on legal topics ranging from export controls to jury selection. He has served as Editor-in-Chief of the American Business Law Journal.

President Morehead serves as Co-Chair of the University Leadership Forum, a national initiative led by the Council on Competitiveness. He also serves as Chair of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA)

Division I Board of Directors, a member of the NCAA Division I Administrative Committee, and a member of the NCAA Board of Governors. He previously served on the NCAA Presidential Forum; the Working Group on Name, Image, and Likeness; and the Federal and State Legislation Working Group. He is President of the Southeastern Conference (SEC) and Chair of the SEC Executive Committee. Additional service includes membership on the boards of the Georgia Chamber of Commerce, Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Georgia Research Alliance, Atlanta Regional Council for Higher Education, and Emory University Candler School of Theology.

In 2021, he received the Chief Executive Leadership Award from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education District III for outstanding leadership and service in support of education. He has received several University-wide teaching awards, including the Josiah Meigs Award-UGA's highest honor for teaching excellence, the Richard B. Russell Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching, the Teacher of the Year Award in the Terry College of Business, and the Lothar Tresp Outstanding Honors Professor Award. He also earned the UGA School of Law's premier honor for alumni, the Distinguished Service Scroll Award.

President Morehead holds a bachelor's degree from Georgia State University and a law degree from the University of Georgia.



JOSH BROOKS . J. REID PARKER DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

osh Brooks was named J. Reid Parker Director of Athletics in January 2021, after serving 11 years in supporting roles at the University of Georgia, most recently as Interim Director of Athletics and Senior Deputy Director of Athletics. At the time of his hiring, he was the youngest athletic director among the Power Five conferences.

Since Brooks became Athletic Director, UGA has won the 2022 College Football Playoff national championship, the 2021 national title in Equestrian, and 2021 SEC crown in women's tennis. The Bulldogs finished 10th in the 2021 Learfield Directors' Cup, and by finishing 19th in 2022, Georgia is one of just nine schools to post top-25 finishes in the Directors' Cup every year during the 2000s.

In addition, Brooks hired a number of head coaches in his first full year, including two national champions in track and field coach Caryl Smith Gilbert and soccer coach Keidane McAlpine, both from USC. Brooks also named successors to longtime head coaches Jack Bauerle (Swimming & Diving) and Lu Harris-Champer (Softball) who both retired. Tony Baldwin took over the softball program in summer 2021, while Stefanie Williams Moreno and Neil Versfeld, two of Georgia's most successful collegiate swimmers, were named head women's and men's swimming and diving coach respectively.

Academics and community service have been in the forefront of Brooks' administration. A leaguebest 97 student-athletes were named to the Winter 2022 SEC Academic Honor Roll. The "Dawgs for Pups" campaign, initiated by the football team, has undertaken several community service projects, including the donation of all ticket revenue from the annual G-Day spring game, totaling \$100,000, to Athens-based Downtown Academy.

Despite the loss of ticket sales during the COVID-19 pandemic, Georgia finished the 2020-21 academic year with a balanced budget and impressive fundraising totals. In June, 2022, the Athletic Association launched a \$300 million comprehensive fundraising campaign to support key department priorities over the next five years.

With close attention to the game-day experience, Brooks has spearheaded such fan-centric improvements as family-friendly pricing on concessions at all venues, a partnership with Zaxby's to provide the restaurant chain's popular ice, and the use of pedestal scanners for quicker entry to Sanford Stadium.

Brooks has also placed great emphasis on the studentathlete experience, with a comprehensive Name, Image, and Likeness program, LeGAcy, which provides wide-ranging education, multi-media management tools, and brandbuilding training.

Brooks returned to UGA in 2016 as Executive Associate Director of Athletics after serving as Deputy Athletics Director at the University of Louisiana Monroe from 2015-16 and Director of Athletics at Millsaps College from 2014-15.

