

Fast Facts on the SEC Champion Bulldogs

- *The Bulldogs (12-1, 7-1 SEC) are the No. 3 seed in the CFP and return to the Sugar Bowl as the SEC champions for the second consecutive year. This will be Georgia's 13th all-time appearance in the Sugar Bowl where it is 5-7.
- *Georgia enters the CFP on a nine-game winning streak. The Bulldogs are in their fifth CFP, all under **Kirby Smart**, with a 5-2 mark including winning back-to-back national titles in 2021 and 2022.
- *In its last four games including three of those against top 25 opponents, the Bulldog defense has allowed just two TDs, five field goals and forced 39 punts with five INTs and nine sacks.
- *Georgia owns the nation's longest active bowl streak now at 29 seasons. Since 2019, the Bulldogs are 7-1 in their past eight bowl/CFP matchups after a CFP quarterfinal loss to #5 Notre Dame in the 2025 Sugar Bowl. Georgia has made 63 appearances in a bowl/CFP game with a 38-22-3 mark. The appearances and wins rank second in FBS.
- *The Bulldogs won their 16th SEC title on Dec. 6 in Atlanta with a 28-7 rout of No. 9 Alabama. This is the first time Georgia has won two straight SEC titles since it claimed three in a row from 1980-82.
- *In rematches during a season under Smart, the Bulldogs are 4-0 (2017 AU regular season loss at AU/SEC CG win, 2021 UA SEC CG loss/CFP National Title win, 2024 Texas regular season win in Austin/SEC CG win, 2025 UA loss in Athens/SEC CG win).
- *On Oct. 18, 2025, No. 9 Georgia defeated No. 5 Ole Miss 43-35 in Athens. The Bulldogs lead the all-time series 35-13-1 and have never played twice in the same season.
- *Georgia leads the Tulane series 14-10-1, but the programs haven't met since 1985 when the Bulldogs won 58-3 in Athens. They have faced each other 13 times in New Orleans with Georgia going 6-7, the last time in 1972, a 24-13 victory by the Green Wave. Tulane was one of the charter members of the SEC until leaving in 1965, and the Bulldogs went 9-4 against the Green Wave in SEC matchups.

"Hard to Kill"

- *Georgia went 7-1 in the SEC gauntlet this year, trailing early and/or late in seven of those contests. The Bulldogs rallied to beat No. 15 Tennessee and Auburn on the road for their ninth straight victory in those series. They outlasted No. 5 Ole Miss 43-35 in Athens and never had to punt. Georgia won its fifth straight over Florida in Jacksonville. Georgia erased an early 7-0 deficit at MSU with 38 unanswered points and eventually recorded a 41-21 decision for the program's 900th all-time win. Georgia used a 21-point fourth quarter to defeat No. 10 Texas 35-10 to close out the SEC regular season.
- *Georgia blanked then No. 17 UA and AU in the second half while Kentucky's lone second half score came on a 23-yard drive with 1:51 left in the contest and the Bulldogs up 35-7. Trailing 35-26, Georgia outscored No. 5 OM 17-0 in the 4th quarter in that win. Against UF, Georgia fell behind 20-17 early in the 4th quarter, took the lead for good with 4:36 left and posted a pair of 4th-Down stops including one in the Red Zone as UF came in 22-for-23 there.
- *The only league contest in the regular season where Georgia led wire-to-wire was a 35-14 home win over UK while the only comeback that fell short came to then No. 17 UA 24-21 in Athens.
- *Georgia is 40-3 in its last 43 SEC regular season games with two losses to UA and one to Ole Miss.
- *The Bulldogs dominated No. 9 UA in the SEC Championship Game becoming the first team to shutout their opponent for the first three quarters of the title game and eventually won 28-7. UA was held to its second lowest rushing total in school history, finishing with minus three yards.

Playing with FPE (Fire, Passion, Energy)

- *One of Georgia's main themes in 2025 is to play with "FPE."
- *Fifty-four percent of Georgia's roster consists of players in their first or second season here.
- *Georgia's scoring defense this year has allowed 15.9 ppg and posted 24 scoreless quarters.
- *Junior ILB **CJ Allen**, a first team All-American and All-SEC selection, ranks third in the SEC in average tackles per game at 7.1. He was a finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Butkus Award. He is a semifinalist for the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award.
- *Redshirt junior QB **Gunner Stockton**, a 3rd team All-SEC selection, is a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Manning Award. He finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting.
- *Senior All-American **Brett Thorson** earned the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter. Senior All-American **Beau Gardner** won the Patrick Mannely Award as the nation's best snapper. Junior 2nd team All-SEC PK **Peyton Woodring** has been a three-time semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award.
- *Due to injuries, Georgia started six different offensive line units in the first six games and eight total.

Frazier & Bowens Headline Ground Attack

Georgia is averaging 186.6 rushing yards per game with 29 TDs.

*Sophomore Nate Frazier (team-high 861 yards, 6 TDs), a 3rd Coaches All-SEC selection, has started nine games. He had a team-best 72 rushing yards plus a three-yard TD catch in the win over No. 5 OM. He went for a career-high 181 yards on just 12 carries (15.1 avg.) in a road win over MSU. It was the most yards by a Bulldog since 2018 when D'Andre Swift had 186 in a win at Auburn. Frazier's big day included a career-best 59-yard TD run. He followed that up with a team-best 72 yards against No. 10 Texas. He went for 108 yards in a win versus #23 Tech.

*Chauncey Bowens (516 yards, 6 TDs), who earned Coaches Freshman All-SEC honors, made his first career start in the win over UK and provided 70 yards on a career-high 15 carries. Against No. 17 UA, he posted a career-best 119 yards on 12 carries (9.9 average). He had a 36-yard scamper for the go-ahead score in the 4th quarter in the win over UF. He missed the final two games of the regular season and saw limited action in the SECCG.

*Senior Cash Jones, redshirt senior Josh McCray, sophomore Dwight Phillips Jr., and freshman Bo Walker provide various looks too. With Bowens out versus #23 Tech, McCray saw extensive action. He had 13 carries for 43 yards plus two catches for nine yards.

*The Bulldogs had 55 rushes for 198 yard in the win at No. 15 UT. Frazier had a team-long 21-yard burst on the first play in overtime to set up the game-winning score by McCray who notched a pair of scores in the triumph.

*Jones can break tackles, is a solid blocker and wideout. He had a 16-yard TD catch versus UK and recovered an onside kick versus No. 10 Texas.

Branch Setting the Tone for the Wideouts

The Bulldogs are averaging 220.3 receiving yards a game with 24 TDs.

*Junior Zachariah Branch (73-for-744 yards, 5 TDs), the SEC leader in receptions who made 2nd Team Coaches All-SEC, ranks second in school history for most catches in a season behind Brice Hunter (76 in 1993).

*With senior Colbie Young (23-for-336 yards, 1 TD) sidelined with a leg injury (happened in the win over No. 5 OM), Branch and seniors Noah Thomas (16-for-254 yards, 4 TDs), Dillon Bell (27-for-279 yards, 2 TDs) and junior London Humphreys (18-for-276 yards, 3 TDs) are the top targets.

*Thomas has the longest catch of the season, a 64-yard TD against MSU. He got his first score as a Bulldog on a 22-yarder against UF for a 17-10 lead. With two TD catches against No. 10 Texas, he has four in the past four games.

*Branch posted a career high 10 receptions for 112 yards in the neutral site victory over UF. He had a team-high eight catches for 71 yards in the win over No. 5 OM. Branch had five catches for 69 yards in the win at No. 15 UT, including a 36-yard TD and the game-tying 2-point conversion with 2:32 left.

*Humphreys had THE catch of the season. Down 38-30 with 2:38 remaining in the game at No. 15 UT, it was 4th-and-6. He hauled in a 28-yard touchdown strike from Gunner Stockton.





For Whom the Bell Totes

Senior **Dillon Bell** has shown he can catch it, run it and even throw it.

*As a wideout this year, he has 27 catches for 279 yards and two TDs. In the win over No. 5 OM, he had two receptions for 57 yards. Bell has 11 career TD receptions. He had four catches for 43 yards and a TD in the win over UF.

*Bell has flashed in the running game too with a 43-yard dash on a reverse against No. 17 UA. He had two scores in the win against UK. Against No. 5 OM, he had two rushes for 19 yards. For the year, he has 109 yards on 17 carries. Bell has five career rushing TDs in 51 attempts.

*In the 2025 SEC Championship Game rout of No. 9 UA, he accounted for 69 yards (24 rushing, 45 receiving) and one TD.

*In 2023, he threw an 18-yard TD in a road win over Tennessee.

Ready or Not, It's Go Time

Due to injuries, Georgia used a different starting OL unit in its first six games, then had the same unit for the next four contests before resting a pair (All-America C-**Drew Bobo**, RT-**Earnest Greene III**) in the win over Charlotte. Bobo left the game versus No. 23 Ga. Tech with a leg injury. Redshirt freshman C **Malachi Toliver**, who started versus Charlotte filled in for Bobo against Tech and started against No. 9 UA in the SEC Championship Game.

*Redshirt senior **Micah Morris** (LG) is the only lineman to start every game.

*The Bulldogs have employed three different starting RGs, two different LTs, two different Cs and four different RTs.

*Junior LT **Monroe Freeling**, a 2nd Team Coaches All-SEC selection, had the longest starting streak at 10 games, but he left the UK game in the first quarter with a leg injury. He didn't start at AU but did earn SEC OL of the Week honors and then again versus #10 Texas.

*Bobo, a 2nd Team Coaches All-SEC pick, was named Outland Trophy National Player of the Week in leading the line in the road win over No. 15 UT.

*Freshman **Juan Gaston Jr.** has started at RG and RT. **Dontrell Glover**, who earned Coaches Freshman All-SEC honors, has started the last nine games at RG. Bobo started the first 10 games.

*Greene III, who has 31 career starts, has been hampered with a back issue during his career. He returned to his starting role in the win over No. 5 OM.

*RS-freshmen **Bo Hughley** saw action at RT in the win at No. 15 UT, made his first career start there against No. 17 UA plus started at LT against AU.

*The Bulldogs did not allow a sack in their first two games before the Vols collected four. Still, when the UT game was on the line, the offensive line came through. In overtime, it was three rushing plays for 25 yards that rallied the No. 6 Bulldogs to victory. Also of note, when Georgia trailed No. 15 UT 21-17 to start the 3rd quarter, the Bulldogs leaned on their running game, going 75 yards for a TD on 14 plays (13 rushes) to take their first lead.

**Did You Know?* Gaston joined Andrew Thomas (RT, 2017) as the only true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener in the Smart era. Thomas went on to be a first round pick (fourth overall selection) in the 2020 NFL draft by the New York Giants. He remains a starter for the Giants.

Tight Ends Always in the Game Plan

Currently, six former Bulldog tight ends are in the NFL, most notably Brock Bowers (Las Vegas). The Bulldogs aim to continue that trend.

*Junior **Lawson Luckie** (14 rec., 138 yards, 4 TDs) and senior **Oscar Delp** (19 rec., 245 yards, 1 TD) are playing the lead roles. Redshirt freshmen **Jaden Reddell** (1 rec., 9 yards) has appeared in every game this year while freshman **Elyiss Williams** (7 rec., 117 yards, 1 TD) has played in 12 games.

*Against No. 5 OM, Luckie became the first Bulldog with three TD catches in a game since 2008 (Mohamed Massaquoi vs. Ga. Tech).

*Williams' lone catch in the win at MSU was a big one, covering 24 yards on a 3rd-and-11 play. He had one catch for 14 yards in the win over UF.

*Highly-touted freshmen **Ethan Barbour** went down with a leg injury in game two (Austin Peay) and has been out since September. He joined Delp in the starting lineup in the opener while Williams notched a 23-yard TD on his first career catch. Delp also did that in 2022 against South Carolina.

*In the road win over No. 15 UT, Luckie had three catches for 25 yards while Delp had one for 18 yards. Georgia posted a season-high 502 yards of offense.

*A tight end did not have a catch against Austin Peay, marking the first time that happened since a 2021 win over Arkansas. Georgia was 7-for-11 that day.

Defense Steadily Improving

Georgia has had 55 players drafted over the past five seasons, including 30 on defense and 11 of those defenders have gone in the first round.

*Opponents have scored 207 points this year (15.9 ppg/11th nationally).

*In 2025, opponents have scored 65 points in the 1st quarter (21 of those at #15 UT) and 47 in the 2nd quarter. However, in the 2nd half, the Bulldogs have allowed a total of 92 points (plus 3 points in OT).

*In the SEC Championship Game, No. 9 UA was shut out for the first three quarters and finished with a season-low 7 points, marking just the third time it has been held to single digits since 2011. UA came in averaging 33.3 points.

*No. 23 Ga. Tech averaged 35.3 points and were held to three field goals.

*No. 10 Texas averaged 29.6 points and managed just 10 points.

*No. 5 OM scored 14 in the 3rd quarter and then were shut out in the 4th quarter.

*Shut out Auburn in the 2nd half after trailing 10-3 at the half in a 20-10 win.

*Blanked No. 17 UA in the 2nd half after it scored 24 points in the first half.

*UK had seven points in the 1st half, and it's final TD came courtesy of a 23-yard drive following a turnover with 1:51 left and Georgia up 35-7.

*Georgia had a 38-7 lead at MSU before allowing 14 points in the 2nd half.

Stopping the Run Starts Up Front

Georgia ranks fourth nationally, allowing only 79.2 rushing yards a game.

*In the SEC Championship Game win over No. 9 UA, the Bulldogs limited the Crimson Tide to minus three yards rushing, their second lowest total ever.

*Against No. 10 Texas, UT managed only 23 yards on 17 attempts. UT entered the game averaging 135.3 yards on the ground. Most recently versus No. 23 Ga. Tech who averaged 215 rushing yards, it finished with 69 on 23 attempts.

*No. 15 Tennessee averaged 252.5 rushing yards and 605 yards of total offense/game and Georgia limited them to 125 rushing yards (34 att.) and 496 yards of total offense. Also of note, No. 5 OM had just 88 rushing yards.

*No. 17 UA was held to 117 yards (38 att.) for a 3.1 average while UK averaged 188 yards and finished with only 45 yards on 22 attempts.

*Redshirt junior **Christen Miller** and juniors **Jordan Hall** and **Gabe Harris Jr.**, are the veterans up front with redshirt sophomore **Xzavier McLeod** now stepping in for the injured Hall the past six games. McLeod made his first career start at MSU and tallied three tackles.

*Miller had two tackles and three QB pressures versus No. 15 UT and five tackles, a half sack and three QB pressurers against MSU.

*Harris Jr., had a career-high five stops at AU and made four in the win at MSU.

*Redshirt freshmen **Joseph Jonah-Ajonye**, **Nnamdi Ogboko**, redshirt sophomore **Josh Horton** (Miami) and freshmen **Elijah Griffin** and **JJ Hanne** are in the rotation. Griffin, who earned Coaches Freshman All-SEC honors, got his first career sack against Charlotte.

*Jonah-Ajonye posted a career-high three stops versus Austin Peay. Griffin had two tackles each against UK and AU while Horton, who has shown an ability to win one-on-one battles, made three tackles against No. 17 UA. Ogboko got his first career sack versus UK.

Steady Linebacking Trio Sees Next Wave Emerging

Juniors **CJ Allen** and **Raylen Wilson** are the tackle leaders with sophomore **Quintavius Johnson** rounding out the trio that started the first 10 games until Allen missed the Charlotte contest due to injury. They combined for 2.5 of the team's three sacks in the road win over MSU while Johnson and freshman **Zayden Walker** each had a sack against No. 10 Texas. Allen returned against No. 23 Ga. Tech following knee surgery as Smart said "he's wired different."

*The All-America Allen (85 tackles, 8 TFL, 3.5 Sacks) ranks third in the SEC averaging 7.3 tackles per game. He had a career-high 13 stops in the win over UF. He notched his first career forced fumble and fumble recovery in the win over UK and then forced a key fumble at the goal line at AU. He made a team-high 10 tackles, a sack, two TFL at AU and followed that with 10 stops versus No. 5 OM. He left the game versus No. 10 Texas in the first half due to a leg injury. *Allen was a finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Butkus Award plus a semifinalist for the Bednarik Award and the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award.

*Wilson (70 tackles, 5.5 TFL, 2.5 Sacks) collected a career-best nine stops and three QB pressures in the road win over No. 15 UT and made six tackles plus 1.5 sacks and four QB pressures in the road victory over MSU.

*Johnson made a career-best six tackles in the win over No. 23 Tech. He had five stops in the win over UK, forced a fumble at MSU and finished with five stops.

*Sophomore **Chris Cole**, who has a team-high 4.5 sacks, saw extensive playing time against No. 10 Texas when Allen left in the first half with an injury. Cole set a career-high with a team-best seven stops in the win over the Longhorns. He made his first start against Charlotte and tallied four stops and a sack. He made six tackles with one sack and two QB pressures against No. 15 Tennessee.

*Sophomore **Justin Williams** posted a career-high six stops versus UK, collected five tackles at MSU and made four stops against No. 10 Texas. He had a team-





best five tackles against Charlotte. he recovered a blocked punt against No. 9 UA in the SEC Championship Game.

*Freshman **Zayden Walker** has come on of late. He made an impact at MSU, tallying a career-high three stops. Then, he picked up his first career sack in the win over No. 10 Texas plus forced a fumble. Walker had another sack in the SEC Championship Game win over No. 9 UA.

A Passing Grade

Georgia's opponents are averaging 205.3 passing yards per game and have thrown for 12 TDs this season.

*The Bulldog defense has nine interceptions and generated 20 sacks.

*After No. 17 UA posted a 68% conversion rate (13-of-19) on 3rd Down in the regular season contest, Georgia limited UA to 3-of-14 conversions in the SEC title game as it finished 19-for-39 in the air.

*In Atlanta, No. 23 Ga. Tech finished with 181 passing yards and no TDs with just two completions over 25 yards. Redshirt freshman **Ellis Robinson IV** notched his team-best fourth INT, which tied him for the SEC lead with Bray Hubbard (UA) and Ty Bryant (UK).

*Georgia was tested often in SEC play. Against No. 10 Texas, the Longhorns had 251 yards on 43 attempts but only one catch was more than 25 yards. The Bulldogs had three sacks against UT who finished 2-for-12 on 3rd Downs and 2-for-3 on 4th Downs.

*Georgia limited MSU to 173 passing yards and no TD catches. MSU was averaging 250.6 passing yards and posted just two explosive plays (20+ yards) with only one of those via the pass and that was late in the 4th quarter.

*The top passing attack came at No. 15 Tennessee as the Vols were averaging 352 yards, and Joey Aguilar tallied 371 yards in a shootout. Coming in to that game, the Bulldogs had not allowed a passing TD, and the Vols collected four including three big ones that covered 32, 56 and 72 yards.

*Junior **Joemel Agüero**, who made a career-best seven tackles versus the Vols, and sophomore **KJ Bolden**, a 2nd Team Coaches All-SEC selection, came up with interceptions in the road win. This duo was tested in the road win over MSU. Bolden made a career-high 10 stops and recovered a fumble while Agüero tied his career high with seven tackles.

*Kentucky completed 25-of-41 passes for 225 yards and two scores. Robinson IV had an INT plus a career-high four tackles. Robinson had his team-high fourth INT in the win over No. 23 Tech.

*In Georgia's win at Auburn, the Tigers were 19-for-31 for 137 yards and one sack. Their longest completions was 18 yards. No. 5 Ole Miss threw for 263 yards and one TD (a 75-yard strike to start the 2nd half for a 28-20 lead).

*Senior **Daylen Everett**, the MVP of the 2024 SEC Championship Game, entered 2025 with a team-best 28 consecutive starts but that was snapped when he missed the opener due to an injury and returned for week two. He made six stops against No. 17 UA and five against AU to lead the secondary. Everett was a 3rd Team Coaches All-SEC selection this season.

* Sophomore **Kyron Jones**, senior **JaCorey Thomas**, redshirt freshman **Demello Jones** and true freshman **Rasean Dinkins** have seen the most action. In fact, Dinkins made his first start in the SEC Championship Game.

***Kyron Jones**, who started the first six games and posted a career-high 10 stops at UT, injured his foot the week of the Ole Miss game and has been out. Thomas has started the past seven contests. He had one of his best games, tallying a career-high six tackles and his first career sack in the win over #9 UA.

*Against UF, **Zion Branch** made six stops while Thomas had five. After missing the MSU game, **Demello Jones** returned and made four stops and a PBU versus No. 10 Texas.

We're Going For It!

In the **Kirby Smart** era, the Bulldogs have a 64% success rate on 4th Down Conversion attempts (94-for-146) with 17 TDs.

*In 2025, Georgia leads the nation in 4th Down Conversions at 76% (13-for-17) with 3 TDs. One impressive conversion came against #5 Texas with Georgia leading 14-10 late in the 3rd quarter on a 4th-and-1 at the UGA 36.

Gunner Stockton completed a 10-yard pass to **Chauncey Bowens**. The Bulldogs would later score on the drive and go on to win 35-10.

* The Bulldogs were 2-for-3 on 4th Down in the win at Auburn including a 4th-and-1 at the AU 37 that helped set up the go-ahead 53-yard field goal in the 3rd quarter. Also, there was a 4th-and-3 at the AU 40 with 5:14 left in the contest. It was part of the clinching go-ahead TD drive that lasted a school record-tying eight minutes and 45 seconds.

*Down 38-30 with 2:38 remaining in the game against No. 15 Tennessee in

Knoxville, Georgia converted a 4th-and-6 at the UT 28 for a TD (Stockton pass-to-Humphreys). Also that day, Georgia trailed 21-7 in the 1st quarter and converted a 4th-and-3 at the UGA 48.

***Did You Know?** The only other fourth quarter 4th down conversion featuring a TD pass when Georgia was behind under Smart came in 2016 at Missouri. The Bulldogs trailed 27-21 with 1:31 left in the game and faced a 4th-and-10. Jacob Eason hit Isaiah McKenzie for a 20-yard TD in a 28-27 win.

*In 2024, Georgia led the SEC and ranked 16th nationally in 4th Down Conversions at 67% (18-for-27 with 4 TDs).

G'day Mate! Thorson Wins Ray Guy Award

With elite distance, hang time, placement and a strong coverage unit, All-America senior punter **Brett Thorson** and the Bulldogs rank 8th nationally in Net Punting at 43.1. On Dec. 12, Thorson was named the winner of the Ray Guy Award, which goes to the nation's top punter. He was a finalist in 2024.

*Boomed a season-long 66-yarder versus Florida in Jacksonville and 60-yarders versus UK, at AU, versus Charlotte and at No. 23 Tech to give him eight of those in his career. Four times in his career, Georgia hasn't had to punt in a game, the most recent time was in the win over No 5. Ole Miss this season.

*Thorson's career average of 45.5 (6,921/152) is very close to the school record held by Jake Camarda (45.8 from 2018-21). Also, Camarda holds the school record for Career Net Average at 41.5, and Thorson could own that mark as he currently owns a 42.8 average.

*In the SEC Championship Game win over No. 9 UA, Thorson was called on a career-high seven times and delivered a 45.3 average with a long of 59, five placed five inside the 20 and only one return for minus four yards.

*Against No. 23 Tech in Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Thorson posted a 51.2 average on four punts with a long of 61, no returns and one touchback.

*In his first two games in 2025, Thorson was named to the "Ray's 8," the weekly Ray Guy Award group. At #15 Tennessee, he had three punts for a 47.7 average including a long of 52 with two placed inside the 20 and no return yards.

*In the 2024 SEC Championship Game, Thorson's season ended due to a knee injury during a return after a punt. He missed the 2025 opener while still recovering with redshirt freshman **Drew Miller** serving as the punter. Thorson returned to his starting role in week two versus Austin Peay.

* A native of Melbourne, Australia, Thorson was a 2024 finalist for the Ray Guy Award (47.6 avg. on 42 punts, the second best mark in school history).

* Thorson's social media features a comedic slant about his lack of playing time because the Bulldogs punted a record low 32 times in 2023 (14 games) and 36 punts in 2022 (15 games), the two lowest totals dating to at least 1948.

* Along with **Cole Speer**, gunners in 2025 have included **KJ Bolden**, **London Humphreys**, **Jeremy Bell** and **Talyn Taylor**.

Single Game Career Highs For Thorson

Branch had a season-high 134 all-purpose yards in the win over No. 10 Texas. *Branch was named to the Paul Hornung Award Honor Roll for his performance in the road win over No. 15 Tennessee. He had five catches for 69 yards including a 36-yard TD, caught the game-tying two-point conversion with 2:32 left in regulation, had one KOR for 28 yards and one rush for four yards. *At punt returner, Branch has done this as well during his career with the Trojans and Bulldogs (Career: 42-for-563 yards, 1 TD including 13 for 157 yards for UGA). In 2023, Branch won The Jet Award for the nation's top returner. Also, redshirt-freshman **Sacovie White-Helton** has five PR for 57 yards.

*Georgia's Uga has established himself as the nation's most well-known mascot. The line of pure white English bulldogs, which epitomizes everything Georgia, has been owned by the Frank W. "Sonny" Seiler family of Savannah, Ga., since Uga I first graced the campus in 1956.

*Boom is the 11th solid white English Bulldog to serve as Georgia's mascot since the line began in 1956 courtesy of the Seiler family of Savannah.

*Through the years, Uga has been defined by his spiked collar, a symbol of the position which he holds. He was given his name, an abbreviation for the university, by William Young of Columbus, a law school classmate of Seiler.

*As determined and published by the Pitt Press, the University of Georgia is the only major college that actually buries its mascots within the confines of the stadium.

*For the past 20 years, Uga's jerseys have been custom-made each season from the same material used for the players' jerseys.

*Uga's on-field home is a permanent air conditioned doghouse located next to the cheerleader's platform.

*What do Kirby Smart and Knute Rockne have in common? They registered their 100th career win in just 117 games! That ranks as the fifth fastest in NCAA FBS history behind Gil Dobie (108), George Woodruff (109), Bud Wilkinson (111) and Fielding Yost (114).

*During his Georgia career as head coach, Kirby Smart has had as many first round NFL draft picks (20) as losses (20). A total of 76 Bulldogs have been drafted in the Smart era.

*Georgia's 117 wins since 2016 trails only Alabama (120) in that span among all FBS teams.

*During Georgia's school record 33-game home winning streak from 2019-2025, the Bulldogs beat 10 ranked teams including No. 1 Tennessee in 2022, No. 7 Tennessee in 2024, No. 7 Auburn in 2020, No. 8 Kentucky in 2021 and No. 9 Ole Miss in 2023.

Academic & Community Service in the Smart Era

* The University of Georgia ranked No. 19 in *U.S. News & World Report's* 2026 ranking of the best public universities in the nation, marking the 10th consecutive year that UGA has placed in the top 20.

*The 2025 Bulldogs featured 11 players who wore the "SEC Graduate" patch on their uniform during the regular season: **Liam Badger, Dillon Bell, Luke Bennett, Oscar Delp, Earnest Greene III, Cash Jones, Gunner Stockton, Beau Gardner** (UCLA), **Josh McCray** (Illinois), **Micah Morris** and **Brett Thorson**. Additionally, 10 more Bulldogs earned their degree in December: **Henry Bates, Tyler Clark** (2016-19), **Daylen Everette, Terrell Foster, Patrick Hester, Justin Houston** (2008-10), **Cooper Johnson, Toby Johnson** (2013-14), **Christen Miller** and **Kavon Townsend**. Clark, Houston and Johnson all played in the NFL and then returned this year to finish their degree.

* A total of 290 players have made the SEC Academic Honor Roll including a high of 48 in 2024.

* Under Smart, Bulldogs have been named National Football Foundation (NFF) Hampshire Society Members 19 times. The society is comprised of football players from all divisions who maintained a cumulative GPA of 3.2 or better in their career, were starters or significant contributors and have completed their final year of eligibility. The most recent members were **Beau Gardner** and Charlie Ham.

* Ladd McConkey, a 2nd round pick of the L.A. Chargers in 2024, became the 15th Bulldog since 1966 to be named a Campbell Trophy finalist and NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award winner. He received an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship. Georgia leads the SEC and is tied for sixth nationally with its 15 honorees. Senior **Oscar Delp** was a 2025 Campbell Trophy semifinalist.

* Members of the football team play in the annual Bulldogs Battling Breast Cancer charity golf tournament in the summer. It has raised more than \$2 million since the event began in 2004. This year, former Bulldog and NFL standout Jordan Jenkins is donating \$100 per sack that the Bulldogs record in 2025.

* In 2024, Malaki Starks became the 24th Bulldog since 1992 to earn a spot on the AFCA Good Works Team, which honors 22 men annually for their community service. Georgia's 24 recipients leads the nation.

*In October of 2023 and 2024, the team participated in the Chick-fil-A Dawg Bowl. It was led by former Bulldog coach Mark Richt and raised more than \$750,000 each year for Parkinson's and Crohn's disease.

* In September of 2020, it was announced that Kirby and Mary Beth Smart contributed \$1 million to UGA and the Athletic Association's new social justice program, scholarships for senior athletes whose seasons were affected by the pandemic and the expansion of the football program.

Development Leads Bulldogs to NFL Career

- 76 Bulldogs have been selected in the NFL Draft under Smart including 20 First Round picks.
- 13 Bulldogs were selected in the 2025 NFL draft including three in the first round.
- Georgia's total of 25 players selected in the 2022 & 2023 NFL Draft were the most by a single school in consecutive drafts in the modern era (since 1967).
- Georgia had a record 15 players selected in the 2022 draft including five in the first round starting with the No. 1 overall pick, Travon Walker, DL (Jacksonville). Since the 2022 draft, the Bulldogs have had 46 players selected by NFL teams.

No. 5 Georgia 45, Marshall 7

Aug. 30, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — The fifth-ranked Georgia football team opened its season Saturday afternoon with a 45-7 win over Marshall at Sanford Stadium, extending the nation's longest home winning streak to 32 games. The sellout crowd of 93,033, along with a national television audience on ESPN, saw quarterback Gunner Stockton run for a pair of touchdowns and throw for two more, while the Bulldog defense held the Thundering Herd to just seven first downs.

Georgia outgained Marshall 488-207, with the Bulldogs rushing for 239 and throwing for 249; five different Bulldogs scored touchdowns. Defensively, Georgia held the Herd to just 72 yards of offense through the first three quarters. Linebacker Raylen Wilson paced the defense with seven stops, including two for loss.

Marshall got the ball to start the game and immediately ran into a stout Georgia defense. The Herd lost a yard over three plays and quickly punted. The Bulldog offense then went 70 yards in eight plays, taking a 7-0 lead on Dwight Phillips, Jr.'s 17-yard touchdown run. Stockton found wideout Zachariah Branch for a 25-yard gain on third-and-3 earlier in the drive, and then Stockton ran for 14 yards on fourth-and-2 at the Herd 31. Phillips scored on the next play.

Just like the opening drive, the Bulldogs ran the ball in for their second score. This time, it was Stockton with an effective fake handoff to Chauncey Bowers that gave the quarterback space to run the ball in from the 13 on fourth-and-1, making it 14-0. Stockton and Branch also connected for a big gain on third down on this drive, a 23-yarder on third-and-5.

With 10:15 left in the first half, Georgia got its first big special teams play of the season, a blocked punt by KJ Bolden deep in Marshall territory. A couple of plays later, Stockton ran the ball in for an 11-yard touchdown and a 21-0 lead with 9:07 on the clock.

Bulldog kicker Peyton Woodring connected on a 43-yard field goal attempt with 24 seconds remaining in the half, giving Georgia a 24-0 lead.

Georgia's offense got the ball to begin the third quarter and showed some explosiveness with a 47-yard touchdown pass from Stockton to Branch, who took the screen pass to the left and covered all 47 yards after the catch. Stockton's third career touchdown pass made it 31-0 with 13:13 left in the quarter.

A Stockton pass to wideout London Humphreys in the back of the end zone on fourth down at the Marshall 2 made it 38-0 with 3:51 to play in the third quarter. Ryan Puglisi led the Bulldogs to another touchdown, finding tight end Elyiss Williams for a 23-yard score and a 45-0 lead with 14:18 left in the game. Marshall got on the scoreboard with 10:27 to go, with Joshon Barbie scoring on a 1-yard run.

Coch Kirby Smart said...

"I am happy for these kids. They work year-round. You only get so many games. I was really pleased with our guys coming out with a great attitude, great opening drive, converted some fourth downs. Really big drive to start the second half to kind of put it out of reach. I am proud of the way our team competed."



Elyiss Williams scored his first career touchdown against Marshall.

- Georgia is now 102-27-3 in season-openers all-time, including 10-0 under head coach Kirby Smart. The Bulldogs' 32-game home win streak is both a school record and the longest active streak in the FBS. The NCAA record is 58, set by Miami from 1985-94.
- Backup QB Ryan Puglisi found tight end Elyiss Williams for a 23-yard score and a 45-0 lead with 14:18 left in the game. It was the first career touchdown pass for Puglisi, and the first career catch (and score) for Williams.
- Saturday's win was a little different from the only other meeting between the Bulldogs and Thundering Herd. When Marshall visited Georgia in 2004, the Bulldogs got behind 3-0 before winning 13-3.
- The Branch brothers, Zachariah and Zion, made strong debuts for the Bulldogs after transferring from USC. Zachariah led the wideouts with three catches for 98 yards and a 47-yard touchdown, while Zion, a reserve safety, tied for the team lead with seven tackles.
- Safety KJ Bolden's biggest play was on special teams, when he blocked a punt that was recovered by linebacker Terrell Foster at the Marshall 20-yard line.
- The captains for the Marshall game were offensive linemen Earnest Greene, III and Drew Bobo, linebacker CJ Allen and defensive lineman Christen Miller. The Thundering Herd won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff.





No. 4 Georgia 28, Austin Peay 6

Sept. 6, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — After a weather delay of more than two hours, the fourth-ranked Georgia football team knocked off Austin Peay, 28-6, at Sanford Stadium, extending the nation’s longest home winning streak to 33 games in front of a sellout crowd of 93,033 and a national television audience on ESPN+.

Running backs Chauncey Bowens and Nate Frazier rushed for a pair of touchdowns each to help lift Georgia over the Governors, an FCS program. Quarterback Gunner Stockton was 26 of 34 passing for 227 yards, and Georgia’s rushing trio of Frazier, Bowens and Dwight Phillips, Jr., combined for 180 yards on 32 carries.

The Bulldogs were denied by Austin Peay at the 1-yard line on five straight plays to end the first half, keeping the score 14-3. Late in the third quarter and early in the fourth, Georgia’s defense denied the Governors on a long series of plays inside the 10, keeping the Bulldog lead at 21-6. Georgia then tied a school record with a 99-yard touchdown drive that was capped by a win-sealing Frazier 1-yard rush.

The kickoff was moved up an hour to 2:30 p.m. because of thunderstorms that were expected to pass through Athens later in the afternoon. Those storms arrived in the region as the first half was ending. Per SEC rules, play was halted for 30 minutes whenever there was a lightning strike within eight miles of the stadium — and the clock reset after each subsequent strike.

Georgia committed its first turnover of the season on its opening drive, a Frazier fumble near midfield that Peay cornerback Ellis Ellis, Jr., recovered. The Bulldog defense quickly forced a punt, so no harm was done, and the Georgia offense got right back to work on its second drive. Bowens put UGA ahead 7-0 with two-yard rush with 5:55 left in the first quarter.

On the ensuing Peay drive, Georgia linebacker Chris Cole got the sophomore’s first career sack, for a loss of eight yards. Later, after Peay was forced to punt, Frazier ran the ball in from the 2 for his first touchdown of the season and a 14-0 lead.

The Governors connected on a 44-yard field goal by Carson Smith to cut the lead to 14-3 with 9:08 remaining. After the two-hour delay during halftime, Georgia immediately got a defensive stop, and then the offense drove 60 yards for a touchdown. Bowens’ 14-yard rush made it 21-3 lead with 10:54 left in the third.

Georgia’s next possession ended with a fumble by wideout London Humphreys, and the Gobs turned that into a 43-yard field goal, making it 21-6 with 5:51 to go in the third. After the Bulldogs’ big defensive stop inside the 10 late in the third and early in the fourth, Georgia went 99 yards to put the game away on Frazier’s score. Linebackers CJ Allen and Raylen Wilson led the defense with seven tackles each.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

“I really thought we came out of the delay with some juice. It was cool out, the music was good, the fans were excited, players were excited, it wasn’t near as hot. We came out and got a three-and-out, came down to score, and seized the momentum, so I was really proud of our guys for that.”

Worth Noting...

- It was a career day for sophomore running back Chauncey Bowens, who scored the first two touchdowns of his career and ran for a career-high 56 yards on 11 carries. He ran the ball five times on Georgia’s 10-play drive that put UGA up 7-0, scoring from the 2-yard line.
- Senior wide receiver Colbie Young was QB Gunner Stockton’s top target, catching seven passes for 76 yards. Junior London Humphreys was second with three catches for 29. Stockton completed his first 10 passes in the game, finishing 26 of 34 for 227 yards.
- A marathon touchdown drive of 99 yards, the seventh time a Georgia team has done that, ended with a 1-yard Nate Frazier rush and a 28-6 lead with 5:39 remaining. The 17-play drive lasted 8:43, the second-longest touchdown drive in program history.
- Offensive linemen Jahzare Jackson and Michael Uini made their first career starts, while cornerback Daylen Everette returned to the starting lineup after missing the opener with an injury.
- Punter Brett Thorson, a 2024 All-American, made his 2025 debut against the Governors. After suffering a major knee injury in last season’s SEC Championship Game, Thorson missed the College Football Playoffs and was held out of the opener against Marshall. In his first outing, Thorson punted four times, for a 43.8-yard average, and had one downed at the 4-yard line.
- The captains for the Austin Peay game were quarterback Gunner Stockton, wide-out Colbie Young, linebacker Raylen Wilson and safety KJ Bolden. Georgia won the toss and elected to receive, something the Bulldogs hadn’t done after winning the toss since 2023.



**No. 6 Georgia 44, No. 15 Tennessee 41 (OT)**

Sept. 13, 2025 • Neyland Stadium • Knoxville, Tenn.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — At the end of a back-and-forth game Saturday afternoon at Neyland Stadium, Georgia running back Josh McCray scored on a 1-yard run in overtime to lift No. 6 Georgia to a 44-41 win over No. 15 Tennessee in front of a sellout crowd of 101,915, along with a national television audience on ABC.

The SEC opener for both teams featured nearly 1,000 yards of offense, with Georgia gaining 502 and Tennessee 496. Quarterback Gunner Stockton finished 23 of 31 passing for 304 yards and two touchdowns, and the Georgia rushing attack piled up 198 yards on the ground. Defensively, linebacker CJ Allen had a team-high 11 tackles, and defensive backs Joenel Aguiero and KJ Bolden each had interceptions.

Tennessee quarterback Joey Aguilar capped the Vols' opening drive with a 4-yard touchdown run. The Bulldogs answered with their own impressive drive, beginning with a 45-yard completion from Stockton to Colbie Young. Stockton later hit Zachariah Branch for 10 yards, and capped the drive with a 6-yard touchdown run.

The Vols' next drive ended after two plays, on a 72-yard touchdown pass from Aguilar to Chris Brazzell II. Tennessee later took a 21-7 lead on Aguilar's 14-yard touchdown pass to Brazzell with 3:37 left in the first.

Georgia responded with a nine-play, 72-yard drive that included a Stockton pass to Branch for a first down on fourth-and-3 at the Bulldog 48. Later, Stockton threw a screen pass to Branch that the wideout turned into a 36-yard touchdown, cutting the UT lead to 21-14. Late in the first half, the Bulldogs drove down to the Tennessee 2-yard line before having to settle for a Peyton Woodring 20-yard field goal.

Georgia opened the second half with a 14-play drive to take a 24-21 lead, scoring on a 1-yard McCray touchdown. Late in the third, Georgia's defense produced another interception, this time by Bolden. Woodring's 48-yard field goal made it 27-21 Bulldogs.

The Vols answered with a 56-yard touchdown pass from Aguilar to Brazzell, putting Tennessee back in front. Woodring's 24-yard field goal gave Georgia the lead, 30-28, with 12:20 remaining in the game.

Tennessee regained lead on a 32-yard pass from Aguilar to Braylon Staley with 11:01 to play. The Volunteers then stripped Stockton, recovering the ball at the Georgia 34. Tennessee turned the turnover into 3 points on Gilbert's 48-yard field goal, pushing its lead to 38-30.

Georgia tied the game with 2:32 to go when, facing fourth-and-6, Stockton hit Humphreys for a 28-yard touchdown. On the 2-point conversion attempt, Stockton found Branch on the left side, making it 38-38. Tennessee had time to drive down to the Georgia 25 and set Gilbert up for the game-winning score, but he missed from 43 yards out.

Tennessee got the ball first in OT and was held to a 42-yard Gilbert field goal. Nate Frazier ran left for 21 yards down to the 4 on the Bulldogs' first play of overtime, and McCray score the game-winner.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"It was a great college football game. I'm really proud of our guys; we talked about coming in here to conquer this place, which is not easy to do, and when you do something like that, you have to make your own way."

No. 17 Alabama 24, No. 5 Georgia 21

Sept. 27, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — In front of a sellout crowd of 93,033 Saturday night at Sanford Stadium and a national television audience on ABC, No. 17 Alabama handed fifth-ranked Georgia its first home loss since 2019, 24-21, snapping the longest win streak in the FBS at 33 games.

Alabama stopped the Bulldogs on fourth down at the Crimson Tide 8 with 13:20 remaining in the game to preserve the three-point lead. Georgia got 227 yards on the ground, including the first career 100-yard game from Chauncey Bowens, who ran for 119, and quarterback Gunner Stockton was 13 of 20 passing for 130 yards and a touchdown.

A year ago, Alabama snapped Georgia's record 28-game SEC regular-season game win streak with a victory in Tuscaloosa. On Saturday, the Bulldogs had few answers for Alabama's offense early in the game, and then couldn't quite make enough plays to tie or take the lead after cutting the Tide lead to 24-21 with 6:30 left in the third quarter.

Georgia's last home loss came on Oct. 12, 2019, a 20-17 double-overtime defeat against South Carolina. This time around, the Bulldogs never led. Alabama out-gained the Bulldogs 397-357, though Georgia averaged 6.7 yards per play to 5.2 for Bama.

The Tide took a 7-0 lead by capping a 14-play drive with a 6-yard touchdown pass from Ty Simpson to wide receiver Germie Bernard. Alabama later went up 14-0 on a 6-yard Simpson pass to Isaiah Horton.

Georgia's offense needed to make something happen, and it did. Stockton hit wide receiver Colbie Young wide open on the right side for a 38-yard touchdown, cutting the lead to 14-7 with 12:48 to go in the half.

After recovering a fumble at the Georgia 11, Alabama pushed its lead to 17-7 with a 24-yard field goal with 8:30 on the clock. Georgia answered with a touchdown drive that ended with a 2-yard Bowens run to the left side, cutting Alabama's lead to 17-14 with 2:08 remaining in the half. Earlier in the 11-play drive, Bowens broke free for a career-long 43-yard rush to the 10.

Simpson ran the ball in from the 2 for a 24-14 Tide lead with 34 seconds left in the half. At the break, Alabama had a 262-196 lead in total offense and an 18:35-11:25 lead in time of possession.

The Tide got the ball to start the second half and came away empty on the drive after Conor Talty missed a 43-yard field-goal attempt. Georgia took over at its 26-yard line and got a 43-yard reverse run from wideout Dillon Bell to get down to the Tide 25. The Bulldogs later scored on Josh McCray's 1-yard rush, cutting the lead to 24-21 with 6:30 left in the third.

Early in the fourth quarter, on fourth-and-1 at the Tide 8, Cash Jones was stopped for a loss of 3. Georgia's offense later got the ball back, but it wasn't able to get into field-goal range. Alabama the ball back at its 12 with 3:19 remaining and was able to run out the clock and hand the Bulldogs a rare home loss.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"The environment was incredible. It was probably the best environment I've ever been a part of here. The crowd did their part, that's for sure. The crowd was incredible and created a home field advantage that should have been enough for us to win, but we didn't play real well and they did."

- Georgia's ground game paced the offense with 227 yards on 33 carries, and Chauncey Bowens had the best game of his career. The sophomore finished with 12 carries for 119 yards and a 2-yard touchdown, including a career-long 43-yard rush, and caught a career-high four passes for 22 yards.

No. 12 Georgia 35, Kentucky 14

Oct. 4, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — Georgia quarterback Gunner Stockton rushed for a pair of touchdowns and threw for one more in the No. 12-ranked Bulldogs' 35-14 win over Kentucky on Saturday afternoon. It was a dominating performance in front of a Homecoming crowd of 93,033 at Sanford Stadium and a national television audience on ABC.

Stockton and wide receiver Dillon Bell each had a pair of rushing touchdowns, and the Bulldog offense piled up 425 yards of offense. Stockton, who sat out the fourth quarter, finished 15 of 23 passing for 196 yards and ran for 48 yards on six attempts.

The Bulldogs converted nine of their first 10 third-down attempts and finished with a 33:38-26:22 advantage in time of possession. The defense held the Wildcats to 270 yards — about a quarter of them coming after Georgia went up 35-7 and started sitting its starters — and forced two turnovers. Linebacker CJ Allen had six tackles, including a sack and two for loss; he also forced and recovered a fumble in the third quarter

After getting behind early in its previous two games, the Bulldogs got the ball to start the game against Kentucky and Stockton put the Bulldogs ahead with a 7-yard scramble and score.

Georgia began its next drive at its 4-yard line. A Stockton pass to London Humphreys for 18 yards moved the ball to the 22, and that was later followed by a 11-yard pass play to Nate Frazier. A 19-yard Stockton run on third-and-2 moved the ball to the Kentucky 29, and on the next play, the quarterback hit Humphreys for 17 yards plus a penalty on Kentucky. Two plays later, Stockton ran the ball in untouched for a 14-0 lead.

The Wildcats went 75 yards in four plays and scored on a 29-yard touchdown pass from Cutter Boley to tight end Josh Kattus to cut the Georgia lead to 14-7. Kentucky got the ball back soon after on an interception, but the Georgia defense forced a three-and-out to avoid any damage.

Georgia's next drive ended with a 60-yard Brett Thorson punt that Humphreys downed at the Kentucky 1-yard line. The Bulldog defense then forced their third three-and-out of the half. Bell then wrapped up the ensuing drive with a 3-yard score. His rush was Georgia's 23rd of the half, for 134 yards and three scores.

Allen forced and recovered a fumble on Kentucky's drive to open the second half, giving the Bulldog offense the ball at the Wildcat 38. Two plays later, Stockton hit tight end Oscar Delp for 36 yards down to the 5. On third down from the 3, Bell again ran the ball in untouched, pushing Georgia's lead to 28-7 with 10:54 left in the third.

The Bulldogs added to their lead later in the third with a 16-yard touchdown pass from Stockton to running back Cash Jones, making it 35-7 with 4:23 to play in the quarter.

Kentucky added a late touchdown on a 5-yard pass from Boley to Kendrick Law, cutting the lead to 35-14.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"It feels great. It's hard to win in the SEC, and you don't realize that until you're in it. It's hard to go on the road and win, and our guys came out with good juice today. I think we scored the first two or three drives — that was big, setting the tone; getting off the field some on defense was huge. I think that's a big success and a big step in the right direction for us."

Worth Noting...

- Wide receiver Dillon Bell had two carries for 6 yards, which doesn't sound like much. But both of his rushing attempts went for 3-yard touchdowns. Bell was also Georgia's leading receiver with four catches for 68 yards, highlighted by a one-handed grab with a defender all over him along the left sideline.
- Linebacker CJ Allen has made a ton of big plays in his three seasons with the Bulldogs, but Saturday's forced fumble and subsequent recovery were career firsts. The play was also the Georgia defense's first takeaway via fumble of the season. Allen and Justin Williams led the defense with six stops each; Allen also had a pair of tackles for loss, including a sack.
- Georgia's first two drives took the long route to the end zone. The first was a 12-play, 75-yard drive that ended with Gunner Stockton's 7-yard run into the end zone. The second covered 96 yards in 13 plays and also ended with a Stockton rush, this time from the 6-yard line. The Bulldogs got the job done on third down throughout the game, finishing 8 of 12.
- With the win, the Bulldogs improved to 57-6 since 2021, the best record in the FBS. Georgia is now 53-5 at Sanford Stadium under coach Kirby Smart. This was the program's ninth straight win on Homecoming.
- The captains for the game were cornerback Daylen Everette, linebacker Quintavious Johnson, tight end Lawson Luckie and left tackle Monroe Freeling. Kentucky won the toss and elected to defer to the second half, so the Bulldogs received the opening kickoff.





No. 10 Georgia 20, Auburn 10

Oct. 11, 2025 • Jordan-Hare Stadium • Auburn, Ala.

AUBURN, Ala. — It wasn't easy — it seldom is against Auburn — but the No. 10-ranked Georgia football team scratched and clawed its way back from a 10-0 deficit to knock off the Tigers, 20-10, Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium, in front of a sellout crowd of 88,043 and a national television audience on ABC.

Quarterback Gunner Stockton's 10-yard run for a touchdown with 1:53 to play sealed the Bulldogs' ninth straight win over the Tigers in the 130th edition of the Deep South's oldest rivalry. Georgia's win streak ties the longest ever in the series, set by the Bulldogs from 1923-31.

Stockton completed 24 of 37 passes for 217 yards and also led Georgia in rushing with nine carries for 26 yards. Zachariah Branch finished with nine receptions for 57 yards.

Auburn had a 237-78 advantage in total offense and a 21:48-8:12 advantage in time of possession at the half, and by the end, Georgia finished with 296 yards to Auburn's 277, and a 30:19-29:41 advantage possession. Georgia's defense held Auburn to 40 second-half yards; linebacker CJ Allen led the defense with 10 tackles, including two for loss and an 8-yard sack.

Auburn drove 75 yards in 14 plays to start the game, taking a 7-0 lead on quarterback Jackson Arnold's 2-yard run. Early in the second quarter, Georgia was able to hold Auburn to a 25-yard Alex McPherson field goal, pushing the Tiger lead to 10-0.

With less than two minutes to play in the half, Arnold dove over the pile from the 1 for the potential touchdown. But Georgia linebacker Raylen Wilson punched the ball out and safety Kyrion Jones recovered the fumble at the 2, earning the Bulldogs a huge stop with 1:32 left in the half.

Georgia got a lot of help from three Auburn penalties on the ensuing 12-play drive, including two 15-yarders. Peyton Woodring got the Bulldogs on the scoreboard with a 29-yard field goal, cutting the Tiger lead to 10-3.

Georgia's offense began its second drive of the third quarter with a 21-yard Stockton completion to wideout Colbie Young. Later, Stockton hit receiver Noah Thomas down the middle for 30 yards to the 2. On the next play, running back Chauncey Bowens ran the ball in for Georgia's first touchdown, tying the game 10-10 with 7:23 remaining in the third quarter.

The Bulldogs took a 13-10 lead on Woodring's 53-yard field goal with 1:22 left in the quarter. In the fourth, after a third straight Auburn three-and-out, Georgia got the ball back at its 22. On third-and-8 from the 24, Stockton hit wideout London Humphreys for 17 yards to the 41. Completions of 9 and 10 yards to Branch moved the ball into Auburn territory, and on fourth-and-3 at the 40, Stockton found Humphreys again, this time for 8 yards.

Later in the drive, Georgia converted a third-and-1 at the 23 when Stockton found Frazier for a 6-yard completion to the 17. Three plays later, Stockton ran it in from the 10 to make it 20-10 with 1:53 to play.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"It was a tale of two halves. Our kids never quit. I'm proud of our kids. I'm as proud of this team as probably any team ever for the performance. We did not come out and start fast, play well. They outplayed us. They played with momentum, tempo, run game, stopped us running the ball in the first half. Frustrating, but the kids never quit."

Worth Noting...

- This was the 130th meeting between Georgia and Auburn, a series that began back in 1892 with a 10-0 Auburn win in Atlanta; the first 10 times the teams met, they played in Atlanta. The first game played in Athens was in 1912, a 12-6 Bulldog win. Auburn didn't host Georgia until 1960, when the Tigers eked out a 9-6 win.
- Linebacker CJ Allen had team-highs in solo stops (6) and total tackles (10), with two tackles for loss including an 8-yard sack. Linebacker Raylen Wilson had six tackles and forced the game-changing fumble at the goal line at the end of the first half.
- In the first quarter, Auburn out-gained Georgia 141-14. In the second, Auburn had a 96-64 yardage advantage. Over the final two quarters, Georgia out-gained the Tigers 218-40. Auburn went 0-for-6 on third down in the second half after converting 8 of 11 in the first two quarters.
- On Georgia's final scoring drive, which last 16 plays, covered 78 yards and tied a school record by lasting 8:45, quarterback Gunner Stockton completed 7 of 8 passes for 63 yards before running the ball in for a 10-yard touchdown.
- Georgia's defense shut the Tigers out in the second half, limiting the Tigers to 40 yards on 23 plays and just three first downs.
- Six Bulldogs had at least two receptions, led by Zachariah Branch's nine for 57 yards, with 51 of those yards coming after the catch.
- The captains for the Bulldogs were center Drew Bobo, wide receiver Colbie Young, linebacker CJ Allen and defensive lineman Christen Miller. Georgia won the toss and deferred to the second half.



**No. 9 Georgia 43, No. 5 Ole Miss 35**

Oct. 18, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — In an offense-heavy matchup of top-10 teams Saturday afternoon in front of a sellout crowd of 93,033 at Sanford Stadium, and a national television audience on ABC, it was No. 9 Georgia's defense that came through in the fourth quarter against No. 5 Ole Miss. The Rebels scored touchdowns on their first five possessions in the game, but the Bulldogs shut them down in the fourth quarter and pulled out a 43-35 win.

Quarterback Gunner Stockton's fourth touchdown pass of the game, and third to tight end Lawson Luckie, a 7-yarder with 7:29 remaining, gave Georgia the lead for good. It came after the Bulldog defense got its first stop of the game, a three-and-out it had to have. Georgia later added a 42-yard Peyton Woodring field goal with 2:06 to play, and then stopped the Rebels for the third straight drive to seal the win.

Stockton finished 26 of 31 passing for 289 yards and a career-high four touchdowns, while the Bulldogs also rushed for 221 yards on 49 attempts. Georgia out-gained the Rebels 510-351 and had a 15-minute advantage in time of possession: 37:39-22:21.

A 51-yard Woodring field goal gave Georgia a 3-0 lead, but it didn't last long. Ole Miss answered with a 7-yard Trinidad Chambliss run for a touchdown. Georgia followed that with its own scoring drive. After making a great catch for 13 yards on a ball thrown behind him earlier in the drive, Luckie caught an 11-yard touchdown pass on the first play of the second quarter, putting the Bulldogs back in front.

The Rebels regained the lead, 14-10, on Kewan Lacy's 1-yard touchdown run. The back-and-forth continued on the next drive, with Stockton running the ball in from the 22, his longest rush of the season, for a 17-14 lead with 7:13 on the clock.

Ole Miss regained the lead, 21-17, on Lacy's 1-yard rush for a touchdown. On the final play of the half, Woodring made a 35-yard field goal to cut the Rebel lead to 21-20.

The Rebels only needed two plays to find the end zone on the first possession of the second half, with Chambliss connecting with De'Zhaun Stribling for a 75-yard score to push the Rebels' lead to 28-21.

Georgia once again responded with its own scoring drive, this one ending with a 3-yard touchdown pass from Stockton to Luckie. The Bulldogs' 2-point conversion attempt failed, allowing the Rebels to hold onto the lead, 28-26, with 10:02 remaining in the third. Ole Miss extended its lead soon after, going up 35-26 on Chambliss' 2-yard touchdown run.

Georgia's offense continued its very productive day, marching 75 yards in 12 plays and scoring on Stockton's 3-yard touchdown pass to Frazier on the left side. That cut the Rebel lead to 35-33 with 12:56 to go.

The Georgia defense got a three-and-out on Ole Miss' next drive, forcing the game's first punt. The Bulldogs made the most of the stop, taking a 40-35 lead with 7:29 remaining on Stockton's third pass to Luckie, this one covering 7 yards. The defense got two more stops to seal the victory.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"I credit this win to culture. I say it all the time: a culture win is as good as any win in your program. The culture of this team and the toughness and the physicality, it took over the game."

Worth Noting...

- With the win, Georgia improved to 8-0 in home games against top-10 teams under coach Kirby Smart. The Bulldogs are 54-5 overall at Sanford Stadium under Smart.
- The Rebels scored four rushing touchdowns against a Georgia defense that had allowed just four all season before Saturday. But the Bulldogs shut Ole Miss down in the fourth quarter, holding it to 13 yards and one first down over three drives in the final period.
- Georgia's rushing attack piled up 221 yards on 49 attempts, with three Bulldogs — running backs Nate Frazier and Chauncey Bowens and quarterback Gunner Stockton — combining for 192 yards on 37 rushes. Stockton, who threw four touchdown passes, also ran for a 22-yard TD.

No. 5 Georgia 24, Florida 20

Nov. 1, 2025 • EverBank Stadium • Jacksonville, Fla.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — The fifth-ranked Georgia football team got a 36-yard touchdown run from Chauncey Bowens with 4:36 to play in the game to rally past Florida, 24-20, Saturday at EverBank Stadium. The sellout crowd of 76,770, along with a national television audience on ABC, saw the Bulldogs overcome a second-half deficit and survive for the fourth time in SEC play this season.