Prior to his tenures at Millsaps and ULM, he had served in capacities at UGA as Director of Football Operations (2008-11) and Assistant and Associate Athletic Director for Internal Operations (2012-14).

During his time at UGA, Brooks worked closely with former Director of Athletics Greg McGarity, overseeing all internal and external operations. He served as the liaison with the Office of University Architects on all athletic construction projects, as well as with the president's office. His responsibilities at included management of the departments of facility support, graphics and design, and turf management.

Within the football program,

Brooks played key roles in scheduling and bowl game operations. His additional responsibilities included planning the 2013 Jason Aldean Concert in Sanford Stadium. Brooks also served as the sport facilitator for football and men's and women's track and field and cross country.



A native of Hammond, La., Brooks graduated from LSU ('02) with a degree in Kinesiology and completed his master's degree in Sport Management from UGA ('14). He and his wife, Lillie, have twin sons, Jackson and James, born in July of 2009 and a third son, Davis, born in March of 2012.



THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE - THE STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE



SEC FOOTBALL has led the nation in attendance for 23 consecutive seasons.

he Southeastern Conference begins its 90th season of play in 2022. The league began play in 1933 with 13 schools — Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.

Alabama won the league's first conference title in 1933 by virtue of its 5-0-1 conference record. Sewanee left the conference following the 1940 season while Georgia Tech left after the 1963 season and Tulane followed after the 1965 campaign. Arkansas and South Carolina entered the SEC prior to the 1992 season. On July 1, 2012, the University of Missouri and Texas A&M University became members of the SEC.

The SEC was the first conference to split into two divisions and have its regular season culminate in a conference championship game. The first SEC Championship Game was held on Dec. 5, 1992 at Legion Field in Birmingham, Alabama.



As a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Southeastern Conference, The University of Georgia is dedicated to complying with all the rules and regulations set forth by those governing organizations.

STEP 1: Know the Terms



Prospect

Any student in high school



Booster

Individual who has made a financial contribution, including purchase of season tickets, to the University of Georgia Athletic Association



Inducement

Arrangement of benefits used to recruit a prospect to the University of Georgia



Extra Benefit

Benefit to a student-athlete that is not available to the general student body



Agent

Any person who markets an athlete's athletic ability for personal financial gain

STEP 2: Know the Rules



Recruiting

All recruiting must be conducted by the coaches



Benefits

You may not provide current or prospective student-athletes with impermissible benefits such as cash, travel, clothing, etc.



Marketing

Student-athletes may use their name, image or likeness (NIL) to promote commercial entities. There are specific NCAA rules and institutional policies related to permissible NIL activities. See more info at georgiadogs.com/ sports/2021/8/2/nil-policy.aspx

STEP 3: Know the Consequences



Loss of Opportunity

Current or prospective student-athletes may be declared ineligible to compete or receive athletic financial aid



Loss of Wins

Victories obtained while playing ineligible student-athletes may be forfeited and vacated



Disassociation

Boosters guilty of violations may be barred from the University of Georgia Athletics events



Sanctions

The University of Georgia may receive penalties from the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations committed by boosters and fans





TOP 10 THINGS TO KNOW



Breaking NCAA rules can render prospects and current student-athletes ineligible to compete at the University of Georgia.



You may not become involved in arranging for a prospect, a current student-athlete or their friends or family to receive money or financial assistance of any kind.



The University of Georgia can be sanctioned by the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations committed by boosters and fans.



You **may not** employ student-athletes and/ or prospects without approval.



You **may not** provide a meal to a current student-athlete at your home or on campus without the University of Georgia Compliance approval.



You may not spend funds to entertain or provide transportation to prospects, current student-athletes or their friends and family.



University of Georgia supporters are encouraged to engage in legitimate NIL activities with current student-athletes. All NIL deals must be disclosed to Compliance and comply with University of Georgia policies, SEC and NCAA rules, and state and federal laws. Please contact a member of the compliance staff if you have questions.