Georgia trailed 20-17 midway through the final period when its defense got a big stop on fourth-and-1 at the UGA 18-yard line, and the offense responded by driving for the go-ahead score. Quarterback Gunner Stockton was 20-for-29 passing for 223 yards and two touchdowns, and wide receiver Zachariah Branch had a big day with 10 catches for 112 yards. Linebacker CJ Allen led the defense with 13 tackles.

Georgia got the ball to start the game and moved the 75 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead. A 12-yard pass from Stockton to wide receiver Dillon Bell on third-and-7 at the UGA 28-yard line kept the drive going, and the two connected again later to end the drive. On second-and-7 at the Florida 8, Stockton hit Bell in the end zone on a quick slant to put the Bulldogs in front early.

Florida tied the game with 6:32 left in the first quarter on a one-play drive, completing a 40-yard touchdown pass from DJ Lagway to Eugene Wilson III. The Gators got the ball back soon after, when a Stockton pass was intercepted by defensive back Devin Moore, giving Florida the ball at the Georgia 38. The Gators took a 10-7 lead on Trey Smack's 22-yard field goal with 3:02 to go in the quarter. The Bulldogs tied the game 10-10 with 12 seconds remaining in the first half on Peyton Woodring's 39-yard field goal.

After Georgia's defense forced a three-and-out to open the second half, the Bulldog offense went 74 yards in five plays and took a 17-10 lead on Stockton's 22-yard touchdown pass to Noah Thomas. Earlier in the drive, on third-and-5 at the UGA 31, Stockton hit Branch down the middle for a 42-yard gain.

The Gators tied the game on the ensuing drive, scoring on a 2-yard Jadan Baugh run with 3:37 to play in the third quarter. Florida took a 20-17 lead with 14:52 left in the game on a 54-yard Smack field goal.

Midway through the fourth, Florida had the ball at the Georgia 18 and went for it on fourth-and-1. The Bulldogs' Raylen Wilson and Elijah Griffin stopped the run short of the first down, and the offense took the field down three with 7:54 remaining.

Georgia made the most of the stop, regaining the lead, 24-20, on Bowens' touchdown run up the middle. Stockton and Branch connected for completions of 18 and 13 yards on the drive. The Bulldog defense stopped the Gators again on fourth down on the next drive, with defensive back Ellis Robinson IV breaking up a pass on fourth-and-4 at the Florida 31 with 3:13 to play. Georgia was then able to run out the clock and secure the win.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"Our kids were very resilient. Another night in the SEC. I don't know what else is going on around the country, but when you play in this league, every game comes down to the last few possessions. I thought we managed that well. Played the game, obviously in the fourth, had fourth downs where we were able to get a stop. That made the difference in the game."

Worth Noting...

- Against Georgia, Florida was facing its fifth top-10 opponent, and fourth in the top five, through eight games. Things won't get any easier for the Gators, who still have three games against teams in the top 15. Georgia, meanwhile, has played three games against ranked teams, and still has No. 20 Texas at Sanford Stadium on Nov. 15 and No. 8 Georgia Tech at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Nov. 28, among its final four regular-season games.
- Wide receiver Zachariah Branch had a career-high 10 catches for 112 yards. It was the USC transfer's first 100-yard game with the Bulldogs and the second of his college career. His brother Zion, a safety, had six tackles.
- Linebacker CJ Allen paced the defense with a career-high 13 tackles, and linebacker Raylen Wilson had eight, including the key fourth-and-1 stop on the UGA 18 (along with defensive lineman Elijah Griffin) in the fourth quarter. Twelve Bulldogs had at least two tackles.
- The quintet of Monroe Freeling, Micah Morris, Drew Bobo, Dontrell Glover and Earnest Greene III started on the offensive line for the third time this season. Due to injuries, Georgia has had to use six different starting fives on the line this season.
- The captains for the game were quarterback Gunner Stockton, wide receiver Dillon Bell, linebacker Raylen Wilson and defensive lineman Jordan Hall. Florida won the coin toss and deferred to the second half.





No. 5 Georgia 41, Mississippi State 21

Nov. 8, 2025 • Davis Wade Stadium • Starkville, Miss.

STARKVILLE, Miss. — The fifth-ranked Georgia football team used a dominant second quarter to pull ahead of Mississippi State and then rolled to a 41-21 win Saturday afternoon in front of a crowd of 53,017 at Davis Wade Stadium and a national television audience on ESPN. Quarterback Gunner Stockton and running back Nate Frazier led an explosive day for the offense, which produced a season-high 567 yards.

Down 7-3 after the opening quarter, Georgia scored 21 straight points in the second to take control and earn its sixth straight win over MSU. It was the 900th win in program history.

Stockton was 18 of 29 passing for 264 yards and the three touchdowns; Frazier needed just 12 carries to reach 181 yards, highlighted by a 59-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and a 33-yarder in the fourth. The Bulldogs as a team piled up 303 yards on the ground.

Safety KJ Bolden led the Georgia defense with 10 tackles, defensive back Joenel Aguero added seven, and linebackers Raylen Wilson and CJ Allen had six each; Wilson also had 1.5 sacks.

State got the ball first and took a 7-0 lead on quarterback Kamario Taylor's 4-yard touchdown run. Georgia got on the scoreboard on the ensuing drive with Peyton Woodring's 49-yard field goal; Stockton and wideout London Humphreys connected on a 36-yard pass to set up the field goal.

Georgia drove all the way down to the State 2-yard line on its next possession, but came up empty after Dillon Bell was stripped and MSU recovered. Georgia got the ball back a few plays later when linebacker Quintavius Johnson knocked the ball out of quarterback Blake Shapen's hands and Bolden recovered the fumble at the State 27. Running back Chauncey Bowens scored on a 4-yard rush to put Georgia ahead 10-7 with 14:04 left in the half.

The Bulldogs went up 17-7 when Stockton hit tight end Oscar Delp for an 8-yard touchdown with 5:09 on the clock. Earlier in the drive, Delp hauled in a 29-yard pass to the State 40. Georgia got a defensive stop on fourth-and-5 at the UGA 23 to get the ball back with 2:25 left in the half. The Bulldogs took a 24-7 lead with 11 seconds left on Stockton's screen pass to the left that Zachariah Branch ran in for a 19-yard touchdown.

Georgia got the ball to start the second half and quickly added to its lead. On second-and-7 at the UGA 41, Frazier got free on the right side and outran everyone for a career-long 59-yard touchdown, making it 31-7. The long run put Frazier over 100 yards in a game for the first time this season and the second time in the sophomore's career.

On UGA's next drive, Stockton found Noah Thomas near the 50 and the receiver did the rest, scoring a 64-yard touchdown to push the Bulldog lead to 38-7 with 9:58 to play in the third. Georgia's final points came on a 46-yard Woodring field goal early in the fourth quarter.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"We had good leadership this week. Our players believe in the way we practice, and that conditioning level was huge today. It was hot. It was way hotter than we expected. ... I thought we were well conditioned. And we ran the ball and we stopped the run, so that was two big things. I'm proud of our guys."

Worth Noting...

- The victory was the 900th all-time for Georgia, which is one of nine FBS programs to ever reach the milestone. The Bulldogs' all-time record is 900-433-54.
- Sophomore running back Nate Frazier ran the ball 12 times for a career-high 181 yards and a touchdown. His TD run in the third quarter was a career-long rush of 59 yards — and he added a 33-yard run in the fourth despite losing his right shoe near the line of scrimmage.
- Georgia and MSU traded fumbles in the first quarter, but it was Georgia that made the most of its takeaway. State forced and recovered its fumble at its 2 line to kill a UGA threat, and Georgia got the ball back soon after when linebacker Quintavius Johnson knocked the ball loose and safety KJ Bolden recovered at the State 27. A few plays later, Georgia took the lead on a 4-yard Chauncey Bowens TD run.
- Georgia came into the game with eight sacks through its first eight games. At MSU, the Bulldogs got three. Linebacker Raylen Wilson had 1.5 sacks, and the rest were half-sacks split among Johnson, linebacker CJ Allen and defensive linemen Christen Miller.
- The captains for Georgia were wide receiver Zachariah Branch, offensive lineman Monroe Freeling, cornerback Daylen Everette and linebacker CJ Allen. Mississippi State won the toss and received the opening kickoff.





No. 5 Georgia 35, No. 10 Texas 10

Nov. 15, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — The fifth-ranked Georgia football team played to win again and again against No. 10 Texas on Saturday night at Sanford Stadium. The Bulldogs were aggressive on fourth down, even in their territory, and they even tried and converted a surprise onside kick after scoring early in the fourth quarter. The sellout crowd of 93,033, along with a national television audience on ABC, saw that aggression pay off in a 35-10 win.

Georgia quarterback Gunner Stockton tied a career high with four touchdown passes, wide receiver Noah Thomas caught two of them, and the Bulldogs scored touchdowns on their first two drives to go ahead 14-3, and then finished strong with three more in the fourth quarter.

Stockton, who also ran for a touchdown, finished 24 of 29 passing for 229 yards, and Georgia out-gained Texas 357-274. Texas quarterback Arch Manning was held to 251 yards, with a touchdown and an interception, on 27-for-43 passing; he was also sacked three times. Georgia's defense held Texas to 23 yards rushing on 17 attempts. Linebacker Chris Cole led the defense with seven tackles, including one of UGA's seven tackles for loss.

Texas got the ball to start the game, and took a 3-0 lead on a 33-yard Mason Shipley field goal. Georgia answered with its own good drive, and it ended with Stockton throwing a 17-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Noah Thomas for a 7-3 Bulldog lead. The ending of Georgia's second drive was the same as the first, with Stockton hitting Thomas in the end zone, this time from the 4, to make it 14-3 Bulldogs.

In the third quarter, Texas' defense picked off a Stockton pass at the Bulldog 36-yard line, and the Longhorns later turned the turnover into a touchdown. Manning hit Ryan Wingo for a 7-yard score with 5:27 to go in the third quarter, cutting Georgia's lead to 14-10. It was the first score for either team since the Bulldogs' touchdown with 12:49 to go in the first half, a span of 11 drives.

Georgia made it two scoring drives in a row by getting aggressive. After converting a fourth-and-1 on its own 36 with a pass from Stockton to running back Chauncey Bowens for 10 yards, Georgia drove down to the UT 30. On first down, Stockton threw over the top to London Humphreys for a 30-yard score and a 21-10 lead with 14:20 to play in the game.

Georgia's aggressiveness continued on the kickoff, with the Bulldogs converting an onside kick that running back Cash Jones recovered at the UGA 47. It was Georgia's first successful onside kick since 2013, and it led to a touchdown. The Bulldogs went 53 yards in nine plays, taking a 28-10 lead with 8:53 to go on Stockton's fourth touchdown pass of the night. This one, a 6-yarder, went to tight end Lawson Luckie on the right side of the end zone.

Georgia pushed its lead to 35-10 with 4:43 to play on Stockton's four-yard rush for a touchdown.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"Our offense, it's like a big, strong anaconda just squeezing you. You get squeezed, and you finally catch a little air, and then they're back trying to suffocate you (after the onside kick). So it was a big momentum play, and it would have been, every one of y'all would have thought I was an idiot if it didn't work. So that's okay, too, that's part of football."

Worth Noting...

- The Bulldogs, who beat the Longhorns twice in 2024, once in Austin and again in the SEC Championship Game, had never hosted Texas in Athens before Saturday. Their only in-state meeting before last season was in Atlanta in 1957. Saturday's win evened the all-time series at 4-4.
- Georgia's defense sacked Arch Manning three times and had seven tackles for loss. Defensive end Gabe Harris, Jr. had a sack and 1.5 TFLs; linebackers Quintavious Johnson and Zayden Walker each had a sack. Safety KJ Bolden had Georgia's only takeaway with an interception in the second quarter.
- The Bulldogs improved to 9-0 against top-10 teams under Kirby Smart, and are now 55-5 at home overall. Georgia finished its SEC schedule 7-1 despite falling behind in seven of the eight games.

No. 4 Georgia 35, Charlotte 3

Nov. 22, 2025 • Dooley Field at Sanford Stadium • Athens, Ga.

ATHENS, Ga. — The fourth-ranked Georgia football team cruised to a 35-3 win over Charlotte on Saturday in front of a sellout crowd of 93,033 at Sanford Stadium and a national television audience on SEC Network. On Senior Day, it was a freshman running back, Bo Walker, who had a breakout game, scoring the first three touchdowns of his career.

In the first meeting between the Bulldogs and 49ers, Georgia took control early, scoring on a pair of Nate Frazier rushing touchdowns in the first quarter. By halftime, after a pair of Walker touchdown runs in the second, the lead was 28-3. Georgia out-gained the 49ers 449-169, with 30 first downs to Charlotte's seven.

Bulldog quarterback Gunner Stockton played a little more than a half, finishing 17 of 21 for 196 yards. Backup Ryan Puglisi took over midway through the third quarter and was 7 of 11 passing for 49 yards.

Georgia took a 7-0 lead on its second possession of the game, driving 60 yards in nine plays and scoring on a 2-yard Frazier run. The touchdown was set up by a 29-yard completion from Stockton to tight end Lawson Luckie down to the 2-yard line.

On Georgia's next possession, a 17-yard completion to wideout Zachariah Branch got things going. On fourth-and-1 at the 49er 34, Stockton dove for the first down, and it was Frazier that again found the end zone, rushing the ball in from the 7 to make it 14-0.

The Bulldogs were already going to their bench early in the second quarter, and Walker, a reserve with 13 carries all season heading into the game, put Georgia up 21-0 with 11:29 left in the half. Walker ran the ball in from the 15 for his first career touchdown. His second came soon after.

Charlotte got a first down on the ensuing drive, its first of the game, but the drive didn't last long. That's because three plays later, Georgia cornerback Ellis Robinson IV picked off a Grayson Loftis pass at the Bulldog 38. It was the redshirt freshman's team-high third interception of the season.

Georgia once again moved the ball through and past the 49er defense, and once again it was Walker doing the scoring. Two plays after Stockton hit Branch for a 19-yard gain to the Charlotte 21, Walker ran the ball in from the 12 to push the Bulldog lead to 28-0 with 3:27 left in the half.

The 49ers made their first big play on defense late in the half, intercepting a Stockton pass with 38 seconds to go. Liam Boyd kicked a 42-yard field goal as time expired to make it 28-3 at the half.

In the third quarter, Stockton hit wide receiver Noah Thomas for a 38-yard gain down to the 49er 11, and Walker later made it 35-3 with a 3-yard touchdown run. Walker finished the game with nine carries for 47 yards, as well as the first two receptions of his career.

In the fourth, the 49ers were threatening inside the Bulldog 20, when freshman safety Daniel Okonkwo pulled in the first interception of his career in the end zone to give the ball back to the offense with 5:59 remaining. Georgia then ran out the clock to close out the win.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"(Bo Walker) is a young kid who's a good back. We got to watch him play up at Rabun Gap his senior year and we thought he was a really good player, and he's gotten better and better. ... He has great vision, he's low to the ground, he's really hard to tackle. I love his spirit because he smiles every day at practice and he cuts up."

Worth Noting...

- It was the Bulldogs' 10th win of the season, marking the eighth time in head coach Kirby Smart's 10 seasons at the helm that Georgia has reached double-digit victories. Georgia's senior class improved to 49-5 overall and 25-1 on Dooley Field.
- Through Georgia's first 10 games, freshman running back Bo Walker had 13 carries for 52 yards. Against the 49ers, he ran nine times for 48 yards and scored the first three touchdowns of his career. He found the end zone on runs of 15, 12 and 3 yards. Georgia's other two scores were also on the ground, with running back Nate Frazier scoring from the 2 and 7 to put the Bulldogs up 14-0 in the first quarter.

- Redshirt senior running back Cash Jones made his first career start. And on Georgia's first offensive play, he had a 15-yard reception. Also making their first starts were redshirt freshman center Malachi Toliver and sophomore linebacker Chris Cole.
- The captains for the game were Jones, offensive lineman Micah Morris, safety KJ Bolden and defensive lineman Christen Miller. Charlotte won the coin toss and deferred to the second half.





No. 4 Georgia 16, No. 23 Georgia Tech 9

Nov. 28, 2025 • Mercedes-Benz Stadium • Atlanta, Ga.

ATLANTA — The fourth-ranked Georgia football team never got much going offensively Friday against No. 23 Georgia Tech, but the Bulldogs in all phases of the game did enough to earn the team its record eighth straight win over the Yellow Jackets, 16-9, in front of a crowd of 73,728 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium and a national television audience on ABC.

Georgia had seven-game win streaks against its rivals a couple of times over the years, but Friday's grind-it-out win made it eight in a row for the first time in a series that began back in 1893. The game came down to the final play, when the Bulldog defense stopped a Hail Mary pass into the end zone.

The Bulldogs trailed 3-0 after the opening quarter before scoring 13 unanswered in the second to take the lead for good. Wide receiver Zachariah Branch scored the game's only touchdown on a 7-yard reception in the second. Bulldog kicker Peyton Woodring connected on all three of his field-goal attempts.

Georgia's ground game did much of the work for the offense, rushing for 190 of the Bulldogs' 260 yards. Quarterback Gunner Stockton was held to 11 of 21 passing for 70 yards with a touchdown and an interception. Nate Frazier led the running backs with 108 yards on 16 carries. Georgia's defense held Tech to 250 yards, including 69 yards rushing on 23 attempts.

Yellow Jackets linebacker Tah'j Butler made the game's first big play, intercepting a Stockton pass near midfield and returning it to the Bulldog 37-yard line. Tech later got a 30-yard Aidan Birr field goal for a 3-0 lead. Georgia answered with a 22-yard Woodring field goal, tying the game 3-3 with 9:42 left in the first half.

A defensive stop and a shanked punt by Tech gave the Bulldogs the ball back at their 45 with 8:25 on the clock. And Georgia made the most of the good field position, driving the 55 yards in nine plays and taking a 10-3 lead with 4:35 to go in the half on Stockton's 7-yard touchdown pass to Branch. The pair connected a few plays earlier for a 24-yard gain to the 12.

Georgia's defense forced another three-and-out on the ensuing drive, and the Bulldogs got the ball back at their 33 with 3:15 on the clock. They couldn't get back into the end zone, but Woodring pushed the lead to 13-3 with a 30-yard field goal with a second left in the half. Birr's 44-yarder cutting Georgia's lead to 13-6 with 4:33 left in the third.

The Bulldogs later pushed their lead to 16-6 with 14:10 remaining on Woodring's 50-yard field goal. Birr's 41-yard field goal made it 16-9 with 3:30 remaining. Tech got the ball back with 13 seconds left, needing a touchdown to force overtime. The Yellow Jackets got the ball to the Bulldog 44 with one second remaining, enough time for a Hail Mary pass. Georgia knocked it down in the end zone to end the game.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"That was a physical, physical, tough game. Our guys were very resilient during it and found ways. Thought the defense really stepped up today. (Glenn) Schumann and the staff did an incredible job putting plans together. We did what we had to do offensively. Got to continue to get better. But really proud of this team."

Worth Noting...

- Georgia and Tech played for the first time in 1893. Since then, the Bulldogs had won seven in a row in the series multiple times, but Friday's win made it eight straight for UGA for the first time, matching Tech's longest run (1949-56). Georgia now leads the all-time series 73-39-5.
- Kicker Peyton Woodring has been critical for the Bulldogs all season, and Friday was no exception. He connected on field goals of 22, 30 and 50 yards. The junior has made 15 of 16 attempts this season, including all three attempts from 50 or longer.
- Georgia's defense held Tech to a season-low 9 points. Safety KJ Bolden led the way with nine tackles and linebacker Quintavious Johnson had six. Cornerback Ellis Robinson IV intercepted a pass inside the UGA 5-yard line in the third quarter, giving him a team-high four this season.
- While the UGA passing game was held to 70 yards, Georgia got 190 on the ground. Nate Frazier had 108 yards on 16 carries for his third career 100-yard game, Josh McCray ran 13 times for 43 yards, and quarterback Gunner Stockton added 42 on 15 attempts.
- With Texas A&M's loss to Texas, the Bulldogs officially earned a fifth straight trip to the SEC Championship Game, tying Florida (1992-96) for the most consecutive appearances all-time. This will be Georgia's 13th appearance in the title game.
- The captains for the quarterback Gunner Stockton, linebacker Quintavious Johnson, tight end Oscar Delp and linebacker Raylen Wilson. The Bulldogs won the toss and deferred to the second half.





2025 SEC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

No. 3 Georgia 28, No. 9 Alabama 7

Dec. 6, 2025 • Mercedes-Benz Stadium • Atlanta, Ga.

ATLANTA — The third-ranked Georgia football team captured its second straight SEC championship and got a bit of revenge against No. 9 Alabama on Saturday night in front of a crowd of 77,247 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium and a national television audience on ABC. After losing 24-21 to the Crimson Tide in Athens back in September, the Bulldogs dominated for long stretches of their 28-7 win to clinch the program's 16th SEC crown.

Georgia out-gained Alabama 297-209, and Bulldog quarterback Gunner Stockton, the game's Most Valuable Player, finished 20 of 26 for 156 yards and three touchdowns. Tide QB Ty Simpson was held to 212 yards on 19 of 39 passing, was sacked three times for minus-23 yards, and threw an interception. On the ground, Georgia ran 41 times for 141 yards; the Bulldog defense held the Tide to minus-3 yards on 16 attempts.

It was Georgia's special teams that made the game's first huge play. Midway through the opening quarter, with Alabama's Blake Doud punting on fourth down from the Tide 21-yard line, the Bulldogs' Cole Speer got free into the backfield and blocked the punt. Georgia's Justin Williams recovered the ball at the Alabama 25 and returned it four yards to the 21.

Georgia's offense soon got into the end zone. On first down, Nate Frazier ran 14 yards to the 7. Three plays later, Stockton rolled to his right and hit running back Roderick Robinson II for an easy touchdown and a 7-0 lead with 4:36 to go in the first quarter. It was Robinson's first touchdown of the season and first since 2023.

It was Georgia's defense that made the next big play, with cornerback Daylen Everette intercepting a Simpson pass around the UGA 27. Safety KJ Bolden tipped the pass just ahead of Everette, and the Bulldog offense was soon back on the field late in the first quarter.

Georgia pushed its lead to 14-0 with 8:43 to play in the half when the Bulldogs capped a 14-play drive with a 5-yard touchdown from Stockton to wideout Dillon Bell. A few plays earlier, Bell had a 19-yard reception to move the ball to the 4.

A sack by JaCorey Thomas on third-and-9 at the Tide 26 on the opening drive of the second half forced a punt, and Zachariah Branch's 24-yard punt return gave the Bulldogs great field position at the Tide 40. Georgia made the most of the return and the field position, taking a 21-0 lead with 10:47 to go in the third quarter on Frazier's 9-yard.

Georgia led 21-0 heading into the fourth quarter, with Alabama just passing 100 yards of offense on the final play of the third. Alabama finally got into the end zone with 12:33 to play in the game, scoring on a 23-yard pass from Simpson to receiver Germie Bernard.

The Bulldogs' final points came when Stockton hit Branch for a 13-yard touchdown and a 28-7 lead with 6:51 to go. Georgia again stopped the Tide on fourth down, with 3:22 remaining at the Bulldog 18. The Bulldogs then took over, and a Chauncey Bowens 19-yard rush gave room to run the clock out.

Coach Kirby Smart said...

"All the credit goes to the players who have had a very long, tough, hard season. The kids in our program buy into hard. I appreciate their toughness in the way they do things; that pays off in the long run. To win back-to-back SEC championships, it's every kid in this footprint's dream, and an honor to be at Georgia and to be the head coach here and win games like this."

Worth Noting...

- Safety JaCorey Thomas led the defense with six stops, including a sack, while linebackers CJ Allen, Raylen Wilson and Chris Cole had five each. Georgia held Alabama to minus-3 rushing yards, had three sacks, and shut out the Crimson Tide for the first three quarters. It was the first time in the history of the SEC Championship Game that a team had been shut out through the first three quarters.
- The Bulldogs were playing in their fifth straight SEC title game, tying Florida (1992-96) for the most ever, and earned back-to-back SEC titles for the first time since winning three in a row from 1980-82. It was also Georgia's third SEC title in the past four seasons.
- Georgia rushed for 141 yards on 41 attempts, led by Nate Frazier's 13 carries for 52 yards and a 9-yard touchdown. Alabama had minus-3 yards on 16 attempts. This was the 21st consecutive SEC Championship Game in which the team with the most rushing yardage won.
- Cole Speer's blocked punt in the first quarter gave Georgia the ball at the Tide 21 and set up the Bulldogs' first score. It was the first blocked punt in the championship game since 2016.
- Cornerback Daylen Everette's interception in the first quarter was his first INT of the season and fourth of his career. It was Georgia's ninth interception of the season.
- Roderick Robinson's touchdown catch was the first of his career and his first TD of any kind since 2023.
- The captains for the game were linebacker CJ Allen, wide receiver Zachariah Branch, offensive lineman Earnest Greene III and defensive lineman Christen Miller. Alabama won the coin toss and deferred to the second half.

Now in his 10th season, Kirby Smart's record is an impressive 117-20 for an .854 winning percentage. The highlights include back-to-back College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championships (2021, 2022), a 2017 CFP title game appearance, Southeastern Conference Championships in 2017, 2022, 2024, and 2025, six SEC Eastern Division titles and nine New Year's Six bowl games.

In 2024, Smart became the fifth fastest coach to reach 100 career wins in FBS history, needing just 117 games to do it. The milestone win, a 30-15 victory, came over No. 1 Texas in Austin. Two months later in the SEC Championship Game in Atlanta, Georgia beat then No. 2 Texas again. Over the last four years, Georgia has been the most dominant program, leading the FBS with a 53-5 record including two national titles and two SEC crowns. Overall, the Bulldogs lead the nation with 28 consecutive bowl game appearances. Through 2024, the program has produced 63 NFL draft picks in the Smart era including 17 first-round selections. Also, Georgia extended its national-leading streak of having at least one former player in the Super Bowl for the 24th consecutive year.

Smart returned to his alma mater in December of 2015, and in his second year, he had the Bulldogs playing for the national championship for the first time in three decades. The Bulldogs would end a 41-year championship drought in 2021. A year later, the Bulldogs would become the first and only team in the CFP era to repeat as national champions, going a perfect 15-0.

2024 – Georgia claimed the program's 15th SEC title and third during Smart's tenure by outlasting No. 2 Texas 22-19 in overtime. This marked the Bulldogs' second victory of the season over the Longhorns after taking down No. 1 UT in Austin 30-15 during the regular season. Registering his seventh season with at least 11 wins, Smart guided Georgia to its fourth CFP appearance since 2017 and earned a first round bye thanks to the Bulldogs' conference crown.

2023 - The Bulldogs completed an undefeated regular season, SEC Eastern Division title, and 13-1 overall record after defeating FSU, 63-3, in the 2023 Orange Bowl. The Bulldog defense ranked first in the SEC and 10th nationally in Total Defense (289.07 ypg) and Passing Defense (175.43 ypg), and fifth nationally in Scoring Defense (15.64 ypg). The Bulldog offense ranked first in the SEC in Total Offensive Plays (958), second in the SEC and fifth nationally in both Total Offense (496.5 ypg) and Scoring Offense (40.14), and second in the SEC in Passing Offense (305.29 ypg).

2022 - Georgia captured its second SEC champion-

ship of the Smart era in dominant fashion. The Bulldogs went 12-0 in the regular season and soundly defeated LSU in the SEC title game, earning a No. 1 seed in the final CFP rankings. The Bulldogs then came back to defeat No. 4 Ohio State in the Peach Bowl CFP semifinal.

2021 - His 2021 team became UGA's first national champion since 1980, the first since 1982 to go undefeated in the SEC regular season, a No. 1 national ranking by all the major polls and the first ever to win 14 games. It marked the fifth straight team to finish the regular season ranked in the top ten of the College Football Playoff rankings. The team set 21 school records, highlighted by the nation's top-ranked defense. The third-ranked Bulldogs defeated #2 Michigan, 34-11, in the Orange Bowl in Miami and then No. 1 Alabama, 33-18, in the championship game in Indianapolis. The senior class also set the mark for most career wins by going 45-8. After the regular season, Smart was named SEC Coach of the Year for the second time in five years. Georgia's championship season enjoyed a fitting exclamation mark at the 2022 NFL Draft. The Bulldogs set a Draft record with 15 players taken, including five defenders in the first round, led by the first overall selection, junior Travon Walker.

2020 - The 2020 Bulldogs became Smart's fourth consecutive team to earn a New Year's Six bowl game appearance. With a Peach Bowl victory over undefeated Cincinnati on Jan. 1, 2021, the Bulldog seniors tied the record for the most wins by one class in school history (44).

2019 - Smart's 2019 Bulldogs became the first team in school history to win 11 or more games for a third straight season. Georgia defeated three teams in the final Top 15 CFP ranking — Notre Dame, Florida, and Auburn — and finished fourth in the final polls. The Bulldogs capped their season with a dominant victory over Baylor in the Sugar Bowl game.

2018 - Georgia in 2018 posted an 11-1 regular season record, a second straight SEC Eastern Division title, and a ranking as high as number four in the CFP poll. Georgia landed in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019—the program's tenth all-time appearance in the New Orleans classic.

2017 - Smart's second season in 2017 was a special one, with an 11-1 regular-season record, an SEC title, a win over Oklahoma in the Rose Bowl Game (CFP semifinal) and advancement into the CFP National Championship Game. It was the first conference title since 2005 for the Red and Black.

Both Smart and his players reaped the bounty of their banner 2017 season. He was named George Munger National Coach of the Year by the Maxwell

Football Club, SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and SEC Coaches, and the Regional Coach of the Year by the AFCA. Roquan Smith earned first-team All-America honors and the Dick Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker.

2016 - In Smart's first season leading the Bulldogs, Georgia made its 20th straight bowl appearance and posted four fourth-quarter comebacks, including wins over No. 8 Auburn and No. 22 UNC. He led the

Bulldogs to an 8-5 final record, which included a victory over TCU in the Liberty Bowl.

As an Assistant Coach

When Smart officially came home to Georgia on Dec. 6, 2015, he had unfinished business as defensive coordinator at Alabama, which was still chasing a national title. He juggled both jobs for a month until Jan. 11, 2016, when the Crimson Tide won its fourth national championship in a 7-year span. Twelve hours later, he was at work in Athens, where he remains one of 15 head coaches at schools from Power 5 conferences that are coaching at their alma maters.

Smart had served on the Alabama staff the previous nine years, seven as defensive coordinator. During his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won three BCS National Championships, one CFP national title, three SEC crowns, six SEC Western Division titles, and was ranked in the nation's final top 10 the last eight years in a row.

During Smart's time at Alabama, he coached players at three different positions, in addition to his coordinating duties. He was recognized as the 2012 AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the 2009 Broyles Award winner as

college football's top assistant. He also was a finalist for the award in 2015.

Prior to joining the Alabama staff in 2007, Smart spent the 2006 season as safeties coach with the NFL's Miami Dolphins. He served six years at the collegiate level as the running backs coach at Georgia (2005), defensive backs coach at LSU (2004), graduate assistant at Florida State (2002-03), defensive coordinator/linebackers coach (2001) and defensive backs coach (2000) at Valdosta State, and administrative assistant at Georgia (1999).

Smart was the running backs coach for Georgia's 2005 SEC Championship team. He coached Thomas Brown, Danny Ware and Kregg Lumpkin — all future NFL players. In 2004 at LSU, he tutored two NFL draft picks: Corey Webster (2nd round, New York Giants) and Travis Daniels (4th round, Miami).

As a Player

Smart was a four-year letterman at defensive back for Georgia, where he was a First-Team All-SEC pick as a senior. He finished his career with 13 interceptions, a mark that still ranks sixth in UGA annals, and paced the Bulldogs with six interceptions in 1997 and five in 1998. He led the SEC in interceptions during his final season.

A four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Smart received his bachelor's degree in Finance from Georgia in 1998 and his master's in Physical Education from Florida State in 2003.

The Smart Family

The Bainbridge, Ga., native is married to the former Mary Beth Lycett of McDonough, Ga., a 4-year letterwinner and 2-year starter on the Georgia women's basketball team from 2000-03. The couple met long after their undergraduate days at Georgia, when Lycett — then working in the UGA Athletic Association Business Office — helped arrange Smart's trip to interview for the Bulldogs' running backs coaching job in 2005. They are the proud parents of twins Weston and Julia (born Feb. 8, 2008) and son Andrew (born May 25, 2012).

Kirby and Mary Beth Smart also oversee the Kirby Smart Family Foundation, which is focused on being champions in the community by supporting needy children and families facing adversity.

Kirk Benedict

Special Teams Coordinator

Kirk Benedict was named the Bulldogs' Special Teams Coordinator in February 2024 after serving two years as the team's Special Teams Analyst. Benedict's special teams unit shined throughout the Bulldogs' run to their 2024 Southeastern Conference championship and their fourth appearance in the College Football Playoffs. Junior P. Brett Thorson was named a Ray Guy Award finalist and USA Today Second Team All-American after averaging

47.6 yards (No. 4 nationally, No. 2 in UGA history) and forcing 14 fair catches. Georgia finished the year with a 43.5 Net Punting average (No. 5 nationally), giving up only 4.1 ypg. The Bulldogs' kicking game was just as impressive as two-time Lou Groza Award semifinalist Peyton Woodring drilled 91 percent of his field goals (No. 12 nationally, No. 2 in the SEC) after connecting on 21 of 23 tries, including a career-long 55 yarder in the win over No. 14 Clemson.

Adding to the strength of Benedict's group was the fact that Georgia was the only team to have a 2024 semifinalist for the Ray Guy, Lou Groza and Patrick Mannely (nation's top snapper) awards. Graduate transfer Beau Gardner eventually earned a spot as one of the country's top three snappers after snapping all season to Thorson and Benedict.

Benedict helped guide Woodring to Lou Groza Award semifinalist honors in 2023 as the true freshman connected on 21 of 25 field goals, including four of five from 40-49 yards, and all 71 PATs to set the Bulldog freshman record for most points kicking. His 134 points ranks third on Georgia's all-time PK scoring list for a season and he ranked sixth nationally in scoring at 9.6 ppg (top freshman, No. 3 PK overall). Thorson ended the Bulldogs' 13-1 season with a 43.8 average thanks to a performance that included 21 fair catches forced.

The Bulldogs punt return defense was also the only unit in the country to allow zero punt returns during 2023. Benedict is part of a coaching and support staff that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over TCU in the title game following a semifinal win over Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl semifinal, 42-21.

In 2022, PK Jack Podlesny set the UGA record for most points scores in a season with 151 (26 FGs, 73 PATs). He was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Year and First Team All-SEC by the AP and the SEC Coaches. Podlesny also set the record for most PATs in a CFP Championship Game with eight. Thorson also earned SEC All-Freshman Team honors.

Benedict joined Duke's coaching staff in June 2014 and worked with the Blue Devils until he arrived in Athens. He served as the Special Teams Coordinator and the Recruiting Coordinator while aiding the defensive staff.

Before his time as Special Teams Coordinator and Recruiting Coordinator at Duke, Benedict spent three seasons (2018-20) as an assistant coach mentoring the special teams unit and assisting on defense. In 2016 and 2017, he served as a graduate assistant coach while working primarily with the offense and the entire special teams operation. Prior to that, he served as an operations assistant working with the special teams units during the 2014 and 2015 seasons.

A native of Fairfax, Va., Benedict was a two-time All-Pioneer Football League fullback at Davidson College before graduating with a degree in political science in 2010. He was tabbed the program's offensive MVP as a senior in 2009.

Following his graduation from Davidson, Benedict was commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Army and graduated from the Army Reconnaissance Course in 2011. He was stationed in Germany from 2011-14, serving as a Reconnaissance Platoon Leader and Troop Executive Officer in the 2nd Cavalry Regiment. Benedict also served two deployments to Afghanistan (2011, 2013-14) before exiting the army at the rank of captain.

Benedict is married to the former Molly Battle and they have two daughters, Nora and Gwen, and a son, Kirk Jr.



Mike Bobo

John & Alice Sands Offensive Coordinator / Quarterbacks

A Georgia native who played quarterback for the Bulldogs from 1994-97 and was an on-field coach for the program from 2001-14, Mike Bobo began his second stint as UGA's Offensive Coordinator in February 2023 after serving a season in a Quality Control position for the Bulldogs' offense.

In 2024, Bobo utilized a new corps of running backs and a familiar quarterback and top three receiving targets to help Georgia capture its second Southeastern Conference championship in three years. The Bulldogs ranked 12th nationally in Passing Offense (281.0 ypg, third in the SEC) to help knock off No. 1 Texas in Austin, the then No. 2 Longhorns in the SEC Championship Game and two other top 15 opponents. Thanks in part to his offense's 31.5 ppg, Georgia advanced to its fourth College Football Playoff appearance since 2017.

His 2023 offense was instrumental in the Bulldogs' undefeated regular season, SEC Eastern Division title and 13-1 overall record highlighted by a 63-3 win over No. 5 Florida State in the 2023 Capital One Orange Bowl. The Georgia offense ranked second in the SEC and fifth nationally in Total Offense (496.5 ypg) and Scoring Offense (40.1 ppg) and second in the SEC and 11th nationally in Passing Offense (305.3 ypg), helping him earn a second Broyles Award finalist accolade (2012).

A veteran coach in the SEC, Bobo spent the 2021 season as offensive coordinator at Auburn. He worked in 2020 at South Carolina as OC and QBs coach after his five-year stint as head coach at Colorado State. At CSU, he guided the Rams to bowl games in each of his first three seasons, making him the lone coach in program history to accomplish that feat.

He is part of a coaching and support staff that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over TCU in the title game following a semifinal win over Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl semifinal, 42-41.

The Georgia offense ranked among the top five nationally in both Scoring Offense (41.1 ppg) and Total Offense (501.1 ypg) in 2022. The 'Dogs also finished first nationally in Red Zone Offense (97.6%), First Downs (375), and Fourth Down Conversion Percentage (86.7%). Senior quarterback Stetson Bennett became the first player to be named the offensive Most Valuable Player in four CFP games, including twice in a CFP National Championship Game.

A veteran coach in the SEC, Bobo spent the 2021 season as offensive coordinator at Auburn. He worked in 2020 at South Carolina as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after his five-year stint as head coach at Colorado State.

At Colorado State, he guided the Rams to bowl games in each of his first three seasons, making him the lone coach in program history to accomplish that feat. Bobo also joined Sonny Lubick as the only two to coach the Rams in multiple bowl games in their careers.

Overall, Bobo's teams left their marks on the offensive record book at CSU, as his squads own three of the top six marks for total offense in a season as well as the school record for most yards per game in a season (492.5, 2017). His Rams also posted three of the top seven scoring seasons in CSU history.

Bobo spent all but one of the first 22 years of his adult life at Georgia as a player or assistant coach. While in Athens as an undergraduate, he was a record-breaking starting quarterback and then spent 16 seasons working for the program.

Bobo's initial 14-year stint at Georgia as a full-time coach began in January 2001 when Mark Richt hired him as quarterbacks coach. Bobo had previously worked on the football staff in an administrative role in 1998, then as a graduate assistant in 1999.

Bobo coached the Bulldog quarterbacks through the 2006 season. He then added the duties of offensive coordinator in 2007 and stayed in that post until accepting the Colorado State head coaching position after the 2014 season.

Bobo played four seasons with head coach Kirby Smart from 1994-97 at Georgia and coached alongside him in 2005 when Smart was running backs coach for a year.

During his time at UGA, Bobo helped lead the Bulldogs to 135 victories, including two SEC championships, five SEC Eastern Division titles and eight bowl victories. The 2012 Broyles Award finalist held the offensive coordinator spot for 92 games with the Bulldogs, scoring 30-plus points 57 times, 40-plus points 29 times and more than 50 points 13 times. In fact, four of the top five seasons for average yards per game in history for the Bulldogs came under Bobo, including the school record mark of 484.15 in 2012.

Bobo guided several talented quarterbacks at Georgia, including Aaron Murray, NFL Pro Bowler Matthew Stafford and David Greene, along with All-Pro wide



receiver A.J. Green, running back Todd Gurley and many others. In all, Bobo helped mold four first-round NFL draft choices at Georgia: Stafford (No. 1 in 2009), running back Knowshon Moreno (No. 12 in 2009), Green (No. 4 in 2011) and Gurley (No. 10 in 2015).

Prior to joining Richt's staff at Georgia, Bobo served one year as an assistant coach at Jacksonville State.

Bobo was a quarterback for the Bulldogs from 1994-97, throwing for 6,334 yards, the eighth-most all-time by a Georgia quarterback, and set several Georgia passing records. As a senior in 1997, he threw for 2,751 yards on 199 completions in 306 attempts and had 19 TD to just eight interceptions.

Bobo, a native of Thomasville, Ga., and his wife, Lainie, have five children, a son Drew, who is a Bulldog center; triplets Olivia, Jake and Ava Grace; and Kate. His father, George, was a long-time successful high school coach in Georgia.



James Coley

**Assistant Coach
Wide Receivers**

James Coley was hired as the Georgia wide receiver's coach in February 2024. This marks Coley's second stint with the Bulldogs after serving on Kirby Smart's staff in a variety of roles on offense over his Smart's first four years (2016-19).

Regarded as one of the elite recruiters in college football, Coley utilized a returning trio of receiving targets in 2024 to help Georgia capture its second

Southeastern Conference championship in three years. The Bulldogs ranked 12th nationally in Passing Offense (281.0 ypg, third in the SEC) to help knock off No. 1 Texas in Austin, the then No. 2 Longhorns in the SEC Championship Game and two other top 15 opponents. Thanks in part to his receiving corps helping the team average 31.5 ppg, Georgia advanced to its fourth College Football Playoff appearance since 2017.

Coley helped guide Texas A&M's offense from 2020 through the 2023 season. He served as the Aggies' tight ends coach in 2020-21 before taking on the role as co-offensive coordinator and receivers coach during the 2022-23 seasons.

Coley's final season in College Station in 2023 saw Texas A&M scoring 33.3 ppg as Ainius Smith led the receiving attack with 53 catches for 795 yards. Smith finished as the only 2,000-yard receiver in SEC history to also rack up at least 250 rushing, punt return and kickoff return yards.

In 2022, Coley helped the receiver group compile 220 receptions for 2,633 yards and 18 touchdowns despite losing Smith four games into the season because of a season-ending injury. Coley also helped develop Freshman All-American receiver Evan Stewart. Stewart led the squad with 53 receptions and 649 yards to go along with two touchdown catches.

Coley and the Texas A&M offense highlighted their 2021 season by knocking off No. 1 Alabama in College Station 41-38, thanks in part to Coley's receiving corps. Smith hauled in a pair of crucial touchdowns, including a game-tying 25 yarder late in the fourth quarter.

During the 2020, Coley helped the Aggies post an impressive 9-1 record, including an 8-1 regular season mark against an all-SEC slate. A&M concluded the season with a lopsided victory over nationally ranked North Carolina in the program's first New Year's Six bowl game.

Coley started on UGA's coaching staff when Smart took over as head coach in 2016, spending the 2016 and 2017 seasons as receivers coach. He was named co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Georgia in 2018 and spent the next two seasons in that role.

Coley was part of a 2017 staff that led the Bulldogs to a record-tying 13 victories, first SEC championship since 2005, first appearance in the CFP, first appearance (and victory over Oklahoma) in the Rose Bowl CFP semifinal and first appearance in the CFP National Championship Game. Georgia's offense finished first in the SEC and ninth nationally in Rushing Offense (258.4 ypg), third in the SEC in Scoring Offense (35.4 ppg), fifth in Total Offense (435.3 ypg) and fourth nationally in Red Zone Offense (0.964).

The Bulldogs followed up in 2018 with another SEC Eastern Division championship, 11-win season, and appearance in the Allstate Sugar Bowl. The Georgia offense finished first in the SEC in total Rushing Offense, Rushing Offense Per Game and second in the SEC in Total Offense, Touchdowns Scored and Scoring Offense.

Coley's two seasons of coaching Bulldog receivers produced a pair of NFL draft picks: Isaiah McKenzie (Denver) and Javon Wims (Chicago). In 2018, he coached sophomore quarterback Jake Fromm who posted the second-best Completion Percentage in school history at 67.3, which was 12th nationally, and second-best

Passing Efficiency for a QB at 171.21, which was fifth nationally.

Coley served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Miami from 2013-15. Prior to joining the Miami staff, he held positions as offensive coordinator and tight ends coach (2010-12) and tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator (2008-09) at Florida State.

At FSU, Coley coached three first round draft picks in quarterbacks Christian Ponder, EJ Manuel and Jameis Winston. The Seminole offenses under Coley were high powered averaging 31.4 points per game in 2010, 30.6 in 2011 and 39.3 in 2012.

While at Miami, the Hurricane offense led the nation in "explosive plays" all three years and they produced two 1,000-yard rushers in Duke Johnson (1,652 yards in 2014) and Joe Yearly (1,002 in 2015). Coley coached 2014 freshman quarterback Brad Kaaya who earned Freshman All-America honors and broke the single season record for passing yards and TDs at Miami (3,198 yards, 26 TDs). Wide receiver Allen Hurns, who spent eight years in the NFL, broke the single season receiving record with 1,162 yards in 2013.

In 2014, his Miami offense averaged 430.3 yards per game and seven of Coley's offensive players earned All-ACC honors with Johnson and Shane McDermott receiving first team recognition. In addition, tight end Clive Walford earned AP All-America honors.

A native of Miami, Fla., he served as an offensive assistant with the Miami Dolphins in 2005-06. His coaching resume also included a stop at 2003 national champion LSU where he served as a graduate assistant coach.

Coley earned his bachelor's degree from Florida State in 1997 and his master's degree from LSU in 2004. He and his wife Kenia have two children, Madison and Brady.



Josh Crawford

**Run Game Coordinator
Running Backs**

Georgia hired Josh Crawford as run game coordinator/running backs coach in February 2024.

Crawford's stable in the backfield during his first year with the Bulldogs included a 1-2 combo in first-year transfer Trevor Etienne and freshman Nate Frazier. Etienne earned All-Southeastern Conference Third Team honors with more than 600 yards on the ground and a team-high nine touchdowns in only 10

games. Frazier, a Freshman All-SEC selection, went for a team-high 671 yards and eight scores. His contingent also combined for nearly 80 catches, 645 yards and four touchdowns through the air.

Crawford, who earned his master's degree from Georgia in 2012, was Georgia Tech's wide receivers coach for the 2023 season. Crawford's single season with the Yellow Jackets produced a Freshman All-American in Eric Singleton Jr. as he hauled in 48 catches for 714 yards and six touchdowns. Georgia Tech had 14 different players catch balls, including Malik Rutherford who finished with 46 catches and more than 500 yards receiving. Crawford made an immediate impact in recruiting as he signed Singleton Jr. and a talented group for 2024.

With a decade as one of the state of Georgia's most successful and respected high school coaches, Crawford entered into collegiate coaching in 2021 at Western Kentucky and helped guide one of college football's most prolific offenses for two seasons. He served as WKU's outside receivers coach in 2021 and was promoted to co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach in 2022. In his two seasons at WKU, Crawford's wideouts combined for 10,339 receiving yards and 94 touchdowns.

Prior to making the jump to the college ranks, Crawford established himself as one of the nation's top offensive coaches in the high school ranks, coaching at five of Georgia's most storied and successful programs – Colquitt County H.S., Valdosta H.S., Lee County H.S., Jefferson County H.S. and Greater Atlanta Christian (2010-12 – running backs/tight ends).

During his 11 seasons in the high school ranks, Crawford helped lead three teams to Georgia 6A state championships and one national title. He coached six all-state receivers, four of which went on to play at the Power Five level.

Crawford played collegiately at Morehouse College in Atlanta, where he was a running back from 2004-06. He earned a bachelor's degree from Morehouse in 2007 and master's degrees from both Georgia and Valdosta State (2020).

He and his wife, Jessica, have two daughters, Ava Louise and Asha.





Todd Hartley

**Assistant Head Coach
Tight Ends**

Todd Hartley, a University of Georgia graduate who had also been a full-time staff member with the Bulldog football program in the past, was named tight ends coach on January 14, 2019, and added the Assistant Head Coach responsibilities in 2023. Since coming to UGA, Hartley has helped to create quite a pipeline for tight ends. Brock Bowers headlines the list as the first back-to-back Mackey Award

winner (2022-23) in history and just the third three-time First Team All-American in Georgia football history. The All-Pro tight end recently completed his first season with the Las Vegas Raiders and finished as a finalist for the League's Offensive Rookie of the Year after setting NFL records for most receptions in a season by a rookie (112) and most receiving yards in a season by a rookie tight end (1,194).

The NFL has benefited from Hartley's players who were drafted in six straight years: Isaac Nauta (7th Rd., 224th pick) in 2019, Charlie Woerner (6th Rd., 190th pick) in 2020, Tré McKitty (3rd Rd., 97th pick) in 2021, John FitzPatrick (6th Rd., 213th pick) in 2022, Darnell Washington (3rd Rd., 93rd pick) in 2023 and Bowers (1st Rd., 13th pick) in 2024.

Hartley has been part of the most productive stretches in the Bulldogs' history. Georgia has compiled a 53-5 record over the last four seasons, including back-to-back College Football Playoff National Championships (2021, 2022), six consecutive New Year's Six bowl games, the 2022 and 2024 SEC Championships since Hartley's return to the program.

Most recently, Hartley guided a mixture of experienced veterans and promising newcomers at his position to more than 60 catches for nearly 800 yards and seven touchdowns. The Bulldogs ranked 12th nationally in Passing Offense (281.0 ypg, third in the SEC) to help knock off No. 1 Texas in Austin, the then No. 2 Longhorns in the SEC Championship Game and two other top 15 opponents. Thanks in part to his tight ends' contributions, Georgia advanced to its fourth College Football Playoff appearance since 2017.

In 2023, Bowers led the Bulldogs in receiving for the third straight year as the offense finished ranked fifth nationally in both Scoring Offense (40.1 points/game) and Total Offense (496.5 yards/game) and led the country in 3rd Down Conversions (55.2 percent) in 2023. Georgia went 13-1 following its 63-3 rout of No. 5 Florida State in the Capital One Orange Bowl, marking the program's third straight year with at least 13 victories.

Hartley was part of a coaching staff that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 College Football Playoff National Championship with a 65-7 victory over No. 3 TCU in the title game following a 42-41 win over No. 4 Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl CFP Semifinal. The Georgia offense ranked among the top five nationally in both Scoring Offense (41.1 ppg) and Total Offense (501.1 ypg) in 2022. The 'Dogs also finished first nationally in Red Zone Offense (97.6 percent), First Downs (375) and Fourth Down Percentage (86.7 percent).

Thanks in part to Hartley and his unit, the Bulldogs captured their first national championship since 1980 with a 14-1 campaign in 2021, highlighted with a 33-18 win over No. 1 Alabama in the CFP National Championship. That season, Georgia ranked 10th nationally in Scoring Offense (38.4 ppg) as Bowers topped his teammates with 56 catches for 882 yards (15.8 avg.) and 13 touchdowns in his true freshman season.

A native of Gray, Ga., Hartley served as the University of Miami's Special Teams Coordinator and Tight Ends Coach from 2016-18, under head coach Mark Richt.

Hartley arrived in Miami after serving as Georgia's Director of Player Personnel in 2015. Before his return to Georgia, he spent four years at Marshall serving in a variety of roles, including tight ends and safeties coach and recruiting coordinator from 2011-14.

Hartley originally joined the Georgia program as a student assistant at the end of the 2005 season. He worked with the offense and special teams until the spring of 2008 while he was an undergraduate.

Georgia tallied three bowl victories during Hartley's years working with the Bulldogs as a student, including a 41-10 win over No. 10 Hawai'i in the 2008 Sugar Bowl. He was instrumental in preparation of the Georgia defense for the 2009 Independence Bowl, when only one full-time defensive assistant was on staff. The Bulldogs routed Texas A&M 44-20 that night in Shreveport.

Hartley graduated from Georgia with a degree in health and physical education in May 2008. He and his wife Jessica have four children: Tucker, Teagan, Tenley and Tatum.



Travaris Robinson

**Co-Defensive Coordinator
Safeties**

Travaris Robinson joined head coach Kirby Smart's coaching staff in January 2024 to be the Bulldogs' Co-Defensive Coordinator and guide the safeties.

Robinson teamed with Bulldog Defensive Coordinator Glenn Schumann to maintain the standard set by Georgia's recent defenses. In his first game with UGA, the defense held No. 14 Clemson to just three points. During one of Georgia's next challenges, Robinson helped the Bulldogs blast top-ranked Texas 30-15 in Austin in front of a record-breaking crowd after the Longhorns arrived averaging 43.2 ppg. The defense flexed its muscle during the 2024 season's fourth quarter, holding opponents to their lowest cumulative quarter total of 60 points.

Junior safety Malaki Starks was a Thorpe Award finalist and earned First Team All-America honors for the second season in a row under Robinson's tutelage in 2024 while true freshman safety KJ Bolden was a Freshman All-American and a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander National Freshman of the Year Award. In addition, Robinson helped guide fifth-year safety Dan Jackson to All-Southeastern Conference Third Team honors thanks in part to his 64 tackles (third on the team) and two interceptions.

Robinson had spent the two seasons (2022-23) before arriving in Athens coaching CBs at Alabama. Thanks in part to his leadership, the Tide posted a 23-4 record over that period, including wins in the 2023 SEC Championship Game and 2022 Sugar Bowl.

Robinson guided 2023 Freshman All-American and Shaun Alexander National Freshman of the Year Caleb Downs as he led the Tide with 107 tackles, had two interceptions, forced a fumble and a recovered a fumble in his first season. In addition to having cornerback Brian Branch taken in the second round of the 2023 NFL Draft, Robinson helped Alabama rank in the top 12 nationally in both Scoring Defense (18.2 points/game) and in Total Defense (318.2 yards/game) in 2022.

Regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters, Robinson, known as "T-Rob," is a native of Miami, Fla., who boasts 17 years of college coaching experience, including five seasons as the defensive coordinator at South Carolina from 2016-19 working under former Gamecock head coach and current Bulldog defensive analyst Will Muschamp.

Robinson spent the 2021 season coaching defensive backs at Miami and was retained on the UM staff by new head coach Mario Cristobal before coming to Tuscaloosa.

In his final season at South Carolina in 2020, Robinson mentored defensive lineman Kingsley Enagbare, a First Team All-SEC selection, and defensive back Jaycee Horn, a Second Team All-SEC pick. In 2019, the South Carolina defense – led by first team All-American defensive tackle Javon Kinlaw – held its opponents to 20 points or less in five games. Sophomore cornerback Israel Mukuamu earned Second Team All-SEC honors, while Jammie Robinson and Zach Pickens earned SEC All-Freshman accolades for the Gamecocks in 2019.

In 2017, South Carolina led the SEC and ranked ninth in the country with 28 turnovers forced, while ranking 25th in points allowed per game at 20.7. The Gamecocks held 11 of their 13 opponents to fewer points than their season average. South Carolina also tied for 10th in the nation in turnovers forced with 27 during the 2016 campaign, including 15 interceptions.

Robinson spent five seasons coaching defensive backs before arriving in Columbia, S.C., as defensive coordinator – first at Florida (2011-14), then at Auburn (2015). The former Auburn Tiger standout began his coaching career at his alma mater, first as a staff assistant in 2006 while finishing up his degree, then as a GA in 2007. Robinson spent one season each as a defensive backs coach at Western Kentucky (2008), Southern Miss (2009) and Texas Tech (2010) before joining the Florida staff.

In his first season at Florida in 2011, Robinson guided a UF secondary that ranked seventh in the nation in pass defense (166.8), while the Gator defense ranked eighth nationally in total defense (299.5). In 2012, Robinson led a secondary that was one of the best, ranking No. 2 nationally in pass efficiency defense (95.55), giving up just seven touchdown passes. Florida was seventh nationally with 20 interceptions and safety Matt Elam earned first team All-America honors.

Robinson's secondary in 2013 was seventh nationally in passing defense and eighth in passing efficiency defense, while the Canes were eighth in total defense. Under Robinson, Vernon Hargreaves III was named the National Freshman Defensive Player of the Year by College Football News.

In 2014 at Florida, Robinson again tutored Hargreaves III, who was a First



Team All-SEC pick and First Team All-America. Jalen Tabor received Freshman All-America and Freshman All-SEC honors. The Gators defense finished the 2014 regular season ranked ninth nationally in total defense, 14th in pass efficiency defense and 23rd in passing defense.

Prior to his time in Gainesville, he helped Texas Tech to an 8-5 record and a TicketCity Bowl victory over Northwestern. In his one season with the Red Raiders, Robinson had two defensive backs earn All-Big 12 Honorable Mention recognition and a third that was named a Freshman All-America honorable mention.

As a player at Auburn, Robinson was a First Team All-SEC selection by the AP in 2002 after recording 92 total tackles with four interceptions. He finished his collegiate career with 166 tackles and five picks. Before embarking on his coaching career, Robinson played two seasons in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Robinson was born in Miami and attended Coral Park High where he was a four-year letterman and earned all-state honors as a defensive back and wide receiver. He received his bachelor's degree in mass communications from Auburn in 2007. Robinson and his wife, Mandisa, have two sons, Tyson Jerod and Travis Jerod, and a daughter, Jordyn.



Glenn Schumann

Fain & Billy Slaughter Defensive Coordinator / Inside Linebackers

Glenn Schumann was promoted to Defensive Coordinator (Inside Linebackers) prior to the 2022 season and has been calling plays for the Georgia defense since that move. He was named Co-Defensive Coordinator (Inside Linebackers) at Georgia in February 2019 after three seasons in charge of the Bulldogs' inside linebackers.

Georgia has continued to set the standard in college football for defense. Schumann has played a central role in keeping the level of performance high. In the five games versus teams who would eventually make the College Football Playoff field in 2024, the Bulldog defense held them to 15.4 ppg and 278.6 ypg - and all but one of those contests was played away from Georgia's Sanford Stadium.

His defense began the year holding No. 14 Clemson to just three points and helped the Bulldogs blast top-ranked Texas 30-15 in Austin after the Longhorns arrived averaging 43.2 ppg. Schumann's group flexed its muscle during the 2024 season's fourth quarter, holding opponents to their lowest cumulative quarter total of 60 points.

Schumann had his third Butkus Award winner since 2017 when hybrid LB Jalon Walker garnered the honor in 2024. Walker and S Malaki Starks earned First Team All-America honors while DL Mykel Williams, Walker and Starks were also All-SEC Second Team selections. In addition, S KJ Bolden was a Freshman All-American and a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award, ILB Chris Cole was named to the Freshman All-SEC Team and Starks was a Thorpe Award finalist.

In 2023, Georgia's defensive unit ranked fifth nationally in Scoring Defense (15.6 points/game) and topped the country in 3rd Down Conversion Defense (25.7 percent) during the Bulldogs' run to their third straight 13-win season.

Starks earned his initial First Team All-America honor for the unit while Williams, DL Nazir Stackhouse, ILB Smael Mondon, DB Tykee Smith and DB Kamari Lassiter were all Second Team All-SEC selections in 2023. Starks was also a finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy in his second season.

The Bulldogs have led the nation in Scoring Defense and ranked among the national leaders in Total Defense throughout the 2022 campaign. Schumann took over the play calling duties for the defense that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over TCU in the title game following a CFP Semifinal win over Ohio State in the Peach Bowl 42-41. The Georgia defense finished the season ranked among the nation's leaders in Rushing Defense (1st, 77.1), Scoring Defense (5th, 14.3 ppg), Red Zone Defense (2nd, 67.6 percent), and Total Defense (9th, 296.8 ypg).

The 'Dogs defense also boasted two first team All-Americans in DL Jalen Carter and DB Chris Smith, Butkus finalist (Jamon Dumas-Johnson), Lombardi finalist (Carter), Nagurski finalist (Smith), and Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award finalist (Starks).

Schumann was part of a 2021 staff that led the Bulldogs to the College Football Playoff National Championship with 33-18 win over Alabama in the title game. Georgia set 21 school single-season team records, including Wins and Games Played, as well as defensive marks for Fewest Points Allowed, Fewest Average

Points Allowed and Interception TDs. Georgia also finished first nationally in Red Zone Defense, second nationally in Rushing Defense and Passing Efficiency Defense. The Bulldog defense surrendered only three rushing and 10 passing TDs all year. Georgia set an NFL record with 15 picks in the 2022 NFL draft including five first round defensive players and eight overall.

During Schumann's tenure in Athens, in addition to the 2021 season, Georgia won 11 or more games in three straight seasons for the first time in program history (2017-19). The Bulldogs have also won six SEC Eastern Division titles (2017-19, 2021-23), earned seven consecutive New Year's Six Bowl berths, won the 2021 and 2022 CFP crowns and played for the 2018 CFP title.

Schumann's other star pupils at Georgia have included a pair of Butkus Award winners -- Roquan Smith in 2017 and Nakobe Dean in 2021 -- and two other finalists: Monty Rice in 2020 and Jamon Dumas-Johnson in 2022. Smith (2018), Dean, Quay Walker and Channing Tindall (2022), along with Monty Rice (2021) and Tae Crowder (2020), were all taken in the NFL Draft. Smith was the eighth overall draft pick in 2018 while Walker was the 22nd overall selection in the 2022 draft.

Schumann came to UGA after eight years with the Crimson Tide, first as an undergraduate analyst (2008-Dec. 2011) and then as a graduate assistant (Dec. 2011-Feb. 2014). In February, 2014, he was named Director of Player Development and Associate Director of Player Personnel serving in those positions until December, 2015.

Born in Valdosta, Ga., Schumann graduated from McKinney Boyd High School in McKinney, Texas, where he lettered in both football and basketball. He earned his bachelor of arts degree from Alabama in December, 2011, and a masters in sports management from UA in December, 2013. He and his wife Lauren have two sons, Bryson, born in September 2019, and Warner, born in October 2024, and a daughter, Whitley, born in May 2021.



Tray Scott

Assistant Coach Defensive Line

Tray Scott was named UGA defensive line coach on February 10, 2017, after serving two years in a similar position at the North Carolina. Scott was briefly hired as the defensive line coach at Ole Miss in January 2017, before accepting the Georgia job.

Since arriving in Athens, Scott has had five defensive linemen drafted, including four in the opening round. In fact, Scott had a record-breaking three First Round selections (Travon Walker, Jordan Davis, Devonte Wyatt) in 2022, including the No. 1 overall pick in Walker to the Jacksonville Jaguars.

During his tenure at UGA, the Bulldogs have won the 2021 and 2022 CFP National Championships, won 12 or more games five times (2017, '19, '21, '22, '23), won three SEC titles (2017, '22, '24) and earned eight consecutive appearances in a New Year's Six Bowl game. The 2017 'Dogs also played in the CFP national championship game.

The 2024 Broyles Award nominee guided his unit to another batch of success in his eighth season with the Bulldogs. The defense began the year holding No. 14 Clemson to just three points and helped the Bulldogs blast top-ranked Texas 30-15 in Austin in front of a record crowd after the Longhorns arrived averaging 43.2 ppg. Georgia's defense flexed its muscle during the 2024 season's fourth quarter, holding opponents to their lowest cumulative quarter total of 60 points.

Scott coached Mykel Williams to be a 2024 Lombardi Award semifinalist and an All-Southeastern Conference Second Team selection as Georgia had a variety of honors arise in the levels behind the defensive line. The defense had its third Butkus Award winner since 2017 when hybrid LB Jalon Walker garnered the honor in 2024. Walker and S Malaki Starks earned First Team All-America honors while Walker and Starks joined Williams as All-SEC Second Team selections. In addition, S KJ Bolden was a Freshman All-American and a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award, ILB Chris Cole was named to the Freshman All-SEC Team and Starks was a Thorpe Award finalist.

Scott helped the Bulldogs go 13-1 in 2023, finishing the campaign with a 63-3 dismantling of No. 5 Florida State in the Capital One Orange Bowl. The defense kept opponents to just 15.6 ppg, which ranked fifth nationally, and led the country in 3rd Down Conversion Defense (25.7 percent). Scott's top three in the final statistics -- Nazir Stackhouse, Warren Brinson, Williams -- totaled 62 tackles, 15 tackles for loss and 11.5 sacks.

Starks earned First Team All-America honors in 2023 for the unit while Williams, Stackhouse, ILB Smael Mondon, DB Tykee Smith and DB Kamari Lassiter were all Second Team All-SEC selections. Starks was also a finalist for the Jim





Thorpe Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy.

He was part of a coaching staff that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over TCU in the title game following a semifinal win over Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, 42-41. The Georgia defense finished the season ranked among the nation's leaders in Rushing Defense (1st, 77.1), Scoring Defense (5th, 14.3 ppg), Red Zone Defense (2nd, 0.676) and Total Defense (9th, 296.8 ypg). Thanks in part to the push up front, the 'Dogs defense also boasted two First Team All-Americans in DL Jalen Carter and DB Chris Smith, Butkus finalist (Jamon Dumas-Johnson), Lombardi finalist (Carter), Nagurski finalist (Smith) and Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award finalist (Starks).

Scott was part of a 2021 staff that led the Bulldogs to the CFP National Championship with 33-18 win over Alabama in the title game. Georgia set 21 school single-season team records, including Fewest Points Allowed, Fewest Average Points Allowed and Interception TDs. Georgia also finished first nationally in Red Zone Defense, second nationally in Rushing Defense and Passing Efficiency Defense. The Bulldog defense surrendered only three rushing and 10 passing TDs all year. Georgia set an NFL record with 15 picks in the 2022 NFL Draft, including five first round defensive players and eight overall.

In 2021 alone, Georgia defensive linemen reaped a bounty of honors. Jordan Davis won the Outland Trophy and Bednarik Award, as well as First Team All-America honors. Devonte Wyatt earned Second Team All-America honors, and both Wyatt and sophomore Jalen Carter were named Second Team All-SEC.

Prior to moving to North Carolina, Scott served two years (2013-14) as defensive line coach at UT Martin. He also held positions as defensive line graduate assistant at Ole Miss (2012) and assistant coach at Arkansas State (2010-11). Scott was also a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Arkansas Tech, from the fall of 2008 until the spring of 2010.

Scott earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Arkansas Tech in 2008 and his master's degree from there in 2010. He is married to the former Sarah Fancher and the couple has two sons, Julian and Torian.



Stacy Searels

Assistant Coach
Offensive Line

Stacy Searels returned to Georgia as offensive line coach in February of 2022 after serving in a similar position at North Carolina for three seasons.

Searels produced four NFL Draft picks in 2023 and 2024, including a pair in the First Round, since coming back to Athens. Most recently, Amarius Mims was selected 18th overall in the 2024 draft while captain and three-year starting center Sedrick Van

Pran went in the fifth round as the 141st pick. A year before, Broderick Jones went 14th overall and Warren McClendon was taken in the fifth round (174th pick).

Searels has helped the Bulldogs have their most productive stretch in the school history. Georgia has compiled a 39-4 record during his three seasons back, including a 15-0 campaign to win the 2022 College Football Playoff National Championship. Most recently, the Bulldogs captured their second Southeastern Conference championship in three years thanks in part to the line's protection. The Bulldogs ranked 12th nationally in Passing Offense (281.0 ypg, third in the SEC) to help knock off No. 1 Texas in Austin, the then No. 2 Longhorns in the SEC Championship Game and two other top 15 opponents. Thanks in part to the offense's 31.5 ppg, Georgia advanced to its fourth CFP appearance since 2017.

Individually, OG Tate Ratledge earned AFCA First Team All-America honors and OG Dylan Fairchild was an AP Second Team All-American in 2024. Also of note, first-year starting C Jared Wilson was part of the All-SEC Second Team.

In 2023, Searels' line helped enable the offense to finish fifth nationally in both Scoring Offense (40.1 ppg) and Total Offense (496.5 ypg) and lead the country in 3rd Down Conversions (55.2 percent). Georgia went 13-1 in 2023 following its 63-3 rout of No. 5 Florida State in the Capital One Orange Bowl, marking the program's third straight year with at least 13 victories.

Searels was also part of a coaching staff that guided the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over No. 3 TCU in the title game following a win over No. 4 Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl semifinal. The Georgia offense ranked among the top five nationally in both Scoring Offense (41.1 ppg) and Total Offense (501.1 ypg) in 2022. The 'Dogs also finished first nationally in Red Zone Offense (97.6 percent), First Downs (375) and Fourth Down Percentage (86.7 percent) that season. Senior quarterback Stetson Bennett became the first player to be named the offensive Most Valuable Player in four CFP games, including twice in a CFP National Championship Game. During the

2022 and 2023 seasons, Georgia led the SEC in Sacks Allowed, ranking fourth nationally in 2022 (0.60 sacks per game) and seventh in 2023 (0.93).

A 32-year veteran of coaching collegiately, Searels has produced a long list of NFL offensive linemen including 16 draft picks. In his last two seasons at Chapel Hill, the Tar Heels' offense was one of the nation's most productive. In 2021, despite the departure of four starters to the NFL, Carolina averaged 35.2 points and 468.2 yards per game, both in the NCAA's top 20, while leading the ACC in rushing yards with 2,763.

During his three seasons at Miami, five of his offensive linemen earned All-ACC recognition. RG Navaughn Donaldson earned Freshman All-America recognition from ESPN and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) in 2017.

Searels spent two seasons at Virginia Tech helping the Hokies produce bowl victories in both 2014 and '15. The '15 unit opened holes for freshman running back Travon McMillan to go over 1,000 yards on the season.

Before heading to Virginia Tech, Searels had his first stint of coaching with Mack Brown at Texas. In his final season in 2013, Searels' line enabled the Longhorns to finish 36th in the country in Rushing Offense and 17th in Sacks Allowed per game.

Searels joined the Longhorns after coaching the offensive line at Georgia for four seasons (2007-10). He added the duties of Run Game Coordinator in 2009. During his first round in Athens, the Bulldogs ranked in the top 25 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed three times, including ranking sixth and leading the SEC in 2009 with just 12. Searels coached a number of all-star offensive linemen at Georgia, including a quartet who went on to be successful NFL veterans in All-America selections Clint Boling and Ben Jones and All-SEC honorees Fernando Velasco and Cordy Glenn.

Searels came to Georgia after serving four years coaching the offensive line at LSU from 2003-06. During that time, the Tigers won a national title (2003), an SEC Championship (2003) and two SEC West crowns (2003 and 2005), while compiling a 44-8 record.

Searels joined the staff at LSU after a two-year stint as offensive line coach at Cincinnati. While with the Bearcats, Cincinnati played in two bowl games and won the school's first conference title since 1964 by capturing the 2002 Conference USA crown. Prior to joining Cincinnati, Searels served as an assistant coach at Appalachian State from 1994-2000, helping the I-AA Mountaineers to five playoff appearances and a pair of Southern Conference titles. While at Appalachian State, Searels was presented with the NCAA Award of Valor, recognizing him for his act of courage following a head-on collision involving a van carrying members of the Mountaineers support staff on Sept. 30, 2000.

A three-year starter on the offensive line at Auburn, Searels earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 1987. He blocked for Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson in 1985 and All-America Brent Fullwood in 1986. Searels was a First Team All-SEC selection as both a junior and senior. He was drafted by the San Diego Chargers in the fourth round of the 1988 NFL Draft. Searels also had stints with the Miami Dolphins and one year in the World League of American Football for the New York/New Jersey Knights.

A native of Trion, Ga., Searels graduated from Auburn with a degree in marketing and transportation in 1990. He added a master's degree in higher education administration from Auburn in 1995. Searels is married to the former Patricia Hale, and they have two daughters, Taylor and Savannah.



Andrew Thacker

Assistant Coach
Nickels & Stars

Andrew Thacker was elevated to a defensive assistant coach for Georgia football before the 2025 season, guiding the nickels and stars. He was hired prior to the 2024 season as a quality control for the Bulldog defense working with both the linebacker and defensive back positions.

Thacker's first season in 2024 with the Georgia defense saw the unit keep No. 14 Clemson to just three points in the season opener and hold top-ranked Texas to just two third quarter touchdowns six games later. The Bulldogs' 30-15 victory in Austin came after the Longhorns arrived for the contest averaging 43.2 ppg.

Individually, the Bulldogs had hybrid LB Jalon Walker garner the Butkus Award while Walker and S Malaki Starks earned First Team All-America honors. In addition, S KJ Bolden was a Freshman All-American and a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award, ILB Chris Cole was named to the Freshman All-Southeastern Conference Team and Starks was a Jim Thorpe Award



finalist.

Thacker came to Georgia after spending five seasons at Georgia Tech. He served as the squad's defensive coordinator from 2019-22. Thacker's defenses produced 12 All-Atlantic Coast Conference selections, including five in 2022.

Additionally, five of Thacker's former players went on to sign NFL contracts. DB Tariq Carpenter became the first defensive player drafted out of Tech in six years when the Green Bay Packers selected him in the 2022 NFL Draft. Then in 2023, Yellow Jacket defensive end Keion White went 46th overall in the second round to the New England Patriots.

As a unit, Thacker's Tech defenses ranked among the nation's top 25 defensively in multiple categories, including in 2022 when Tech was ranked in the top 15 in Turnovers Gained and top 10 in Fumbles Recovered and Blocked Kicks. The Yellow Jackets boasted top 25 rankings in Defensive Touchdowns in two seasons during 2020-22. The Yellow Jackets also ranked among the top 25 nationally in Total Takeaways in 2020.

A native of Cartersville, Ga., Thacker came to The Flats after two seasons on the staff at Temple. After originally joining Temple's staff as linebackers coach in 2017, Thacker was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2018. With Thacker as coordinator, Temple's defense scored eight defensive touchdowns (No. 1 nationally), forced 31 turnovers (No. 3 nationally), recovered 13 turnovers (No. 3 nationally) and intercepted 18 passes (No. 4 nationally) in 2018.

Thacker helped produce one of the AAC's highest-ranked defenses during his one season as the defensive coordinator at Temple. In addition to ranking among the nation's top three teams in defensive touchdowns, turnovers, fumble recoveries and interceptions, the Owls were among the AAC's top three teams in Total Defense (second), Passing Defense (second), Third Down Conversion Percentage Defense (second) and Scoring Defense (third). As linebackers coach in 2017, he helped TU rank among the top teams nationally in both Sacks (11th) and Tackles for Loss (11th).

Prior to his two seasons at Temple, Thacker spent the 2016 season as linebackers coach at Kennesaw State, where he helped KSU lead the Big South in Scoring Defense and Rushing Defense and rank second in Total Defense.

His career includes stints as a full-time assistant at UCF (2015 – safeties) and Southern Miss (2013 – safeties). He has also served as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons (2014), a graduate assistant at Oklahoma State (2010-12 – linebackers) and a graduate assistant at UCF (2008-09 – linebackers).

Thacker was a four-year starter at safety at Furman (2004-07), where he was named the 2004 Southern Conference Freshman of the Year. He graduated from Furman in 2007 with bachelor's degrees in political science and Spanish. He and his wife, Liza, have a daughter, Brooks, and two sons, Bear and Jackson.

**Assistant Coach
Outside Linebackers**

Chidera Uzo-Diribe was named outside linebackers coach on Feb. 6, 2022, after serving briefly as defensive line coach at TCU.

Most recently, Uzo-Diribe helped guide his unit to another batch of success in his third season with the Bulldogs in 2024. The defense began the year holding No. 14 Clemson to just three points and helped the Bulldogs blast top-ranked Texas 30-15 in

Austin in front of a record crowd after the Longhorns arrived averaging 43.2 ppg. Georgia's defense flexed its muscle during the season's fourth quarter, holding opponents to their lowest cumulative quarter total of 60 points.

Under Uzo-Diribe's tutelage, hybrid LB Jalon Walker garnered Georgia's third Butkus Award since 2017 and was a First Team All-American last season. Senior OLB Chaz Chambliss earned All-Southeastern Conference Third Team honors after piling up 40 tackles, including 9.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks, while another versatile LB, Chris Cole, was named to the 2024 Freshman All-SEC Team.

Uzo-Diribe helped the Bulldogs go 13-1 in 2023, finishing the campaign with a 63-3 dismantling of No. 5 Florida State in the Capital One Orange Bowl. The defense kept opponents to just 15.6 ppg, which ranked fifth nationally, and led the country in 3rd Down Conversion Defense (25.7 percent).

He was part of a coaching staff that led the 15-0 Bulldogs to the 2022 CFP National Championship with a 65-7 victory over TCU in the title game following a semifinal win over Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, 42-41. line coach with SMU in 2021. He followed head coach Sonny Dykes to TCU after the 2021 season before accepting the position at UGA. SMU was 8-4 in 2021 and defensive lineman Elijah Chatman earned All-American Conference Second Team honors. Uzo-Diribe also coached defensive lineman DeVere Levelston who led the conference in sacks.

Uzo-Diribe had previously worked two seasons at Kansas (2019, 2020) where he served as outside linebackers coach. While with the Jayhawks, he coached Kyrion Johnson who earned All-Big 12 honors. Prior to working with the Jayhawks, Uzo-Diribe spent three seasons (2016-18) as a graduate assistant with the defensive line and outside linebackers at Colorado. He coached outside linebacker Jimmie Gilbert who earned AP All-America Third Team honors.

In the summer of 2018, he participated in the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship Program with the San Francisco 49ers, a program created to offer minority coaches more opportunities to learn, coupled with great exposure to job opportunities. He was also named to 247Sports' 30-Under-30 list of rising stars in college coaching.

Uzo-Diribe was a four-year letterman at Colorado and finished his career tied for sixth in sacks, tied for 17th in TFLs and second in forced fumbles. In 2013, he ranked second nationally in forced fumbles with five and was on the final watch list for the Ted Hendricks Award for the nation's top defensive end of the year. Uzo-Diribe went on to sign as a free agent with the New Orleans Saints in 2015.

Uzo-Diribe married the former Hana Asmamaw in May of 2021, and the couple welcomed twins, Amara and Amani, in December 2022, and a son, Azariah, in April 2025.



Donte Williams

**Associate Head Coach
Defensive Backs**

Donte Williams, a veteran of coaching defensive backs at multiple power conference schools, was named the defensive backs coach at UGA in December of 2023.

Williams worked with Bulldog Defensive Coordinator Glenn Schumann to maintain the standard set by Georgia's recent defenses. In his first game with UGA, the defense held No. 14 Clemson to just three

points. During one of Georgia's next challenges, Williams' unit helped the Bulldogs blast top-ranked Texas 30-15 in Austin in front of a record-breaking crowd after the Longhorns arrived averaging 43.2 ppg. The defense flexed its muscle during the 2024 season's fourth quarter, holding opponents to their lowest cumulative quarter total of 60 points.

Under Williams' tutelage, junior DB Daylen Everette started all 14 games and had a team-high three interceptions to go along with 58 tackles, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Everette was the MVP of the SEC Championship Game after his two picks helped the Bulldogs down Texas for the second time on the year.

Williams previously served in the same role at Southern California, where he worked on the Trojans' staff from 2020-2023. He was originally hired onto the staff as the defensive passing game coordinator and cornerbacks coach, serving in those roles in 2020.

Williams was promoted to assistant coach in 2021 and also held those same previous duties. Following the head coaching change in 2021, Williams served as the interim head coach for the remainder of the 2021 season. He continued to serve on new head coach Lincoln Riley's staff in 2022 and '23 as defensive backs coach and defensive passing game coordinator.

During the 2022 season, Williams helped lead the program's defense to a top-five national ranking in interceptions per game. He helped develop Mekhi Blackmon, an All Pac-12 First Team member in 2022, during which Blackmon recorded 66 total tackles, two of which were for a loss, 12 pass breakups, three interceptions, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble. Blackmon was selected in the third round of the 2023 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings. Southern California won 11 games in '22 and earned a berth in the Cotton Bowl. In 2023, the Trojans advanced to the Holiday Bowl against Louisville.

Before he arrived at USC, Williams spent the 2018 and '19 seasons at Oregon as the Ducks' cornerbacks coach. The Ducks finished 2018 ranked 11th in the nation in interceptions with 17 and 2019 with the second-most of any program in the country with 20. Oregon went to bowl games in those seasons, winning the Redbox Bowl over Michigan State in 2018 and the Rose Bowl in 2019 against No. 5 Wisconsin. Williams played a pivotal role in recruiting Oregon's class of 2020, which ranked seventh in the nation and top in the Pac-12.

Williams was hired to coach the cornerbacks for Arizona in 2016. He then





coached cornerbacks, nickelbacks and dimebacks at Nebraska in 2017, also assisting with the program's pass-defense coordination.

Williams was hired by San Jose State in 2013 as the program's cornerbacks coach and then was promoted to serve as both the defensive backs coach and the recruiting coordinator for the program, a position which he held for the 2014 and 2015 seasons. During the 2014 campaign, the Spartans only allowed 117.8 passing yards per game and gave up just six passing touchdowns on the season, both of which ranked top in the nation.

The following year in 2015, SJSU continued its dominance in passing defense thanks to Williams, holding offenses to an average of 157.8 passing yards per game, the second lowest in the nation. The Spartans would finish the year winning the Cure Bowl, beating Georgia State 27-16. During his tenure, Williams was named a Top 10 National Recruiter by Sports Illustrated in 2015 and as the top recruiter in the Mountain West by 247Sports in 2014.

Williams was hired by current Texas coach Steve Sarkisian to join the staff at Washington as a graduate assistant for the 2011 and 2012 seasons. His responsibilities included assisting with overseeing the cornerbacks and linebackers for the Huskies. Washington spent time ranked during both seasons and made the Alamo Bowl in 2011 and the Las Vegas Bowl in 2012.

He earned his first spot on staff with an FBS program at Nevada in 2010 as a defensive quality control coach for the Wolfpack. The team went on to make the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl in San Francisco where it beat Boston College, 20-13.

Williams began the first three years of his coaching career at a trio of small colleges as the cornerbacks coach at each stop. He was on staff for three different California schools for the 2007, 2008 and 2009 seasons - at Los Angeles Harbor Community College, El Camino Junior College and Mount San Antonio Junior College, respectively.

Alongside his first stints in coaching, Williams also played two seasons in the Arena Football League 2 - for the Rio Grand Valley Dorados in 2007 and then the Arkansas Twisters in 2008.

Williams played high school football for Culver City High in California and eventually began his collegiate playing career as a defensive back at Pasadena City College in California for the 2002 season. He then played at Syracuse in 2003 before ending his collegiate career at Idaho State in 2004 and 2005, receiving a bachelor's degree in Communications in the spring of 2006. Williams received All-Big Sky First Team recognitions and was selected as a team captain during both seasons playing for the Bengals.

Williams is married to his wife Jayna and the two have two sons named King and Saint.

Scott Sinclair was named Director of Strength and Conditioning on January 6, 2016, after serving three years in the same position at Marshall University.

He has been part of a coaching and support staff that led the Bulldogs to the 2021 and 2022 College Football Playoff National Championships. Sinclair served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach for the football program at Georgia Tech from 2001-03. From 1999-2001, he worked as a strength coach in the Wake Forest athletic department.

A native of Rockingham, N.C., he earned his bachelor's degree in sports medicine from Guilford College in 1999. Sinclair, a member of the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association, received a master's degree in physical education from UCF in 2006. Sinclair and his wife, Farrah, have a son, Creed, and a daughter, Asher.



Sinkwich Leads Bulldogs Past TCU In 1942 Orange Bowl

Georgia All-American quarterback Frankie Sinkwich, playing with an oversized chin mask to protect a broken jaw, put on an offensive display still considered by many as the greatest in any bowl game as he led his Bulldogs to a 40-26 win over Texas Christian before 35,786 fans in the 1942 Orange Bowl game (a record crowd in '42).

Sinkwich passed for touchdowns of 61, 60 and 15 yards and raced 43 yards on a QB draw for another score. He completed nine of 13 passes for 243 yards and rushed for 139 yards for a total offensive gain of 382 yards.

Georgia scored first as Ken Keuper rushed two yards over the goal line to give the Dogs the early 6-0 lead. TCU tied the game less than four minutes later after a Lamar Davis fumble led to a Horned Frog score from the four yard line. TCU kicked the point after and led 7-6. Georgia answered soon after the score on a 60-yard pass play from Sinkwich to Melvin Conger, giving the Bulldogs a 12-7 lead they would never relinquish.

When the Dogs left the field at halftime the score stood 33-7, prompting head coach Wally Butts to proclaim it the greatest offensive performance he ever saw by a UGA team. He also believed the Georgia squad, at the end of the 1941 season, was the most powerful he coached.

The lead was 40-7 in the third quarter before TCU mounted a late three-touchdown effort. Bruce Alford caught two passes for scores from Emory Nix and Frink Kring scored on a 53-yard play from Kyle Gillespie for the 40-26 final.

The 1942 Orange Bowl was played less than a month after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and was a record-setting event. Sinkwich set five individual Orange Bowl records in the win for combined rushing and passing yards (382), touchdown passes (3), points scored (24), yards gained on touchdown pass plays (136) and yards gained on all touchdown plays (179). Georgia's four touchdown passes set a bowl team record, as well as the Dogs' four interceptions. The combined seven touchdowns for Georgia and TCU also set a new Orange Bowl mark.

Trippi Gets Helms Award In 1943 Rose Bowl

With All-American Frankie Sinkwich hobbling on two sprained ankles, his young sophomore understudy — Charley Trippi — paced Georgia to a 9-0 victory over UCLA before 90,000 in the 1943 Rose Bowl at Pasadena.

Trippi rushed 27 times for a net gain of 115 yards and received the Helms Award as the game's outstanding player.

Recently the Rose Bowl named its all-time first team and put Trippi at left halfback.

Tackle Red Boyd blocked a Bob Waterfield punt which rolled out of the end zone for a safety to give Georgia two points in the last quarter. A few minutes later center Clyde Ehrhardt intercepted a Waterfield pass and returned to the UCLA 25. Sinkwich finally scored from the one and Leo Costa converted.





Charley Trippi was at his best as Georgia defeated Tulsa, 20-6, in the Oil Bowl at Houston before 27,000 on Jan. 1, 1946.

He passed 64 yards to John Donaldson for Georgia's second TD and returned a punt 68 yards for the final Bulldog tally in the fourth quarter — a run still considered by many as the greatest punt return of all time. He completely reversed his field and ran over two Tulsa tacklers who had him trapped near a sideline.



Charley Trippi accepts National Pro Football Hall of Fame trophy.



Trippi Closes Great Career In '47 Sugar Bowl Playing Entire 60 Minutes



On a chilly and rainy day in New Orleans, Georgia battled back from two deficits to knock off North Carolina, 20-10, in front of 75,000 in the 13th renewal of the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 1947.

Charley Trippi led the way for the Bulldogs, playing all 60 minutes in his last game wearing the red and black. His 67-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter to Dan Edwards gave the Dogs a 13-10 lead that the club would not relinquish.

The win was Georgia's 16th consecutive victory and gave the Bulldogs a perfect season (11-0) for just the second time in school history.

The scoring started when North Carolina's Walt Pupa ran 25 yards in the second quarter for the first lead of the game. Kicker Bob Cox added the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

Georgia was held scoreless into halftime, but Johnny Rauch plunged into the endzone from one yard out in the third quarter and was followed by George Jernigan's extra point for a 7-7 tie.

Cox gave the Tar Heels the lead later in the third quarter with an 18-yard field goal, but the play of the day, Trippi's 67-yarder to Edwards, answered the Tar Heel score and Georgia never looked back.

The game remained scoreless after one quarter of play, but Maryland's Lu Gambino ran 35 yards for the first score of the game. The Terps held that 7-0 lead into halftime.

Georgia took the opening drive of the second half 87 yards, capped by Rauch's 1-yard plunge into the end-zone. Maryland answered with an 80-yard drive of its own and took the lead again on Gambino's second TD of the day. Later in the third, Georgia drove to its own 40 yard line but fumbled away possession. Three plays later the Terps were leading 20-7.

The fourth quarter was all Georgia, as the Bulldogs scored once on a Geri four-yard run and again on a nine-yard pass from Rauch to John Donaldson. The extra point was no good after Geri's TD and time ran out on a tied ball game with Georgia knocking on the door for another score.

A&M Zips Past Georgia In 1950 Presidential Cup Tilt

Georgia lost its seventh visit to a post-season affair, 40-20, to Texas A&M in the first and only Presidential Cup game at College Park, Md., before 12,245 fans on Dec. 9, 1950.

Georgia's Zippy Morocco, who later was to set the all-time SEC basketball scoring record, scored two touchdowns on brilliant runs, the first coming on a 65-yard punt return and the other a 23-yard rush.

A&M jumped out early and never looked back, scoring 40 unanswered points through three quarters of play. Before two minutes had been played in the opening quarter, the score was 13-0 after Bob Smith took the opening kickoff 100 yards and Glenn Lippman scored from five yards out after a Bulldog fumble. Another 81-yard TD rush by Smith in the first quarter buried the Bulldogs.

Morocco scored on a two-yard run in the third and a 65-yard punt return in the fourth to get the Dogs on the board. Lauren Hargrove added the last score of the day on a one-yard rush to make the final 40-20.

The defense held the Red Raiders' vaunted offense, which led the South-west Conference with almost 300 yards per game, to only 128 yards (32 rushing and 96 passing). And, the offensive troops rolled up 329 yards (245 rushing and 84 passing), their second best performance of the season.

Preston Ridlehuber had by far the most productive day of his Georgia varsity career and clearly deserved the trophy awarded him as the game's outstanding performer. Preston ran 19 times for 87 yards, completed 4x5 passes for 77 yards, giving him a total of 164 yards.





Kent Lawrence Sets Cotton Bowl Record As Bulldogs Win Big over SMU



Georgia magnificently upheld the honor of the SEC with its decisive 24-9 victory over Southern Methodist University, Southwest Conference champ, Dec. 31, 1966, in Dallas' Cotton Bowl before 75,504.

Kent Lawrence established a Bulldog bowl-game rushing record vs. the Mustangs. His 149 yards in 16 carries erased the old Georgia bowl-game mark of 139 yards in 22 rushes by Frank Sinkwich vs. TCU in the 1942 Orange Bowl.

Lawrence's 74-yard TD rush on the game's third play also was the longest scoring play in Bulldog bowl annals. He was

voted the game's outstanding player.

Bob Etter's 28-yard FG put Georgia out front 10-3 at the quarter. Steve Neuhaus set up another score with an interception at the SMU 33. Kirby Moore hit Billy Payne on a 20-yard scoring pass and Etter made it 17-3.



A record Liberty Bowl crowd of 35,045 at Memphis Dec. 16, 1967, saw N.C. State, led by former Bulldog head coach Jim Donnan, trim Georgia, 14-7.

The Wolfpack cashed in their scoring opportunities, drawing first blood in the second quarter on a 65-yard drive—aided by a timely 15-yard penalty—that saw Donnan pass 6 yards to Martell for a TD. Warren's PAT made it 7-0.

Georgia retaliated with a fine 68-yard scoring drive, Lawrence starting things off with a 42-yard kickoff return. Kirby Moore hit on four passes, three to Dennis Hughes and one to Billy Payne. Ronnie Jenkins scored from the one and Jim McCullough's PAT knotted the count at 7-7 midway the second quarter.

State went ahead early in the fourth quarter, driving 73 yards with Barchuk scoring from the one. Warren's PAT was good.

Georgia again fought back and mounted a great 98-yard drive that ended with Lawrence failing to score by inches after taking a pitchout from Moore at the N.C. State 3 and sprinting to the 1. Lawrence was voted the game's most valuable offensive back, while Edgar Chandler was the most valuable offensive lineman.

Georgia Upset by Arkansas Razorbacks In 1969 Sugar Bowl

A huge Sugar Bowl crowd of 82,113 saw Arkansas, champion of the Southwest Conference, upset Georgia, champion of the Southeastern Conference, 16-2, on Jan. 1, 1969.

The Bulldogs had the ball six times in the first quarter but lost possession three times on fumbles and once on a pass interception. But the Georgia defense played well and the quarter ended scoreless.

The Razorbacks moved 65 yards for a TD early in the second quarter, scoring on a 27-yard pass, Montgomery-Dicus. White's PAT made it 7-0.

Midway the second quarter David McKnight tossed Burnett for a six-yard loss and a safety to make it 7-2, but a Bulldog fumble a few plays later gave Arkansas position for a 34-yard field goal by White which made it 10-2 at halftime.

Georgia "blew" a good chance early in the third quarter after recovering an Arkansas fumble on the kickoff. Brad Johnson fumbled on the goal line on third down, and the ball went out of the end zone.

A fumble and pass interception in the fourth quarter put Arkansas in position for two more field goals by White (24 and 31 yards).

Paul Gilbert directed Georgia's lone TD in the fourth quarter. He completed passes of 16 yards to Charley Whittemore, 11 to Dennis Hughes, then scored himself from the six. Jim McCullough's PAT kick was wide.

Georgia played perhaps its finest defensive game of the season to beat North Carolina 7-3 in the Gator Bowl, Dec. 31, 1971, before 71,208.

The Bulldogs held the Tar Heels to only 181 yards total offense (115 rushing and 66 passing).

Dennis Watson was the defensive hero, making tackles time and time again. He made three straight tackles during one stretch.

Offensively, the Bulldogs gained a lot of ground (322 yards) but were sporadic, particularly in the first half. But, following the Tar Heels' lone

scoring drive of the game which resulted in a

35-yard FG by Craven, the Bulldogs finally mounted a beautiful 80-yard march that settled the issue.

The scintillating sophomores, Jimmy Poulos and Andy Johnson, ran the ball from Georgia's 20 to the G 43. Then Johnson hit split end Lynn Hunnicutt on a great 32-yard play to the NC 25. On the next snap, Poulos broke around left end down the sidelines to score, side-stepping the safety. Braswell made it 7-3.

The nation's TV audience once again was thrilled by the exploits of Poulos, the Greek Streak, who set a Georgia bowl rushing record in the Gator Bowl. He netted 161 yards on 20 carries to better the old Bulldog bowl mark of 149 yards on 16 rushes by Kent Lawrence against SMU in the 1966 Cotton Bowl.



Hats off to the Bulldogs for their thrilling 17-16 triumph over the Terrapins in the 1973 Peach Bowl Dec. 28 before 38,017 in Atlanta Fulton County Stadium.

Early in the second quarter, thanks to runs by Horace King and Andy Johnson, Georgia reached the Maryland 17 but was stopped. Johnson hit Jimmy Poulos on a screen and the Greek Streak went 62 yards for a score in one of the finest runs ever made by a Georgia back. Two plays later Maryland's Carter and White hooked up on a 68-yard haymaker and Mick-Mayer's PAT tied it 7-7.

Later Mike-Mayer put Maryland out front 10-7 on a 36-yard FG. Then the Bulldogs roared back with one of their best drives of the season. Captain Bobby Burns ripped up the middle for 21. Johnson hit King for 30, then ran 12 after faking a pass to the UM 9. With the clock running out, the Bulldogs had to settle for a 26-yard FG by Leavitt to make it 10-10 at halftime.

Tremendous defensive play set up Georgia's go-ahead TD late in the third quarter. Following Golden's 43-yard punt to Smith, tackled in his tracks at the UM 11 by Glynn Harrison, Sylvester Boler smashed through and hit QB Kinard as he was pitching out to Jennings. The hit caused a fumble that was recovered by Dick Conn at the Maryland 8 yard line. On third down, Johnson scored from the one and Leavitt made it 17-10.



It might have been a close game had not the Bulldogs given Miami two easy scoring chances with fumbles at their own 25 (first play from scrimmage) and 22. The Redskins cashed both opportunities, and in between, marched 68 yards to goal, QB Smith passing seven yards to E. Taylor for the TD.

After trailing 7-0, Georgia did make a good drive, first down at the UM 9, the big gainer being a 43-yard pass, Robinson to Appleby. But the vaunted Miami defense held and Allan Leavitt kicked at 21-yard FG.

Georgia came back strong in the second half and won it, 7-0. The defense played considerably better.

Midway through, the third quarter Butch Box, covering a Bucky Dilts punt, recovered a fumble at the Miami 41. Glynn Harrison immediately broke loose for 28 yards to the UM 13. Five plays later Ray Goff plunged over from the one and Leavitt made it 21-10.

Georgia outgained Miami in total offense, 274 to 242. Georgia had only 74 yards rushing but 200 passing. Miami had 228 rushing, 14 passing.

Cinderella Dogs Bow to Hogs in 1976 Cotton Bowl



Georgia amazed the crowd of 74,500 by taking the opening kickoff and ramming the ball all the way to the A4. But the Redbacks held and Georgia had to settle for a 35-yard FG by Allan Leavitt.

In the second quarter Matt Robinson connected with Gene Washington on a nifty 21-yard scoring play and Georgia led 10-0.

But two Georgia fumbles in the last two minutes of the first half resulted in an Arkansas FG (Little, 39 yards) and TD (Forte, 1-yd. rush).

It was a scoreless third quarter but the Hogs tallied three times in the final period.

#1 Pittsburgh Tops Dogs In '77 Sugar Bowl



Armed with a number four national ranking and the distinction of being first team to represent the conference in the SEC's "marriage" with the Sugar Bowl, Georgia's dreams of a national title were convincingly shattered by top-ranked Pittsburgh, 27-3, in the Sugar Bowl shootout for the national championship.

With a Sugar Bowl record crowd for the Superdome of 76,117 fans looking on, Pittsburgh made believers of the whole nation in justifying their top national billing.

Junior quarterback Matt Cavanaugh and heralded Heisman Trophy winner Tony Dorsett supplied most of the offensive fireworks for

the Panthers in building a 21-0 halftime lead. Cavanaugh directed his team 80 yards in the first quarter for Pitt's initial score, covering the last six yards himself on a keeper. In the second quarter, the Pittsburgh junior unveiled a brilliant passing game to account for another Pittsburgh score by hitting FLK Matt Jones for a 59-yard scoring strike. Dorsett added the Panthers' third TD of the day on an 11-yard burst to make the halftime tally 21-0.

The Bulldog offense, which had been stymied all day by the swarming Pittsburgh defense, finally was able to put something on the scoreboard in the third quarter. On Pitt's first possession of the second half, fullback Elliott Walker was separated from the ball on the Panthers' own 26-yard line, where defensive end Lawrence Craft fell on it for the Bulldogs. But several plays later, Georgia found themselves faced with fourth and goal on the seven and had to settle for Allan Leavitt's 25-yard field goal for their only score of the day.

Pitt's Carson Long added field goals of 42 and 31 yards as the Panthers claimed the 1976 national championship.



Stanford Rallies For Win In 1978 Bluebonnet Bowl



Georgia's Wonderdogs outgained Stanford 504 yards to 338, but lost the game 25-22 before 34,084 fans in the Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston on December 31, 1978.

Fumbles and penalties, missed PAT's and FG's and precision passing by All-American QB Steve Dils, enables the Cardinal to overcome a 22-0 deficit in the second half.

The Bulldogs played their best game of the season in running up an early advantage to the 22-0. They scored on their second possession in the first quarter, Rex Robinson kicking a 31-yd FG. On their third possession, Georgia's Buck Belue passed to flanker Carmon Prince 22 yards for a TD, but Robinson missed on the PAT to make Georgia a 9-0 leader.

As the half closed, Jeff Pyburn directed an 80-yard drive in seven plays as he spotted Prince for an eight-yard strike. Robinson was wide again on the PAT and Georgia led 15-0.

Georgia drove 75 yards to goal after the second half kick-off and took only six plays as Pyburn dove in from the one, making the score 22-0.

Two Bulldog fumbles accounted for Stanford's first pair of touchdowns, and their third tally came on a 14-yard pass from Dils to Ken Margerum. The two-point conversion was good, knotting the score at 22. The Cardinal recovered another Georgia fumble to set up their go-ahead field goal of 24 yards. Georgia came back strong, driving to the Stanford 14, but Robinson missed on a 31-yard attempt.



Georgia Whips Irish For 1981 Sugar Bowl Win And The National Championship



Determined to silence the critics who claimed that Georgia had been lucky in streaking to a perfect 11-0 regular season slate, the Bulldogs journeyed to New Orleans, No. 1 ranking in hand, and defeated Notre Dame, 17-10, in the 1981 Sugar Bowl to claim the national championship.

Played before a record Sugar Bowl crowd of 77,895 in the Louisiana Superdome, the game was one where Georgia capitalized on early Irish mistakes to take a 17-3 lead at halftime.

Notre Dame took the ball on the first possession of the contest from its own 20 all the way to the UGA 32 where kicker

Harry Oliver booted a 50-yard field goal to give the Irish a 3-0 lead with 10:41 to go in the opening quarter.

Oliver tried another field goal moments later from the 48, but this time Bulldog freshman rover Terry Hoage slipped through the line to step in front and block the attempt, giving Georgia the ball at the ND49. Nine plays netted 20 yards and placekicker Rex Robinson was called on for a 46-yard field goal. The All-American was successful to tie the game at three apiece with less than two minutes remaining in the first period.

On the ensuing kickoff, Georgia capitalized on confusion among two Notre Dame return men, and Bulldog senior Bob Kelly recovered a loose football at the Irish one-yard line. Freshman marvel Herschel Walker, who would go on to gain 150 yards (the first 100-yard performance against the Notre Dame defense all season) and win the Miller-Digby MVP Trophy, dived on the second play for the touchdown. Robinson converted the PAT and Bulldogs were up, 10-3, still in the first quarter.

Erk Russell's defense, which led the country in takeaways during the season, recovered another Notre Dame fumble early in the second period as Irish fullback John Sweeney was separated from the ball at the ND22 and Bulldog senior roverback Chris Welton pounced on it.

Walker broke an off tackle play for 12 yards to the ND10. Quarterback Buck Belue swept left for seven more to the Irish three-yard line, setting up a second and goal situation. Belue gave it to Walker and the 6-2, 220-pounder stormed into the endzone for his second score of the game. Robinson added the PAT and Georgia enjoyed a 17-3 lead.

Down 14 points, Notre Dame drove the second time it had the ball in the second half from its own 40-yard line to the G13. On a third down play there, Irish QB Blair Kiel dropped back, threw into the endzone to flanker Pete Holohan, only to watch Georgia's All-American cornerback Scott Woerner step in at the last minute to bat the pass away. Notre Dame's Oliver came in to kick a 30-yarder, but the ball sailed wide right.

The Irish finally got a touchdown after Georgia punted on the next possession. The passing of Kiel and running of tailback Phil Carter took Notre Dame 57 yards in 11 plays as the drive was climaxed by a one-yard plunge by Carter for the touchdown. Oliver booted the PAT and the Georgia lead was now 17-10 with :54 seconds of the third quarter showing on the Superdome scoreboard clock.

After Georgia was unable to move the ball, senior Mark Malkiewicz was called in to punt. The boot carried to the Irish 46 and Notre Dame, with momentum mounting, took over. Seven plays later, the Fighting Irish were at the G21 and fourth down staring them in the face. Oliver's 38-yard field goal attempt went wide to the left this time and the Bulldogs clung to their

seven-point lead.

After two unsuccessful possessions by each team, Notre Dame got the ball one last time with 5:10 to go in the ballgame at the ND43. Carter ran around the end for seven yards to midfield. On second down, 6-1, 265-pound defensive guard Eddie Weaver caught Kiel behind the line for a four-yard loss, setting up a third and seven play. A Kiel-to-Nick Vehr pass got six yards back, making it fourth down, one yard to go.

A running play looked to be forthcoming, but Kiel surprised everyone when he faded back, looking for Dean Maszta, the big tight end, on the side line. One Bulldog, apparently not surprised by the call, was cornerback Woerner, who stepped up in front of Maszta for the interception (his second of the game) at the G34. Only 2:56 remained.

Runs by Belue and Walker gave the Bulldogs a first down at the G47. Two plays after that, Georgia recorded the biggest first down of the game when Belue hit his very first completion of the day on a seven-yard pass to senior flanker Amp Arnold. Walker got the Bulldogs another first down at the ND 38, where Georgia ran off three plays and watched the clock expire, prompting a sea of UGA fans to engulf the playing field for the national championship celebration.

Pitt Edges Bulldogs 24-20 In 1982 Sugar Bowl



Pittsburgh QB Dan Marino hit tight end John Brown on a fourth-down, 33-yard TD pass with just 35 seconds left to give the Panthers a come-from-behind 24-20 win over Georgia in the 1982 Sugar Bowl, dashing the Bulldogs' hopes for a second straight national championship.

Perhaps the most exciting of the holiday games of '82, the Pitt-Georgia matchup had six lead changes for the 77,224 who were in attendance at the Superdome.

Early in the fourth quarter it was Pittsburgh which capitalized on a Dog fumble at the G23.

Four plays later, QB Marino found John Brown open for a six-yard TD play. The conversion put the Panthers, 17-13 with 11:40 to play in the game.

But the Bulldogs, entering the game ranked No. 2 in the country, weren't quite through yet. Taking over on the G20, Georgia drove the distance in 10 plays, climaxing the drive with a Buck Belue-to-Clarence Kay TD pass from six yards out. Kevin Butler's PAT put the lead in Georgia's favor, 20-17, with 8:31 remaining.

Each team failed on a possession and, with 3:46 left, the Panthers got the ball on the P20. Eleven plays later, they were at the G33, fourth down and five. Seconds later, TE Brown was in the endzone on the receiving end of Marino's game-winner.



Penn State Clips Dogs 27-23 In 1983 Sugar Bowl



After staking Penn State to a 20-3 second-quarter lead, the Bulldogs staged a great comeback but came up short, 27-23, to the Nittany Lions before 78,124 in the '83 Sugar Bowl Classic. The outcome foiled Georgia's chances for another national championship and a perfect 12-0 season.

Trailing 20-3 with only :39 remaining in the first half, Georgia took over on its 34-yard line. Lastinger completed four of five pass attempts, the final completion coming on a 10-yard scoring play to Herman Archie. Butler's PAT cut the deficit to 20-10 at intermission.

The Bulldogs took the second half kickoff and drove 69 yards in 11 plays as Herschel Walker, who netted 103 yards on the day, ran in from a yard out. Penn State's lead now was only 20-17.

The Nittany Lions took possession late in the third quarter at their 19. Six plays advanced the football to the G47. From there, Blackledge found his receiver Garrity, who made a diving catch in the endzone for a TD. Gancitano's PAT increased the PSU lead to 27-17.

Georgia didn't roll over, however. With 5:38 left to play, the Dogs took the ball at the P43 after a fumbled punt. Six plays later, Lastinger found TE Clarence Kay for a nine-yard TD pass. Only 3:54 remained. The two-point try failed and Georgia trailed 27-23.

Georgia could not prevent the Nittany Lions from getting two first downs and used up its allotted timeouts as Penn State ran out the clock. The game ended with the ball rolling into the Georgia endzone after a 62-yard punt from Ralph Giacomarro.

Georgia Upsets Texas 10-9 In 1984 Cotton Bowl

Georgia senior QB John Lastinger ran 17 yards for a go-ahead TD with just 3:22 left on the clock to lift the Bulldogs to a 10-9 Cotton Bowl Classic triumph over No. 2 Texas before 67,891 in Dallas on Jan. 2, 1984.

The winning TD had been set up when Bulldog sophomore Gary Moss recovered a Craig Curry fumbled punt at the Longhorn 23-yard line. Lastinger called his own number on the third play from scrimmage and darted outside right for the TD.

Texas had one more possession, but the Bulldog defense rose up recording two sacks (Kenny Sims and Ed Moore) to back the Longhorns up from their 28-yard line all the way to their seven. Georgia took control and ran off the final 2:19 on the clock after converting a fourth down play at the Texas 36.

As expected going into the Cotton Bowl, defense was the key for both teams as there were just 13 first downs and three points each achieved in the first half. Texas grabbed an early 3-0 lead with 10:32 to go in the first quarter when freshman Jeff Ward booted a 22-yard FG. The Bulldogs, after Moss returned a punt 29 yards to the Longhorn 43 late in the quarter, used four plays to move to the Texas 26 where Butler came in and kicked a 43-yarder.

Ward added his second three-pointer on the day with 7:10 to play in the third quarter as he connected on a 40-yard field goal. After a Georgia fumble at the G37, the Longhorns moved 26 yards in eight plays to the G11 where Ward came on and extended the Texas advantage to 9-3 with 3:50 to play in the third quarter.

FSU Rallies To Tie Bulldogs In 1984 Citrus Bowl

Georgia placekicker Kevin Butler's attempt of a 70-yard field goal fell just a foot short as time expired in the '84 Florida Citrus Bowl, enabling favored Florida State to hold off the upstart Bulldogs and earn a 17-17 tie before 51,821 in Orlando on Dec. 22, 1984.

The Bulldogs, who had hoped to use the Citrus Bowl as the start of their 1985 season, stormed out to a 14-0 halftime lead. Florida State battled back to tie the score through the efforts of a talented offense and an aggressive punt rush with under four minutes remaining.

After averaging 35.3 points a game, the Seminoles were held to just 10 points through three quarters until noseguard Lenny Chavers blocked a Chip Andrews punt, which was picked up by teammate Joe Wessel for a Seminole touchdown. Darrin Holloman's sweep around the left side gave FSU a two-point conversion and knotted the game at 17 late in the fourth quarter. The Dogs tried to repeat the miracle they had staged earlier in the season against rival Clemson in which they drove up field in the closing seconds enabling All-American Kevin Butler to kick a conference record 60-yard FG and secure a Georgia victory. FSU's defense proved to be a bit stiffer than that of Clemson, and after three incomplete James Jackson passes, Georgia coach Vince Dooley called on Butler once again, but his kick fell just short of the crossbar and the game ended deadlocked at 17.

Although disappointed with a tie, Georgia walked off the field encouraged by the play of their underclassmen. Freshman QB James Jackson saw his first stretch of extensive playing time and responded by earning the game's Most Valuable Player trophy. The game's most valuable offensive player was another Georgia freshman, TB Lars Tate, who scored both of Georgia's TDs. Senior CB Kevin Harris was awarded Defensive Player of the Game, giving the red and black a clean sweep of the awards ceremony.



Dogs, Wildcats Tie 13-13 In 1985 Sun Bowl Game



A Sun Bowl crowd of 52,203 saw the Georgia Bulldogs rally for 10 fourth quarter points to pull even with the Arizona Wildcats, 13-13, then watched as both teams miss potential game-winning field goals in the final two minutes to preserve the tie.

Georgia struck first, marching 72 yards in 13 plays to set up a 37-yard FG by Steve Crumley. Crumley, who had pulled a muscle in his kicking leg before the final game of the regular season, reinjured himself on the kick, however, and was unable to continue.

Arizona responded on the following possession to tie the game, driving to the G1 before an illegal procedure penalty on fourth down forced the Cats to call upon All-American Max Zendejas to tie the score at three from 21 yards. Zendejas added a 52-yarder, and the Wildcats made it 12-3 when Martin Rudolph picked off QB James Jackson's pass and returned it 35 yards for a TD. Georgia backup kicker Davis Jacobs was true on a 44-yard field to close the gap to 13-6.

With 12:35 to play senior DB Tony Flack recovered RB James Debow's fumble at the A23 to set up what would be the game's last score behind Tate on the ground. With 1:14 left, Jacobs missed a 44-yard field goal.

Georgia held Arizona until the Wildcats gambled on fourth-and-two from their own 36, and David Adams rambled for 25 yards on a draw play with DL Henry Williams executing a game-saving tackle at the G39. The Wildcats drove to the 22, called time out, and Zendejas' 39-yard attempt went wide and Georgia averted a last-second defeat.



The last second win spoiled a brilliant comeback from a 13-point halftime deficit by Georgia which actually took the lead, 24-20, with a five-yard TD run by QB James Jackson with 11:51 left in the game.

The Bulldogs, after scoring first to lead 7-0, watched Boston College score 20 straight points before halftime.

Georgia came out in the third quarter to score 10 points and added another seven in the final period to take the lead. B.C. got the ball the final time with 2:38 left and drove to the Georgia 27 when an incomplete fourth-and-two pass appeared to have iced the game for the Dogs. But a pass interference penalty gave the Eagles new life and three plays later, they scored on a five-yard TD toss.



Kasay Kick Defeats Arkansas In 1987 Liberty Bowl



Freshman placekicker John Kasay booted a 39-yard field goal with no time left to give Georgia a 20-17 come-from-behind victory over the Arkansas Razorbacks before 53,249 fans at Liberty Bowl Stadium in Memphis, Tenn., on Dec 29, 1987. The victory provided Georgia with its first nine-win season since 1983 and the first victory over Arkansas after two previous attempts.

Bulldog QB James Jackson was the Georgia most valuable offensive player after rushing for 72 yards and completing 15 of 25 passes for 148 yards. Bulldog LB John Brantley was the Georgia most valuable

defensive player.

Kasay's game-winning kick was set up when Georgia cornerback Carver Russaw intercepted an Arkansas pass and ran it back to the Razorback 43-yard line with 46 seconds to play. Arkansas had missed a 35-yard field goal with 1:42 left which would have given them the lead. The Bulldogs ran three plays to set up Kasay's kick the big one being a Jackson-to-Sadowski pass for 16 yards to put the Dogs in field goal range.

Georgia had trailed at halftime, 10-7, and Arkansas took the second half kickoff and drove for a touchdown to take a 17-7 lead with 11:35 left in the third period. But the fourth quarter belonged to Georgia.

Kasay kicked a 24-yard FG with 14:57 left to cut the lead to 17-10, and James Jackson scored on a five-yard run to tie the score at 17.



Dogs Use New Tricks To Win 1989 Gator Bowl



Largely discarding their trademark rushing attack, Vince Dooley's Bulldogs took to the air in the 44th Mazda Gator Bowl en route to a 34-27 victory over the Michigan State in front of 76,236 fans in Jacksonville, Fla., on Jan. 1, 1989.

Georgia not only secured its second straight 9-win season but handed Dooley the 201st, and final, win of his illustrious 25-year coaching career. QB Wayne Johnson, who was named Georgia's MVP for the game, had a career-high 227 yards and three touchdowns. Two of Johnson's three TD strikes went to tailback Rodney Hampton,

who also carried the ball 10 times for 109 yards and a TD.

Georgia took a 7-0 lead on a 6-yard Johnson-to-Hampton touchdown pass. By halftime, the Dogs led 17-7. Georgia scored again in the third when Johnson capped a 64-yard drive with an 18-yard pass to tight end Kirk Warner.

MSU closed the gap to 27-20 with 14:24 to play, but the Dogs countered on their next possession when Hampton raced 32 yards for his third touchdown. The Spartans scored once more, but Georgia, which finished the season ranked 15th, hung on for a 34-27 win.

Syracuse Nips Georgia 19-18 To Win '89 Peach


With :25 left in the game, Syracuse PK John Biskup booted a 26-yard field goal to lift the Orangemen over the Bulldogs, 19-18, in Atlanta at the 22nd Peach Bowl on Dec. 30, 1989.

Despite putting together an impressive opening drive and coming up with several big plays, the Dogs couldn't sustain a balanced offensive attack throughout the game. Georgia's leading rusher Rodney Hampton was held to 32 yards on the ground, while Syracuse TB Michael Owens ran for 112 yards on 14 carries. The Georgia passing attack was limited to 88 yards, the first time all season the Dogs were held under 100 yards in the air.

Georgia opened the game with a 66-yard drive, capped off by a 5-yard TD pass from QB Greg Talley to tight end Kirk Warner. Syracuse answered with an 80-yard drive of its own, with Owens scoring from one yard out.

In the second quarter, Syracuse suffered from three miscues, but managed to stay close. The first came when Georgia linebacker Mo Lewis set a new Peach Bowl record with a 77-yard interception return to the Syracuse five. The Bulldogs were unable to get into the end zone, however, and had to settle for a John Kasay field goal. In the second half, the Orangemen gave up a safety, and Georgia added a TD for an 18-10 edge going to the fourth.

Syracuse rallied, first with a 94-yards drive to close to 18--16. Then, Biskup's field goal lifted the Orange over Georgia in the closest Peach Bowl since 1973.



Georgia Beats Arkansas 24-15 In '91 Independence

Georgia completed the 1991 phase of "Operation Turnaround" by beating the Arkansas Razorbacks 24-15 in front of 46,932 fans and an ABC-TV national television audience in the 1991 Independence Bowl.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 14-0 lead behind two scoring strikes thrown from Eric Zeier to Arthur Marshall and Andre Hastings stretching their lead to 17-0 on a 39-yard FG by freshman Kanon Parkman.

The Razorbacks battled back and got on the scoreboard with a 7-yard run by the Hogs' leading rusher, E.D. Jackson. The run capped off an eight-play 37-yard drive by the Razorbacks.

The second half continued to be a showcase for the play of Hastings and Zeier and the ball-hawking Georgia defense led by junior linebacker Torrey Evans.

Georgia's defense forced Arkansas quarterback Jason Allen into throwing five interceptions. Evans came off the bench for the injured John Allen and played brilliantly, recording four tackles, an interception and fumble recovery to earn defensive MVP honors.

The game's offensive MVP, Hastings caught four passes for 94 yards and outran all pursuers on a third quarter 53-yard reverse that put the Bulldogs out front 24-7. The Hogs added eight points in the fourth quarter, but it was too late, the Bulldogs had won the Independence Bowl.



Dogs Beat Ohio State In 1993 Florida Citrus Bowl



Georgia secured its best finish in a decade, including a top-10 final ranking and the first 10-win season since 1983, with a 21-14 victory over Ohio State. A New Year's Day crowd of 65,861 attended the 47th annual Florida Citrus Bowl.

Offensively, Georgia found ball control to its liking in the first quarter as it opened the game with its longest touchdown drive of the season. The Bulldogs drove 80 yards in 14 plays, grinding up 6:18 on the game clock, to take a 7-0 lead. Georgia then opened it up in the second quarter, calling for passes on five of its first eight plays. An Eric Zeier fumble just inside

OSU territory proved costly as the Buckeyes drove 54 yards to paydirt in 11 plays for a 7-7 halftime tie.

After the break, Andre Hastings ignited the Dogs' offense on the opening kickoff of the second half with a spectacular 49-yard return. Then from the OSU 45, Garrison Hearst gained all 45 yards on four carries en route to a 14-7 Bulldog advantage. But after a short punt by Georgia, which the Buckeyes returned to the UGA 33, Ohio State seized the opportunity and tied the game again, 14-14, on a five-yard run by Robert Smith.

Slowly, the Buckeyes had taken control of the game's momentum and after a 45-yard completion to Smith to the UGA 15, it appeared Ohio State would take its first lead of the game. But quarterback Kirk Herbstreit fumbled, and the Bulldogs drove 80 yards in 11 plays to take the victory. A final Buckeye drive ended with a desperation pass intercepted in the endzone.



Virginia Rallies For 34-27 Win In 1995 Peach Bowl



At the Peach Bowl, two of the nation's most hard-luck teams took to Atlanta's Georgia Dome in search of season-ending consolation. Although the Bulldogs entered the contest as underdogs, Georgia again battled back from adversity, this time a 14-0 deficit with 4:09 left in the first quarter, only to lose in the closing minute. Virginia's Demetrius Allen proved the difference, returning a Kanon Parkman kickoff for an 83-yard TD with :57 remaining.

Sophomore QB Hines Ward engineered the Georgia comeback, lighting up the Cavalier secondary for 413 yards on 31 of 59 passing. Figure in another 56 yards rushing, and Ward had set new Georgia bowl records for pass attempts, completions, yards passing and total offense. However, a pair of first-quarter interceptions and a blocked Dax Langley punt led to an easy 14 points for Virginia and considerable red and black frustration.

Once again, Georgia's defense kept the team's hope alive. Besides limiting Virginia to 256 yards total offense, the UGA "D" even gave the 70,824 audience a temporary charge when defensive tackle Jason Ferguson returned UVA's Walt Derey fumble 10 yards for a TD—Georgia's first tie of the game (27-27) with only 1:09 left.

Bobo, Edwards Lead UGA Past Badgers in '98 Outback Bowl



Mike Bobo completed 26 of 28 passes for 235 yards and one touchdown and running back Robert Edwards ran for three more scores as Georgia defeated Wisconsin 33-6 before an Outback Bowl crowd of 56,186 and an ESPN national television audience.

Bobo, who earned MVP honors, set an Outback Bowl record for best completion percentage (92.8). He also set Outback and Georgia records for consecutive completions with 19. Edwards set a Georgia bowl mark and tied an Outback record with three rushing touchdowns. Senior Hines Ward set an Outback Bowl record for receptions and yardage with 12 catches for 122 yards.

Georgia sported a new look for the Outback Bowl, donning black pants instead of the traditional "silver britches" to go along with the Bulldogs' white jerseys and red helmets. "The players came to me a while back and requested we do something special for the bowl game," Georgia head coach Jim Donnan said. "The idea the players liked best was wearing black pants. After discussing it with (athletic director) Coach Dooley we decided to go along with the players' suggestion for this game."

Georgia Rallies Past Virginia In 1998 Peach Bowl



No. 19 Georgia rallied from an early second-quarter deficit of 21-0 to post a thrilling 35-33 win over 12th-ranked Virginia. A Peach Bowl record crowd of 72,876 in Atlanta on Dec. 31, 1998 was in attendance for the memorable comeback.

Virginia capitalized on three second quarter interceptions by Georgia freshman Quincy Carter, turning each of them into a touchdown to build a 21-0 lead. Georgia got on the scoreboard when Carter connected with senior Tony Small on an 11-yard score with 1:15 left in the second quarter.

Georgia got its first lead of the night when Olandis Gary capped a 67-yard drive with a 2-yard run on the Dogs' first possession of the fourth quarter. The Bulldogs then built an 8-point lead when Carter called his own number on a quarterback sneak from the one-yard-line with 7:01 remaining.

Georgia staved off the Cavaliers late by stopping a 2-point conversion and then watching as their last-ditch field goal sailed wide left with just 19 seconds remaining.

Record Comeback Highlights '00 Outback Win over Purdue



Georgia kicked off the new year by staging the largest comeback in bowl history, scoring 28 unanswered points to defeat Purdue 28-25 in overtime at Raymond James Stadium in front of 54,059 in a game broadcast by ESPN.

Purdue jumped out to an early lead in the first quarter behind three Drew Brees touchdown passes. In the second quarter Brees threw his fourth touchdown pass to Chris James. Purdue missed three of the four extra point opportunities to lead 25-0 with 10:38 left in the first half.

Georgia got its first points of the game on a Terrence Edwards 74-yard touchdown run off an option reverse to cut the lead to 25-7. Quincy Carter, who had 243 yards on 20 of 33 passing with two touchdowns (one rushing, one passing), helped continue the Georgia surge when he scored on an eight-yard run with 4:22 left in the third quarter. Patrick Pass made the two-point conversion to move the score to 25-18.

The Bulldogs tied the score at 25 with just 1:19 left in regulation, when Randy McMichael caught a Carter pass over two defenders for an eight-yard touchdown. In overtime, Georgia managed to stop Purdue on its first drive when Dorsch missed a 43-yard field goal. After two Pass rushes for 19 yards, Hap Hines nailed a 21-yarder to cap the Bulldogs' come from behind victory.


Georgia Cruises Past Virginia In 2000 O'ahu Bowl

The 24th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs (8-4) defeated Virginia 34-17 in the 2000 Jeep O'ahu Bowl in front of an Aloha Stadium crowd of 24,187 and an ESPN television audience on Christmas Eve.

Georgia jumped out to a 17-0 lead in the first quarter. The Bulldogs got on the board with a 35-yard field goal by freshman kicker Billy Bennett. On the Bulldogs' next series, one play after a successful fake punt, Edwards scampered 40 yards into the end zone on a reverse to give Georgia a 10-0 lead. On Virginia's next possession, freshman safety Kentrell Curry recovered a Cavalier fumble in the end zone for the 17-0 lead.

The Cavaliers pulled within 24-14 in the third quarter as senior linebacker Byron Thweatt returned a Georgia fumble 58 yards, but that was as close as Virginia would get. Georgia added two more touchdowns for the final margin, a 21-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Cory Phillips to freshman receiver Damien Gary and a four-yard fumble return by sophomore safety Cap Burnett after senior linebacker Kendrell Bell knocked the ball loose.

Edwards was named MVP after leading UGA in both receiving and rushing with eight catches for 79 yards and five rushes for 97 yards and one touchdown.

Running back Verron Haynes capped his Georgia career with 132 yards on 27 carries, including a 1-yard scoring run in the third quarter. That touchdown gave the Bulldogs a 16-10 lead.

The Bulldogs began the game with some trickery when Fred Gibson took the opening kickoff and gave a reverse handoff to Decory Bryant, who raced 86 yards to the Boston College 18. 

2003 Dogs Get Record 13th Win In Nokia Sugar Bowl



Georgia bowl MVP Musa Smith rushed for 145 yards and Billy Bennett kicked four field goals as Georgia defeated Florida State 26-13 before 74,269 fans in the Nokia Sugar Bowl. Georgia completed the season at 13-1, the most wins in school history.

The Bulldogs' defense forced three turnovers by the Seminoles, including cornerback Bruce Thornton's 71-yard interception return for a touchdown. Nose tackle Ken Veal's fumble recovery led to one of Bennett's four field goals.

Bennett staked the Bulldogs to a 3-0 lead in the first quarter. The Seminoles took their only lead of the game in the second quarter as quarterback Fabian Walker found receiver Anquan Boldin on a 5-yard scoring toss. Thornton's second-quarter interception and score gave Georgia the lead for good.

Bennett pushed the advantage to 20-7 by drilling a 42-yard field goal early in the third quarter. On FSU's next possession, Veal's fumble recovery set up a third Bennett field goal, pushing Georgia ahead 23-7.

Georgia Defeats Purdue In OT In 2004 Capital One Bowl

After scoring the game's first 24 points, Georgia needed a Gregg Lumpkin overtime touchdown run to hold off Purdue, 34-27, in front of a Capital One Bowl crowd of 64,565 and an ABC national television audience.

The Bulldogs opened the game with a nine-play, 68-yard drive culminating in a six-yard Fred Gibson touchdown pass from quarterback and offensive MVP David Greene (*left*). The Bulldogs used a Billy Bennett field goal and two more Greene TD passes--one each to Gibson and Reggie Brown--to open a 24-0 lead with 4:47 left in the first half.

Purdue answered with a touchdown and field goal to pull within 14, 24-10, at halftime.

Purdue scored the fourth quarter's first points on a Kyle Orton two-yard run with 9:11 left. Georgia then used up 4:44 on a 12-play, 57-yard drive ending in a 40-yard Bennett field goal. Late in the fourth, Purdue needed just three plays to go 66 yards and pull within three, 27-24, on a Kyle Orton three-yard touchdown pass. Ben Jones kicked a 44-yard field goal with 49 seconds left to tie the game at 27-all.

On the first possession of overtime, Lumpkin pushed his way into the end zone to give the Bulldogs a 34-27 lead. Purdue also drove inside the 10 yard line, but failed to convert.

Georgia (10-2) held off a late Wisconsin rally to defeat the Badgers 24-21 in front of 62,414 Outback Bowl fans at Raymond James Stadium and an ESPN national television audience.

It was the last game for several Bulldog seniors, including All-American DE David Pollack (*right*) whose three-sack performance earned him Outback Bowl MVP.

Overall, Georgia's defense stifled the Badgers' offense, allowing just 13 points while recording seven quarterback sacks and forcing and recovering two fumbles.

Wisconsin (9-3) took an early second-quarter 6-3 lead in a battle of field goals, but Georgia's offense came to life in the middle of the game. Senior QB David Greene connected on a 24-yard touchdown to Fred Gibson and later a 24-yard TD to senior Jeremy Thomas.

Freshman Thomas Brown notched his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the year with 111 yards on 16 carries, including a 29-yard touchdown run to give Georgia a 24-6 lead.

Georgia was unable to overcome a 28-0 deficit and fell to West Virginia 38-35 in the 2006 Nokia Sugar Bowl in front of 74,458 fans at the Georgia Dome and an ABC national television audience.

Despite three touchdowns and 277 yards passing by quarterback D.J. Shockley, the Bulldogs' late rally fell short after they outscored the Mountaineers 35-10 to finish the game. Tailback Thomas Brown led Georgia with 78 yards rushing, including a 52-yard touchdown.

West Virginia started the game's scoring with three touchdowns in the first quarter and went up 28-0 with 14:10 remaining in the second quarter. Georgia got its first points at the 12:58 mark in the second quarter on Kregg Lumpkin's career-long 34-yard touchdown run.

The Bulldogs managed to close the gap to 38-35 after Shockley connected with fellow senior Bryan McClendon for a 43-yard touchdown with 5:13 left in the fourth quarter. But West Virginia converted a fake punt in the game's final drive, enabling the Mountaineers to run the clock out.



Bulldogs Notch 10th Win At 2009 Capital One Bowl

Matthew Stafford threw three touchdown passes in the final 18 minutes against Michigan State, as the Bulldogs posted a 24-12 Capital One Bowl victory in front of 59,681 fans and an ABC national television audience.

The first half was ugly for Stafford, projected to be an early first-round NFL draft pick, and Georgia. He was just 6-for-14 with an interception in the first half and Michigan State (9-4) led 6-3. In the second half, he looked more like the quarterback NFL teams covet. He completed 14 of his final 17 throws, including three TD passes.

Stafford started the comeback by directing a 10-play, 96-yard drive midway through the third quarter. He went 6-for-6 for 92 yards and capped it with a 35-yard touchdown toss to Michael Moore. Stafford and Aron White hooked up on a 21-yard TD toss with 9 seconds left in the third quarter to put Georgia up 17-6.

Junior linebacker Rennie Curran had eight, and junior safety Reshad Jones had five tackles and an interception.


No. 24 UCF Edges Bulldogs In 2010 Liberty Bowl

Georgia dropped a 33-30 decision to Michigan State in a thrilling three-overtime game in the Outback Bowl in front of 49,429 fans and a nationally televised ABC audience.

Bulldog junior Tavarres King set a school-record with 205 yards receiving on six catches, including a career-long 80-yard TD. Defensive back Brandon Boykin, who was named the MVP of the game, forced a safety, returned a punt 92 yards for a TD and scored on a 13-yard run.

With 2:06 left, MSU quarterback Kirk Cousins led a 10-play 85-yard drive that tied the game at 27-27 to send it into overtime. After an interception by Bacarri Rambo on MSU's first possession, Georgia senior Blair Walsh missed a 42-yard field goal to send it to another overtime.

Both teams exchanged field goals in the second OT. The Spartans opened the third OT with a field goal that gave them a 33-30 lead. Georgia had a chance to tie it again, but its 47-yard field goal attempt was blocked, sealing the win for the Spartans.

The Georgia Bulldogs grabbed the school's 30th all-time bowl victory in a 31-23 win over the TCU Horned Frogs in the Autozone Liberty Bowl at the Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium in Memphis.

Georgia junior tailbacks Nick Chubb and Sony Michel combined for 268 total yards and three touchdowns. Chubb amassed 142 yards on the ground, including a 13-yard touchdown run that strengthened the Bulldogs' lead to eight points at 31-23 with 2:48 left in the game.

Michel, the Liberty Bowl Offensive MVP, supplied the Bulldogs with one rushing touchdown on 87 yards and another on 39 receiving yards. Bulldogs Top Sooners In Classic Rose Bowl Game



• Sony Michel's 27-yard touchdown run in the second overtime capped one of the wildest games in program history, a 4-hour roller coaster ride that sent Georgia into the National Championship Game.

• Michel's winning score was his fourth of a career-best game, one in which he gained 181 yards rushing and also caught four passes.

• Georgia overcame a 17-point second-quarter deficit and a 7-point margin in the final minutes of regulation. Nick Chubb scored the equalizer on a 2-yard sprint around right end with just 55 seconds left, knotting the score at 45. The tying drive covered 59 yards in seven plays.

• After an exchange of field goals in the first overtime, Lorenzo Carter blocked a Sooner field goal

from 27 yards to give Georgia the advantage. It was the Bulldogs' third block of a placement kick in the 2017 season and fourth block overall.

• Alabama defeated Georgia 26-23 in the 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship Game in Atlanta, overcoming two 13-point deficits and an errant field goal attempt that would have won it in regulation.

• Still, the Bulldogs led in overtime on the strength of a 51-yard field goal by Rodrigo Blankenship. They even took the upper hand by sacking Bama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa for a 16-yard loss on the Tide's first play in the extra period. But on second down, Tagovailoa hit DeVonta Smith for a 41-yard scoring pass that ended the game.

• Georgia controlled the first half, taking a 13-0 lead on Mecole Hardman's 1-yard run just before intermission. Hardman scored again on an 80-yard pass from Jake Fromm with 6:52 left in the third quarter, answering Bama's first score of the night.

• This game marked Georgia's first appearance since 1982 in a game where victory would have given it a national title in football.

• It was also the first time that any Bulldog team had played consecutive overtime games. Georgia is now 8-6 all-time in overtime contests, including 3-3 at neutral sites.

Longhorns Hold Off Bulldogs in Sugar Bowl



• A fast start by Texas -- aided partly by a pair of early Georgia miscues -- enabled the Longhorns to post a 28-21 upset victory over the Bulldogs in the 2019 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

• Texas tallied scores on four of its first five possessions in building a 20-7 first-half lead. The margin reached 28-7 before Georgia put together two scoring drives in the fourth period, the latter touchdown with :14 left.

• The Longhorns took the opening kickoff and drove 75 yards in 10 plays for their first score. The ensuing Georgia drive stalled at the 41-yard line, where a low snap caused punter Jake Camarda to field it with his right knee touching the turf at the 27. Georgia's defense, however, forced the Longhorns to settle for a 37-yard field goal.

• Later in the first quarter, a D'Andre Swift fumble at his own 12-yard line gave Texas another scoring opportunity. QB Sam Ehlinger scrambled for a 9-yard touchdown three plays later for a 17-0 margin.

• Georgia finished the season 11-3. The Bulldogs made their 55th all-time bowl appearance, including the program's 22nd consecutive appearance. Its record in bowl games is now 31-21-3.

• Elijah Holyfield became the 15th UGA rusher to gain 1,000 yards in a single season. He went over the 1,000-yard mark on his first carry of the second half. Teammate D'Andre Swift had surpassed that milestone in the SEC Championship game. It marked the second straight year that Georgia had a pair of 1,000-yard rushers after Nick Chubb and Sony Michel had done it in 2017.

Dogs Make Victorious Return to Big Easy

• Fifth-ranked Georgia closed the 2019 season with a 26-14 victory over #7 Baylor in the 86th Allstate Sugar Bowl before 55,211 fans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome and an ESPN primetime television audience.

• The Bulldogs won this game with a roster that scarcely resembled the one that had played 13 previous contests. As many as 15 scholarship players missed the Sugar Bowl for various reasons. Hardest hit were the offensive line -- which lacked three key players and coach Sam Pittman, who left to become head coach at Arkansas -- and a defense that was missing at least six regulars. OL Warren Ericson, RB Zamir White and DT Devonte Wyatt all made their first career starts in the game.

• Freshman George Pickens, who was named the Sugar Bowl MVP, had a career-high 12 catches (tying a UGA bowl record) for 175 yards and 1 TD. In the first half alone, he had 11 for 165 yards and one TD. His 27-yard TD catch early in the second period gave Georgia its first measurable distance from the Bears.

• With the victory, the 2019 class tied the mark for most wins by a Bulldog senior class with 44. They matched the 2005 group that went 44-9 with a pair of SEC titles. The 2019 class finished with a 44-12 record, one SEC title, three consecutive SEC Eastern Division crowns and was the 2018 CFP Runner-Up.

• Georgia made its 11th all-time appearance in the Sugar Bowl, and the Bulldogs are now 5-6. Georgia made its 23rd consecutive appearance in a bowl game, the second longest active streak in the country. Overall, Georgia improved to 32-21-3 in bowls.

- Jack Podlesny's career-long 53-yard field goal with :03 left completed a 24-21 comeback victory for ninth-ranked Georgia over No. 8 Cincinnati at the 2021 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta.
- Things looked bleak for Georgia when Cincinnati's Jerome Ford broke free on a 79-yard touchdown run with 14:11 left in the third quarter. The score put the Bearcats ahead 21-10, a lead that seemed almost out of reach, given the Bulldogs' offensive struggles to that point in the game.
- Georgia got the spark it needed early in the fourth quarter, when Azeez Ojulari sacked UC quarterback Desmond Ridder, who lost possession at his own 25-

yard line. Two plays later, Zamir White streaked around left end for a 9-yard touchdown run.

• Georgia got within 21-19 with a 32-yard field goal from Podlesny on its next possession. After an exchange of punts, the Bulldogs held Cincinnati on its final possession, setting up the game-winning drive.

• Georgia quickly advanced on five plays before stalling at the UC 36-yard line. Podlesny coolly stroked his career-long field goal with :03 remaining. Ojulari then sacked Ridder in the end zone on the game's last play for the final margin of victory.

• Trailing 27-3, Michigan took the second-half kickoff and drove into scoring territory. Cade McNamara, however, was intercepted in the end zone by Derion Kendrick, snuffing perhaps the Wolverines' last chance to contend.

Bulldogs Top Alabama, Claim 2021 National Championship



- The Georgia Bulldogs claimed the program's first national championship in 41 years and its third overall, defeating Alabama 33-18 in the CFP Championship Game before 68,311 fans at Lucas Oil Stadium and a national audience on ESPN.
- After a rather slow first half, momentum shifted when Jalen Carter blocked Will Reichard's 48-yard field-goal attempt.
- The Bulldogs took their opportunity and ran with it, literally, thanks to a 67-yard run by James Cook and the game's first touchdown from Zamir White.
- Capitalizing on a Georgia fumble, Alabama scored its only touchdown of the game. The

Bulldogs needed just over two minutes to counter. Trailing 18-13, Bennett found Adonai Mitchell in the end zone from 40 yards out for the, giving Georgia the lead for good.

• The Georgia defense, as it had all season, then took command and forced an Alabama three-and-out. The Bulldogs offense answered with a short touchdown pass to Brock Bowers. On Alabama's next possession, Kelee Ringo intercepted Bryce Young and returned it 74 yards to seal the game.

Bulldogs Rally to Best Buckeyes in Peach Bowl



- Quarterback Stetson Bennett connected with receiver Adonai Mitchell for the go-ahead touchdown with less than a minute remaining as No. 1 Georgia topped No. 4 Ohio State, 42-41, in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl in front of a record 79,330 fans and a national ESPN television audience.
- Despite being down two touchdowns at two separate points, the Bulldogs' offense fought back to tie and eventually take the lead on a 10-yard touchdown from Stetson Bennett to Adonai Mitchell with 54 seconds remaining.
- After Ohio State moved down the field on a last-minute drive, Noah Ruggles' potential 50-yard game winner hooked far left to clinch the largest fourth-quarter comeback in CFP history.

• Bennett, the game's Offensive MVP, hit on 23-of-34 passes for 398 yards and three touchdowns. Defensive MVP honors went to defensive back Javon Bullard, who registered a sack among his three tackles and broke up a pass in the end zone. Defensive back Chris Smith logged a team-high eight tackles, while linebacker Smael Mondon had seven stops, including a sack.



Bulldogs Dominate Horned Frogs to Claim Back-to-Back National Championships



The No. 1 Georgia Bulldogs scored on their first six possessions, led by 31 at the half, and cruised to a 65-7 win over No. 3 TCU Monday night at SoFi Stadium to capture their second straight national championship.

Unlike last season's National Championship Game, in which the Bulldogs needed to rally to beat Alabama, Georgia jumped on the Horned Frogs from the outset. The lead was 17-7 after the first quarter and 38-7 at halftime, as quarterback Stetson Bennett and the offense started hot and stayed hot, and the defense produced its own

dominating performance that included three first-half turnovers.

Georgia is the first team in the College Football Playoff era to win back-to-back national championships. The victory was the 17th in a row for the Bulldogs, tying the school record set during the 1945-47 seasons.

Bennett was named the Offensive MVP after throwing for 304 yards and four touchdowns and rushing for two scores. It was Bennett's fourth Offensive MVP award in four career CFP games. Safety Javon Bullard was named the Defensive MVP after picking off a pair of passes and recovering a fumble, all in the first half. The defense finished with nine tackles for loss and five sacks.

Georgia (15-0) finished with 589 yards of offense to just 188 for TCU (13-2), which came in averaging 41.1 points and 474.1 yards per game. The Bulldogs' 65 points were the most ever in a CFP or BCS title game.

After Georgia's defense opened the game with a quick stop, the offense hit a couple of big plays before Bennett ran the ball in for a 21-yard touchdown and a 7-0 lead with 11:01 left in the first quarter. Earlier in the drive, Bennett hit Bowers for 21 and 12 yards on consecutive plays to move deep into Horned Frogs territory.

Georgia's defense gave the offense the ball back at the TCU after safety Christopher Smith forced a fumble and Bullard recovered at the 33. After a Bowers 5-yard run and a 15-yard Bennett completion to Ladd McConkey, the drive stalled and Jack Podlesny kicked a 24-yard field goal to make it 10-0 Bulldogs with 6:51 remaining in the first.

TCU's high-powered offense connected on its first big play soon after, a 60-yard completion down to the Georgia 11. Three plays later, quarterback Max Duggan, a Heisman Trophy finalist like Bennett, ran the ball in from the 2 to make it 10-7 with 4:45 remaining in the quarter.

Georgia wasted no time answered with another touchdown. Bennett and McConkey twice connected on 11-yard receptions, with an 11-yard Kenny McIntosh run in between before Bennett hit a wide open McConkey in the end zone for a 37-yard score, pushing the lead to 17-7 with 2:39 remaining in a busy opening quarter.

The Bulldogs put together a dynamic 92-yard drive on their next possession, mixing the run and pass effectively as they marched in for another touchdown. Bowers had receptions of 10 and 35 yards, Bennett scrambled for 12, Daijun Edwards had an 8-yard catch and 7-yard run, McIntosh added a 12-yard run, and then Bennett finished it with a 6-yard touchdown run. Bennett's 10th rushing touchdown of the season made it 24-7 with 8:30 to play in the half.

Georgia's defense forced its second turnover of the half on TCU's next drive, with Bullard picking off a deep Duggan throw at the Bulldog 34. The offense then marched down, again effectively mixing the run and pass, and went up

31-7 on Kendall Milton's 1-yard plunge with 1:19 left in the half.

Bullard and the defense weren't done. Bullard intercepted a Duggan pass deep in TCU territory and the offense got the ball back at the 22 with :36 seconds left. On the second play of the drive, Bennett hit Adonai Mitchell for a 22-yard score with 26 seconds left, making it 38-7 at the half.

The Bulldogs amassed 371 yards and averaged 9.3 yards per play in the first two quarters while holding TCU to 121 yards and 4.5 yards per play.

After punting for the first and only time in the game on their first drive of the second half, the Bulldogs' offense found the end zone again with their second, with Bennett hitting Bowers for a 22-yard touchdown to make it 45-7 with 10:52 remaining in the third quarter. Bowers had a monster performance with seven receptions for 152 yards, plus two rushes for 15 yards

Georgia made it 52-7 with 2:17 left in the third when Bennett hit McConkey for a 14-yard touchdown. A 1-yard Branson Robinson rushing touchdown pushed Georgia's lead to 59-7 with 9:24 left. Robinson was the sixth Bulldog to score at least one touchdown in the game, and he added a second score on a 19-yard run with 7:23 remaining, making it 65-7.

Bulldogs Rout Seminoles in Historic Orange Bowl

- Sixth-ranked Georgia wrapped up an outstanding season with a dominant 63-3 victory over previously unbeaten No. 5 Florida State in the Capital One Orange Bowl before 63,324 spectators. The Bulldogs amassed 673 yards of offense, scored on nine consecutive drives, and reset the program's own NCAA record for largest margin of victory in a bowl game.
- After taking a 7-0 lead in the first quarter, Georgia turned the game into a rout in the second quarter, outscoring FSU, 35-3, thanks to explosive plays on offense and three takeaways.
- With the victory, the 2023 senior class improved to 50-4, the most wins ever by a class in school history.

Georgia moved to 38-21-3 all-time in bowl games, including seven wins in a row.

- Georgia amassed 383 yards of offense in the first half, including 180 rushing yards, and averaged 11.3 yards per play. The 42-3 lead was the largest halftime advantage in Orange Bowl history.
- For the game, the Bulldogs rushed for 372 yards on 47 carries, and out-gained the Seminoles 673-209. Senior running back Kendall Milton closed out his career with MVP honors, rushing for 104 yards and two touchdowns.
- After Florida State cut the lead to 14-3 in the second quarter, Georgia scored in four plays before recovering a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and immediately scoring on a touchdown run by Ladd McConkey to make the score, 28-3. In the second half, quarterback Gunner Stockton finished 6 of 10 passing for 96 yards and two touchdowns, and added 46 yards rushing on seven attempts.

Notre Dame Takes Down Georgia in Sugar Bowl

- No. 2 Georgia's season came to an end against No. 5 Notre Dame, 23-10, in the College Football Playoff quarterfinal at the Allstate Sugar Bowl before 57,267 spectators at the Caesars Superdome.
- The game was played on January 2, following a postponement due to the Bourbon Street terrorist attack in the early morning of January 1.
- Gunner Stockton, making his first career start at quarterback, completed his first seven passes, helping the Bulldogs to an early 3-0 lead, but the Irish scored the final 13 points of the first half. Stockton, who replaced starter Carson Beck in the second half of the SEC Championship Game after Beck was injured, completed 20 of 32 passes for 234 yards and a touchdown against Notre Dame, but was sacked four times. Georgia's defense held the Irish to 244 yards, while the Bulldog offense gained 296.
- Notre Dame took control of the game late in the first half, connecting on a 48-yard field goal before Stockton was strip-sacked on the ensuing play, leading to an Irish touchdown making the score, 13-3, at halftime. Jayden Harrison then took the opening kickoff of the second half 98 yards for a touchdown to make it 20-3.
- Georgia responded in strong fashion, eventually scoring its only touchdown of the game on a 32-yard completion to Cash Jones out of the backfield, cutting the lead to 20-10 with 9:36 left in the third. Notre Dame added to its lead early in the fourth quarter with a 47-yard field goal, making it 23-10 with 13:47 remaining. Notre Dame used a 13-play drive that lasted more than seven minutes to put the game away.
- The Bulldogs won double-digit games for the seventh time in coach Kirby Smart's nine seasons as head coach. This was also Georgia's fourth College Football Playoff appearance in the Smart era.

Although the University of Georgia is now known as the home of Uga, the pure white English bulldog, several mascots led the Red and Black before Frank W. Seiler provided the current lineage beginning in 1956.

The Goat -- Feb. 22, 1892

Georgia's mascot for its first football game against Auburn, February 22, 1892 in Atlanta, Ga., was a goat. Old newspaper clippings indicate that the goat wore a black coat with red U.G. letters on each side. He also had on a hat with ribbons all down his high horns, and the Auburn fans yelled throughout the game "shoot the billy-goat."

Trilby, 1894

In 1894, Georgia's mascot was a solid white female bull terrier owned by a student, Charles H. Black, Sr., of Atlanta. Trilby, named after a novel by George Du Maurier, served as the campus pet and mascot for the Chi Phi fraternity.

Disputing stories speculate the origin of the Bulldog nickname, and the story of Trilby provides yet another opinion: "...every day Trilby took herself down to old Herty field with her master for football practice. She ran signals with the best of them and became an accustomed figure on the athletic field...One morning, Trilby failed to appear for her breakfast and after a frantic search she was finally discovered proudly washing the faces of her newborn family, 13 white puppies...Late one dusky fall afternoon, Trilby appeared for a grid workout and scampering after her came her 13 children, darting through players' legs, barking and pace. 'Well,' suggested one of the players, 'Trilby has brought us a name, Bulldogs.' ...Every time a game was played on Herty Field, the boys would floss Trilby and her 13 offerings up with red and black ribbons, and so attired they have gone down in history as perhaps the first 'sponsors' in southern football." —Ruth Stanton Cogill (Atlanta newspaper)

"After the rein of Trilby and her family, chaos developed in the mascot department at the university. Many games had several, depending on which alumnus got his dog to the game first." —AJC, Nov. 18, 1962

Mr. Angel, 1944-46

Mr. Angel, a brindle and white colored English Bulldog owned by Eastman, Ga.,-physician, Warren Coleman, filled a void during some of the war years.

There was no mascot roaming the sidelines and Coleman took Mr. Angel to games and stood with him on the sidelines. His picture on the field and with the Georgia cheerleaders appears in the 1945 and '46 UGA annual, the Pandora.

Butch, 1947-50

Butch was a brindled English bulldog owned by Mabry Smith of Warner Robins,

Ga. He was spotted by students who were attending the 1946 Georgia-Georgia Tech game in Athens, and the canine appeared to be suited for the mascot position. Smith agreed to loan Butch to the University during the football season along with a female puppy named Tuffy. The female died of a heart attack following the Georgia-Kentucky game in 1948, but Butch continued to serve. Spending the off-season at Smith's home in Warner Robins, Butch was tragically shot in the summer of 1951 by a policeman after the dog escaped from his pen and was found roaming the streets. Butch is buried behind Smith's business along Watson Boulevard.

In 2004 plans for a marker honoring Butch in his hometown were put into motion by longtime Warner Robins resident Guy Fussell.

Mike, 1951-55

Butch was succeeded by Mike, another brindled English bulldog, owned by C. L. Fain. Mike lived in the field house on campus and died of natural canine causes in 1955. As his master's thesis, Gene Owens of Fort Worth, Texas, cast the bronze statue of Mike which is located at the entrance of Memorial Hall

Uga Takes the Field

In the last 100 years of intercollegiate football, Georgia's Uga has established himself as the nation's most well-known mascot. The line of pure white English bulldogs, which epitomizes everything Georgia, has been owned by the Frank W. "Sonny" Seiler family of Savannah, Ga., since Uga I first graced the campus in 1956.

Through the years, Uga has been defined by his spiked collar, a symbol of the position which he holds. He was given his name, an abbreviation for the university, by William Young

of Columbus, a law school classmate of Seiler. Each of the Uga mascots is awarded a varsity letter in the form of a plaque, identical to those presented to all Bulldog athletes who letter in their respective sports.

As determined and published by the *Pitt Press*, the University of Georgia is the only major college that actually buries its mascots within the confines of the stadium. Ugas I-IX are buried in marble vaults near the main gate in the embankment of the South stands. Epitaphs to the dogs are inscribed in bronze, and before each home game, flowers are placed on their graves. The memorial plot attracts hundreds of fans and visitors each year.

For the past 20 years, Uga's jerseys have been custom-made at the beginning of each season from the same material used for the players' jerseys. Old jerseys are destroyed.

Uga's on-field home is a permanent air conditioned doghouse located next to the cheerleader's platform, providing comfort in the heat of August and September. The custom-made doghouse is a gift from the Bahamian Bulldog Club of Nassau, Bahamas, through the courtesy of Fred Hazlewood.





“Hood’s Ole Dan”
Record: 53-48-6

The current Uga line of solid white English bulldogs began with Uga I, Hood’s Ole Dan, born Dec. 2, 1955, in Columbus. Uga I was given to Cecelia Seiler by a friend, Frank Heard of Columbus and appeared in his first game in the 1956 home opener. As recalled by Sonny Seiler, “...his original red jerseys were made by Cecelia. It was necessary to take up children’s t-shirts to fit the dog in the right places. There is no telling how many of these jersey’s he wore out. During the early games in Athens, especially the hot ones before he had a dog house, the large green hedges that surround Sanford Stadium afford welcomed shade in the heat of battle. Unfortunately, the hedges constantly tore these jerseys and new ones had to be made.”

Uga III, 1972-80
“Seiler’s Uga Three”
Record: 71-32-2

Born Oct. 9, 1972, Seiler’s Uga III was present for Georgia football’s finest moment as Herschel Walker took the Bulldogs to the 1980 national championship. He led Georgia to six bowl games in nine years and closed out his career in ultimate fashion winning the 1980 NCAA championship. Uga III retired on the 100th football game of his career, marking the opener of the 1981 season. He died just weeks later.

Uga II, 1966-72
“Ole Dan’s Uga”
Record: 42-16-3

Uga I was succeeded by his son, Ole Dan’s Uga at an impressive pregame ceremony at Homecoming, 1966. With the Georgia Redcoat Band lining the field, Uga II was led to the center of the field by Charles Seiler, son of Sonny and Cecelia. The student body erupted in a cheer that was picked up by the entire stadium, “Damn Good Dog!”

Uga II had an impressive reign as he watched Georgia participate in five bowl games and win two SEC championships.

Uga IV

Uga IV, 1981-89
“Seiler’s Uga Four”
Record: 77-27-4

Uga IV was perhaps the most active of all the Georgia mascots, standing as the only one to attend a bowl game every year of his service (1981-89). He took over for Uga III in the 1981 season opener and over the next nine seasons, led Georgia to a record of 77-27-4. The highlight of his career was his personal appearance at the Heisman Trophy Banquet with Herschel Walker in New York on December 9, 1982. Uga IV was escorted through the banquet hall by the president of the

Downtown Athletic Club, and was earlier photographed with Herschel by photographers from across the country. The proud Bulldog donned his game jersey for the outing and added the formal touch of a collar and black tie. Uga IV was the first mascot invited to the Heisman Banquet. Declared “Dog of the Decade” by Vince Dooley in 1991, Uga IV was posthumously awarded the highest honor available to University of Georgia mascots — the Georgia varsity letter.

“The Substitute”
Record: 3-1

Although Otto was not pure white like his father, he was called upon to fill in for his younger brother, Uga IV, who injured ligaments in his left hind knee when jumping off a hotel bed before the Vanderbilt contest. In

four games during the 1986 season, Otto led the team to a 3-1 record and also co-mascotted (along with Uga IV), a victory over instate rival Georgia Tech. After winning his first two games, fans cheered, “2-and-0 with Otto!” Dooley, serving as head coach during Otto’s brief tenure, favored the substitute the most. “I have always had a great affection for those who came off the bench and performed, and he did that and had a great time,” Dooley said. Otto is buried in the Seiler’s backyard.




Uga V, 1990-99
“UGA IV’s Magillicuddy II”
Record: 65-39-1

In the first game of 1990, Uga V officially began his reign as the Georgia mascot, taking over from his father Uga IV, who passed away at his home in Savannah on Feb. 26, 1990. Uga V was the last pup sired by Uga IV and was born on March 6, 1990.

Named in honor of one of the greatest Bulldogs, Dan Magill, former Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations and longtime tennis coach and sports information director. Surprisingly, the Seiler family became aware that Uga IV’s mate was expecting only 10 days before the litter was due. This notice came a week after Uga IV had passed away at his home in Savannah from kidney failure. There were only three pups in the litter and the last one born on March 6 was the only solid white male.

Uga V had been perhaps the most well known of all the Bulldog mascots, highlighted by his appearance on the cover of the April 28, 1997, *Sports Illustrated* which declared him the nation’s best college mascot. Rocketed to stardom, he also appeared in Clint Eastwood’s “Midnight In The Garden Of Good And Evil” — filmed in his hometown of Savannah, Ga. He died on Nov. 22, 1999, just over two months after his retirement.

Uga VI

Uga VI, 1999-2008
“Uga V’s Whatchagot Loran”
Record: 87-27

In 2007, Uga VI became the winningest mascot in school history and owned a record of 87-27. The fall of 2008 would have been his 10th season after Uga VI reigned over more games than any other mascot with 114. He

died on June 27, 2008. In his last game, the Bulldogs defeated Hawai’i 41-10 in the 2008 Sugar Bowl in New Orleans.

The pregame passing of the bone ceremony from Uga V to his heftier and friskier son, Whatchagot Loran, took place at the 1999 Georgia-South Carolina contest. Only a year old at his coronation, Uga VI stood as the biggest of all the Uga mascots weighing in at 65 pounds — 20 pounds heavier than his father.

His first season climaxed in a magnificent come from behind victory over Purdue at the Outback Bowl in Tampa. The 2000 season ended in Hawaii, but due to the distance and a quarantine rule, Uga VI missed the O’ahu Bowl, marking the first time the Georgia mascot had missed the postseason game since the 1969 Sun Bowl.

Alongside first-year head coach Mark Richt, Uga VI saw his third consecutive 8-4 season, which included a 26-24 win at then-No. 6 Tennessee for the Bulldogs’ first win in Knoxville since 1980.

Uga VI and Georgia experienced their best run in two decades during the 2002-05 seasons. That stretch included 44 wins, a pair of SEC titles and appearances in the Sugar, Capital One and Outback Bowls.

In 2007, Uga VI passed Uga IV (77-24-4) for the most wins of any bulldog in school history.

Uga VII, 2008-2009
“Loran’s Best”
Record: 16-7

The seventh in the Uga line of Georgia mascots was introduced to the Georgia people on Aug. 30, 2008, during pre-game ceremonies of the Bulldogs’ season opener against Georgia Southern.

“Loran’s Best” officially became “Uga VII,” when he was introduced for the first time to the Sanford Stadium crowd prior to kickoff of the Georgia vs. Georgia Southern game. He was escorted onto the field by members of the Frank W. “Sonny” Seiler family of Savannah who have owned the continuous line of mascots since Uga I took up the mantle in 1956.



Uga VII passed away unexpectedly on Nov. 19 of heart-related causes. It was the Thursday before the final home game of the 2009 season and the Bulldogs did not have a live mascot at the game. Instead, a wreath was placed on UGA VII’s doghouse, and the players wore a special UGA VII decal on their helmets to remember him. “Russ,” the five-year-old half brother of Uga VII, served as the Bulldog mascot for the Georgia Tech game in Atlanta and helped his squad to a 30-24 win. He was the first substitute mascot since “Otto” in 1986.

“Big Bad Bruce”
Record: 4-2

Born Sept. 12, 2009 in Savannah, Ga., Uga VIII is the grandson of Uga VI. He carried on the tradition of more than 60 years of all-white bulldogs bred by Frank “Sonny” Seiler and family.

Uga VIII was named in honor of Dr. Bruce Hollett from the University’s School of Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Hollett has been a longtime caregiver for the famed line of English bulldogs. UGA VIII served six games in the 2010 season before he became ill and missed the AutoZone Liberty Bowl. He passed away with lymphoma on February 4, 2011.

Uga IX, 2012-14
 (“Russ”, 2009-2012: 16-9)
Record: 44-19

“Uga IX, formerly “Russ,” the half-brother of Uga VII, served as interim Bulldog mascot for a total of 25 games. He worked nine games during the 2009 and 2010 seasons after Uga VII and VIII passed away. He roamed the sidelines at all 14 games during the 2011 season. He then served for two wins at the beginning of the 2012 season before being promoted as Uga IX prior to the Florida Atlantic game on Sept. 15, 2012. His time as mascot included the 2011 and 2012 SEC Eastern Division championships, three road wins at Georgia Tech, a victory over Texas A&M in the 2009 Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La., and a win over Nebraska in the 2013 Capital One Bowl. He was the first substitute mascot since “Otto” in 1986.

Epitaph: He endeared himself to the Georgia people. His dedication to duty when called upon was exemplary.

Uga X, 2015-22
“Que”
Record: 91-18

Uga IX officially retired as the Bulldogs’ mascot at the end of the 2014 season. After a three-month “audition” in that role, his grandson “Que” was formally crowned as his successor in a collaring ceremony prior to the Georgia-Georgia Southern game on Nov. 21, 2015. Que assumed the title of Uga X at the age of 2 1/2 years. During his audition, he made appearances at the Countdown to Kickoff event in July 2015, as well as Picture Day in August, before presiding over the entirety of the

2015 football season. Que capped his inaugural season by leading the team to a 24-17 victory over Penn State at the 2016 TaxSlayer Bowl.

In the 2021 season, Que reached heights attained by just one of his ancestors, UGA III, when Georgia won the 2022 CFP National Championship Game. Que closed out his career with a second-consecutive national title, retiring after the 2022 season as the winningest mascot in program history.



**Uga XI**

**Uga XI, 2023-present
“Boom”
Record: 36-5**

Following the retirement of Uga X, 10-month old puppy Boom assumed the vaunted role of Georgia’s on-field mascot. During a pregame ceremony at the annual “G Day” game, University of Georgia president Jere W. Morehead joined J. Reid Parker Director of Athletics Josh Brooks and his son, Davis, in the ceremonial collaring of Boom. Boom is the 11th solid white English Bulldog to serve as Georgia’s mascot since the line began in 1956.

In his first season, Boom saw the Bulldogs post their third-consecutive undefeated regular season, followed by a record-breaking 63-3 victory over Florida State in the Orange Bowl. Boom’s second season saw the Bulldogs win the 2024 SEC Championship in overtime over Texas and reach the College Football Playoff as the No. 2 overall seed. The success has continued to his third season, with the Bulldogs going 12-1 in the regular season and winning a third SEC title in four seasons, along with earning the No. 3 seed in the CFP.

The Arch

Serving as the official symbol of the University of Georgia, the Arch was built in the 1850s and originally served as part of a larger iron fence securing the campus. Daniel Redfearn (BL 1909, BS 1910) is credited with making the Arch the sacred symbol of UGA. Recognized as one of the school's finest icons, students today hold the Arch in high regard as its three pillars represent the virtues of wisdom, justice, and moderation.

The "G"

In 1963 after becoming the Bulldogs' Head Football Coach, Vince Dooley redesigned the football uniform, choosing a red helmet with a black "G" on a white background as the dominant feature of the new uniform for the 1964 season.

He discussed with his staff that a forward-looking "G" would be an appropriate emblem for the helmet of the Georgia team. Dooley had just hired John Donaldson, former Georgia player from 1945 to 1948, as backfield coach. Donaldson was keen on the idea of a new image and volunteered his wife, Anne, who had a BFA in commercial art from UGA, to design a logo for the new Georgia helmet with the general specifications Dooley had outlined. Dooley accepted Anne's original "G" which fit his vision for a forward look to Georgia's new emblem.

Since the Georgia "G", though different in design and color, was similar to Green Bay's "G", Coach Dooley thought it best to clear the use of Georgia's new emblem with the NFL team. Athletic Director Joel Eaves called for permission, which was granted. However, since its inception in 1961, the Green Bay "G" has been redesigned several times and now looks like Georgia's original 1964 "G." Georgia is proud that the Packers apparently liked the special nuances of the Bulldogs' forward-looking "G".

Georgia's oval "G", eventually replacing Georgia's old block "G" as the official UGA symbol, has stood the test of time. It made its first appearance in the opening game in 1964 and was an immediate hit with the Georgia fans, especially after Dooley's first three teams were so successful—highlighted by the 1966 SEC Championship.



Silver Britches were an innovation of Coach Wally Butts, who took over as head coach in 1939. The handsome pants complemented the bright red jersey and made for a striking uniform. Through the years, fans referred to the Bulldogs' silver britches in their chants and on banners, but the phrase really caught on in the early fifties with a cheer, banners, and colorful vests that proclaimed "Go, You Silver Britches." Coach Vince Dooley re-designed the uniform when he came in 1964 and used white pants; however, he re-instituted the silver britches in 1980 just prior to what turned out to be Georgia's national championship season.

The Chapel Bell

The ringing of the chapel bell after a Georgia victory is a tradition that continues even though freshmen are no longer ordered to do the chore. In the 1890's, the playing field was located only yards from the Chapel and first-year students were compelled to ring the bell until midnight in celebration of a Bulldog victory. Today students, alumni, and townspeople still rush to the Chapel to ring the bell after a gridiron victory.

"Glory, Glory"

Among the University's oldest and most lasting traditions is the school fight song, "Glory, Glory," which is sung to the tune of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." It was sung at games as early as the 1890's, but arranged in its present form by Georgia's immortal musician-composer Hugh Hodgson in 1915. There have been many Bulldog songs through the years and at least two collections dating back to 1909 have been published, but none have enjoyed more acceptance than "Glory, Glory."

"How 'Bout Them Dogs"

This is a slogan of recent vintage, but one that has become a battle cry of Bulldog fans probably because of its obvious grammatical slur. It first surfaced during the mid to late 1970's especially during the 1978 season when the Bulldogs posted several remarkable, come-from-behind victories. It gained national attention and exposure when Georgia won the national championship in 1980. A major wire service used the phrase in its story of Georgia's victory over Notre Dame and many newspapers picked it up in glaring headlines across the country proclaiming "How 'Bout Them Dogs!"

"Bulldogs"

Many oldtimers say Georgia acquired the nickname, "Bulldogs," because of the strong ties with Yale, whose nickname is "Bulldogs." Georgia's first president, Abraham Baldwin, was a Yale man and the early buildings on campus were designed from blueprints of the same buildings at Yale. However, the first references to the nickname "Bulldogs" actually came in the 1910's (1911-20) by Atlanta newspaper writers covering both football and baseball games. Although used occasionally during the previous decade, the nickname began to be consistently used around 1920.

On Nov. 3, 1920, Morgan Blake of the Atlanta Journal wrote about school nicknames and said "The Georgia Bulldogs would sound good because there is a certain dignity about a bulldog, as well as ferocity." After a 0-0 tie with Virginia in Charlottesville on Nov. 6, 1920, Atlanta Constitution writer Cliff Wheatley used the name "Bulldogs" in his story five times. Gene Hinton also used the term "Bulldogs." The nickname seemed to be off and running.

"Between The Hedges"

A reference to Sanford Stadium that dates to the early 1930's. The famous Chinese privet hedges that surround Sanford's playing field were only one foot high when the stadium was dedicated in 1929 and were protected by a wooden fence. It was natural for a clever sports writer, referring to an upcoming home game, to observe "that the Bulldogs will have their opponent 'between the hedges.'" At least one old-timer says the phrase was first coined by the legendary Atlanta sportswriter Grantland Rice.

"Lone Trumpeter"

Seven minutes before kickoff in Sanford Stadium, the Bulldog Nation directs its attention to a lone trumpeter standing in the upper deck of the southwest corner of the stadium. The soloist is recognized and begins to play the first 14 notes of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." The Battle Hymn solo was originally composed in 1987 as a student project by Jeff Simmons and became a part of the pre-game traditions in 2000. Each year, 25-30 members of the Redcoat Band audition for one of the 4-5 soloist positions.





Josh Brooks

*J. Reid Parker
Director of Athletics*

J. Reid Parker Director of Athletics Josh Brooks continues to lead the University of Georgia Athletic Association through historic success.

In 2025, Georgia won four team national championships, tying a school record for the most titles in a single athletics season. The Bulldogs also earned the highest cumulative GPA in program history with a 3.26 during the 2024-25 academic campaign, setting a new

school record once again.

Those accomplishments highlight the University's position as an academic and athletic powerhouse and underscore the achievements of the Athletic Association during Brooks' five-year tenure as athletic director.

Under his leadership, the Bulldogs have earned seven team national championships, 12 SEC crowns and 33 individual national titles across 21 sports. This fall, Georgia football earned a victory in the SEC championship game in its unprecedented fifth-straight appearance. The Bulldogs have won the title in three of the last five seasons and in back-to-back years for the first time since 1980.

Additional highlights include football national championships in 2021 and 2022, six conference championships, a national indoor crown and a NCAA title for women's tennis. Soccer has made a program-record four-straight NCAA tournament appearances and women's track won the program's first-ever outdoor title with a successful run in 2025. Equestrian also earned national titles in 2021 and 2025.

Georgia's No. 7 ranking in the 2023 LEARFIELD Directors Cup was the program's highest mark in 18 years, as Brooks become a finalist for the Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year honor.

For all his success, Brooks has also become a leading voice in college athletics. He serves on the SEC Executive Committee, is vice chair of the NCAA Football Oversight Committee and is chair of the NCAA Football Practice and Playing Seasons Committee.

With a focus on maintaining the University's mission of excellence in teaching and learning, Bulldog student-athletes have excelled academically. Recently, UGA swimmers Abby McCulloh (2025) and Callie Dickinson (2023) garnered the prestigious H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award – the highest honor earned by a student-athlete in the SEC. Women's tennis star Dasha Vidmanova – only the third female tennis player to win the NCAA's triple crown – was named the 2025 recipient of the Honda Award and was the Roy F. Kramer SEC Female Athlete of the Year.

From academic and athletic success to historic fundraising and a multitude of facility projects, Brooks has continued to sustain Georgia's standing as a national powerhouse. The Georgia Bulldog Club set new fundraising records in each of the last three years with \$86.4 million raised in 2022, \$102 million in 2023 and \$113 million in 2024.

Brooks has overseen substantial facility upgrades that include the brand-new Lindsey Hopkins Indoor Tennis Courts, improvements to the south side of Sanford Stadium, a \$45 million renovation to Foley Field, a \$38 million upgrade to the Jack Turner Softball Stadium, a new \$1.8 million men's and women's basketball weight room as well as expansive updates to Stegeman Coliseum and a renovation project in the Butts-Mehre Heritage Hall.

Georgia also built a new, state-of-the-art track and field locker room and a one-of-a-kind track facility off South Milledge Avenue is nearing completion.

While facility upgrades have been at the forefront, Georgia's emphasis on Name, Image, and Likeness has further enhanced its commitment to the student-athlete experience. Georgia Athletics was one of the first departments to announce a comprehensive NIL program, which provides wide-ranging education, multi-media management tools and brand-building training. The Bulldogs became one of the first schools to build an in-house NIL department with an Athlete Manager to help student-athletes navigate this space.

Under his guidance, Georgia re-branded the mental health and performance department, bringing in a new full-time director and an additional clinical counselor as well as adding sports psychology services for every team.

Before returning to UGA in 2016 as Executive Associate Director of Athletics, Brooks served as Deputy Athletics Director at the University of Louisiana Monroe from 2015-16 and Director of Athletics at Millsaps College from 2014-15. He also served in capacities as Director of Football Operations (2008-11) and Assistant and Associate Athletic Director for Internal Operations (2012-14) in his previous stint at UGA.

A native of Hammond, La., Brooks also served as director of football operations at the University of Louisiana-Monroe beginning in 2004. He gained experience as a student at Louisiana State University, working as an equipment manager and a student assistant coach.

Brooks graduated from LSU ('02) with a degree in Kinesiology and completed his master's degree in Sport Management from UGA ('14). He and his wife, Lillie, have twin sons, Jackson and James, born in July of 2009 and a third son, Davis, born in March of 2012.

He and his wife Lillie have become a vital part of the Athens community. On January 20, 2021, just two weeks after becoming Athletic Director, Brooks pledged \$100,000 to create a need-based scholarship to support UGA students from Athens-Clarke County. His gift created a Georgia Commitment Scholarship (GCS), adding to the more than 550 endowed, need-based scholarships created under the GCS program since its launch in January 2017.



Jere W. Morehead

*President
University of Georgia*

President Jere W. Morehead began his tenure as the 22nd University of Georgia president on July 1, 2013. Under his leadership, UGA has risen in the rankings of the best public colleges and universities and has completed a series of initiatives to enhance student learning and success, including a requirement for experiential learning for all undergraduates.

Additionally, the University established a School of Medicine and completed the most successful capital campaign in its history, raising \$1.45 billion. It also created an Innovation District, where students and faculty partner with industry to generate ideas and solutions to enhance the University's role as a powerful driver of economic development in Georgia.

During President Morehead's tenure, UGA has increased its research and development expenditures by over 75%. The University of Georgia ranks No. 1 among U.S. universities for the number of products brought to market based on its research, according to the annual survey by AUTM. UGA has ranked either first or second in this measure for nine consecutive years.

In keeping with his focus on student success, President Morehead launched the ALL Georgia Program to support students from rural areas and created the Double Dawgs program, which enables students to save time and money by earning an undergraduate and graduate degree in five years or less. A UGA education is in greater demand than ever, with over 43,000 students enrolled in fall 2024 and nearly 48,000 applications submitted for a spot in the incoming Class of 2029.

President Morehead has served the University of Georgia since 1986 in both faculty and administrative roles. Before becoming President, he was Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost from 2010 to 2013. Prior to 2010, he held several key administrative assignments, including Vice President for Instruction, Vice Provost for Academic Affairs, Associate Provost and Director of the Honors Program, and acting Executive Director of Legal Affairs.

He is the Meigs Professor of Legal Studies in the Terry College of Business, where he has held a faculty appointment since 1986. He is a co-author of several books and book chapters, including "The Legal and Regulatory Environment of Business," and he has published scholarly articles on legal topics ranging from export controls to jury selection.
